This meant that we had to work together as a team of three to make sure you got up the whole way. This activity was exhausting and took about two hours to get our four teams up the ladder.

Then we went back to our campsite to pack up our tents. At the camp office headquarters, we joined with the other four houses and had a burger for lunch. We thanked our hosts, camp instructors and our teachers and then headed back to school on the buses feeling tired but having had loads of fun and learning new skills.
