Looking at the Readings

The Gospel Acclamations are a great source of summary not only for the Gospel but also for the other readings and prayers. Most evidently today it sums up the readings and the liturgical texts of this feast. The first reading from the book of Proverbs gives a poetical account of God's work of creation. We stand in awe at the grandeur and artistry of the creator and invited to enter the play, the drama, of life and to delight in it.

St Paul eloquently merges the glory of God and the suffering of Christ and his followers into the act of faith, hope and love: the love that the Holy Sprit pours into our hearts.

Christ our Lord, the Wisdom and Word of God, recognises both the inadequacy of human words: 'I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now." (John 16:12) but also the power of divine inspiration. Yes the Holy Spirit will lead us to the truth. It took four centuries for the Church to settle on an acceptable teaching of the divinity and unity of the one Godhead. Again John reminds his readers that the Father glorifies the Son as the Son glorifies the Father.

The responsorial psalm praises God for his creation, and bestows the glory of God to the crown of his creation to us, His mortal beings.

Prayer for the Week

"You, Father, are one God, one Lord: with the only Begotten Son and the Holy Spirit, not in the unity of a single person, but in a Trinity of one substance. For what you have revealed to us of your glory we believe equally of your Son and of the Holy Spirit, so that, in the confessing of the true and eternal Godhead, you might be adored in what is proper to each Person, their unity in substance, and their equality in majesty. (*Preface of the Trinity, composed in medieval times*)

The Saints on the Trinity

Paul's teaching in his second letter to the Corinthians: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. Just as grace is given from the Father through the Son, so there could be no communication of the gift to us except in the Holy Spirit. But when we share in the Spirit, we possess the love of the Father, the grace of the Son and the fellowship of the Spirit himself. St Athanasius

On the Lighter Side

A trap that some homilist have fallen into on this day is opening the homily with the words that the mystery of the Trinity cannot be explained and then taking 20 minutes attempting to explain it.



Liturgical Jottings

Symbolism of the Trinity

In theology and liturgy teachers, writers, composers and artists have used numerus images, signs and symbols to depict and help explain the mystery of the Trinity. Perhaps the simplest is the triangle: three sides to one shape. St Patrick used three-leafed shamrock from the local flora to teach the Irish from what they knew to lead them to grasp this mystery. The liturgy of day emphasises the relation-ships between Father, Son and Holy Spirit and between the Trinity and humanity. Artists, too depict the three persons in various ways. Andrei Rublev, Russian painter, represented the Trinity beautifully in harmonic relationship of persons in his famous icon (black line form above) based on the encounter of Abraham, Sarah and the three angels at the oak of Mamre.

REFLECTION FROM FR PETER



As a sign of our entry into the life of the Trinity, we sign ourselves through the nature of God in our lives as FATHER, SON and HOLY SPIRIT. When I bring reflection of the Trinity I'm drawn to the Baptismal moment when we were Baptised into the three personhood of God. On that day of Baptism we were named for this participation in God's love. At the end of each celebration of the Eucharist we go in the peace of God's relationship. We are blessed into this relationship. The Trinity relates through the activity we see of God through our world and community.

Tomorrow is one we give especially here at St. Mel's of ST. ANTHONY. Close in tradition with our Italian culture of faith. THIS SUNDAY the statue of St Anthony is in the Church as we bring St Anthony for a continuing intercession of him as a Christ bearer of faith. Anthony models a way for 'lost things' being recovered. As one who gives a quiet yet powerful intercession in people's lives, it is Anthony's way as a preacher where his admiration was won over. Padua in Italy today is one of much veneration of Anthony as his place of burial and for pilgrimage.

Over the coming Sunday's in our Church cycle, with the TRINITY and next Sunday being the celebration of The BODY and BLOOD OF CHRIST, then the NATIVITY of JOHN THE BAPTIST, (June 23) then The SACRED HEART OF JESUS, (June 24) will then see the Church cycle back into Ordinary time. So there are significant events we unfold enhancing our faith life.



From this Sunday we see the Trinity as our life force of God's outpouring of love and from this seeing ourselves caught up in this dynamic of presence in our Church life.

I DON'T THINK WE SHOULD BE BANNING ANYONE FROM THE EUCHARIST

I received this article, title above, from a long time Parishioner here at St Mel's and found this a good read and thought it may be of interest to some of you also. I am sharing this article over a few weeks in the bulletin. Below is part two:

The original sin of the church, clericalism, emerges when those called to minister the sacraments begin to believe that the sacraments belong to them, or are a product of their special power as God's chosen vessels. In such cases, instead of being a servant at the table of the Lord, the ordained minister begins to act like he is the host, empowered to set up criteria of reception not present in the example of Christ. The Eucharist itself, the mystery of Christ's presence given to the people of God, becomes a tool to be used according to the discretion of the ruling cleric. In such times, access to the sacrament is denied or granted, not according to the conscience by which God speaks to the heart of the individual, but according to the power of the clerical authority.

Such a vision is contrary to the practice of Jesus in the New Testament and to the notion of ministry exemplified in the early church. Far from being the gatekeepers of the Eucharist, the ordained are called to help the gift of the Eucharist become fully visible for God's people by welcoming and inviting all people in imitation of Christ. In this role, one might well quote St. Paul: "It is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me" (Gal 2:20). As Pope Francis reminds us, such ministry should inspire humility in all those called as pastors, for the gifts we minister do not belong to us. It is not by our goodness that the table is set, not by our power that the common elements of bread and wine become vessels of grace and divine presence, not by our virtue that the spirit of God moves in the hearts of believers. All of these are the work of Christ, through his body the church. (To be continued...)

The last census had some 116,000 people across Australia classified as homeless with the fastest growing group being women over 55 years of age. A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming to his death.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

They all ate and were filled.

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.
