Focus on the Readings

The reading from the Book of Deuteronomy is a reflection or meditation on the presence and power of God from creation to the time of the Exodus. He is God in heaven and God on Earth. The people began to experience the nearness of God. They became familiar with his ways. He was their protection and their provider. As we listen to this reading at Mass or later we gain a sense of the work, life and love of the Trinity.

The second reading builds on this foundational experience of God. We are children of God (RNJB translation) able to call God, "Abba, Father" as Jesus taught.

The Gospel of Matthew's is the account of the commissioning of the Apostles and Jesus' ascension. The Trinity is explicitly named as Father, Son and Holy Spirit — not as a theological formula but as the direction of the Apostles' preaching and celebration of sacraments. Children learn the sign of the cross and the name of the Trinity well before they come to understand. May our experiences and meditation of the mystery of God lead us to deeper living out of our love and commitment to God and neighbour.

Gospel Acclamation (cf Revelation 1:8)

Glory to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit: to God who is, who was, and who is to come.

Quote of the Day

The Church announces the good tidings of salvation to those who do not believe, so that all may know the true God and Jesus Christ whom He has sent, and may be converted from their ways, doing penance. To believers also the Church must ever preach faith and penance, she must prepare them for the sacraments, teach them to observe all that Christ has commanded and invite them to all the works of charity, piety, and the apostolate. For all these works make it clear that Christ's faithful, though not of this world, are to be the light of the world and to glorify the Father before men and women. (Constitution on the Liturgy art. 9)

Liturgical Jottings Canonicity, Authenticity and Inspiration II

With the books in the Bible, "canonicity" and "inspiration" go hand in hand. All these books are "canonical" and they alone are "inspired." This is what faith attributes to them. This is why the establishment of the "canon" 2 the list 2 of books in the Scriptures, is given to the Church by tradition (Vatican II, Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, 8). The Council of Trent, in its fourth session (1546), "judged it proper" to promulgate such a list. The authenticity of a book or part of a book is the object of external criticism (what tradition says about it) and internal (an examination of the book itself). The question of authenticity affects many other works:, documents, writings, works of art and music.

Weekly Reflection - Discovering the Heart of God

Figures such as Buddha, Zoroaster, Plato, and Aristotle dedicated themselves to exploring the nature of God from an external standpoint, and their insights yielded valuable truths.

For many years, people in the Diocese of Sandhurst have been saving their used postage stamps and sending them to Sr Ursula, a Mercy sister.

The Mercy Sisters then sell the donated stamps and use the proceeds to fund their Mercy Works projects. For example, buying basic toiletries for women in prison in Papua New Guinea or school supplies for children in Timor.

We recently sent 5 parcels of stamps to Sr Ursula's group and so far over \$5,000 has been raised from this and has been sent to a very vulnerable group of people who live unsupported in West Papua.

Sr Ursula wants parishioners to know how much good has come from donating their used stamps and asked that we keep on saving our old stamps, they can be given to your local parish, who will pass them on to the Mercy Sisters, via the Chancery.


