# NASCA 30th Birthday Anniversary

On Friday, 17th October 2025, NASCA commemorated an incredible milestone, 30 years of empowering Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander youth, with a vibrant celebration held at the National Centre of Indigenous Excellence (NCIE) in Redfern. The event brought together communities, schools, artists, and leaders from across NSW to honour NASCA's legacy and ongoing impact.

Among the proud participants were students from Kempsey High School and Melville High School, who were invited to perform a traditional dance as part of the event's Welcome Ceremony. Their performance was a powerful tribute to culture and connection, and set a respectful and joyful tone for the day's festivities. It was a moment of pride for both schools, showcasing the talent and spirit of their students on a big stage.

One of the standout contributors was Lailah-Jayde Luckett, a proud Aboriginal artist whose work was featured at the event. Her artwork, rich in cultural symbolism and storytelling, drew admiration from attendees and sparked conversations. Lailah-Jayde's display not only gave her greater exposure but also led to the sale of several pieces, a testament to the power of art in connecting people and sharing culture. Her presence added a beautiful visual layer to the celebration.

The event also hosted a thrilling Traditional Indigenous Games (TIG) tournament, which brought together students from various schools to compete in a series of culturally significant games. Representing Kempsey High School, Khloe and Savannah showcased incredible skill, teamwork, and determination throughout the competition. Their efforts culminated in a grand final victory, earning them the title of tournament champions. Their win was celebrated not just as a sporting achievement, but as a moment of pride for their school and community.

NASCA's 30th anniversary celebration was more than just an event, it was a powerful reminder of the strength, resilience, and creativity of Indigenous youth. From dance and art to sport and storytelling, the day was filled with moments that honoured tradition while looking boldly toward the future.









## **Morning Session**

Our Term 4 Morning Fitness Program was a huge success. We consistently had around eight girls joining us each week, which was a huge improvement from the early days in Term 1 when we sometimes had as few as two.

The girls embraced the early starts and began our morning with a walk around the oval, followed by a game of basketball or footy, before heading back to school to enjoy a delicious breakfast together.

It has been a great way to build routine, connection and confidence, and we are so proud of how far our students have come!



## **Afternoon Activity**

Term 4's Afternoon Activity was the Decorating Committee. The Decorating Committee met regularly to plan and create decorations for the Kempsey High School NASCA Awards Night. Over the term, students worked together to choose a colour scheme and design the table centrepieces, cupcake stand, invitations, certificates, and slideshow. Everyone had the chance to share ideas, be creative, and help make decisions as a group.

Students enjoyed the hands on activities and took pride in seeing their designs come to life. The committee showed great teamwork and effort, and their decorations helped set the mood for a fun, welcoming, and memorable night. It was rewarding for students to see how their work contributed to a successful school event and to be part of something special.





## Sista Speak

Our Sista Speak program brought together an amazing group of girls who had the chance to get out on Country and really connect with culture, community, and each other. Trips to South West Rocks and Crescent Head gave the girls time to slow down, enjoy the land, and feel a real connection to the places around them. Being on Country helped them understand why these areas are so important and gave them a sense of belonging and pride in their culture.

Spending time with our Elders on Country was a really special part of the program. The Elders shared their stories, knowledge, and life experiences, creating moments that were powerful, moving, and full of meaning. Sitting, listening, and learning from Elders helped the girls reflect on their identity, culture, and the importance of walking proudly in who they are.

The program also helped build strong friendships and a sense of sisterhood within the group. The girls supported each other, shared plenty of laughs, and showed leadership during different activities. They tried weaving, painting, and even football, always ready to have a go at something new. Being on Country made these experiences even more special, as they could connect creativity and learning to the land around them.

The girls also worked together to plan next year's Sista Speak program, sharing ideas, setting goals, and talking about what they want the future of the program to look like. They even designed a logo and symbol to represent their shared identity, pride, and connection to Country.

Overall, Sista Speak was about so much more than just trips and activities. It was a space to grow, connect, and feel proud of who they are. The girls finished the program with stronger friendships, deeper cultural knowledge, and memories of being on Country that will stay with them for years to come. It was a truly special experience for everyone involved.






## **KHS NASCA Awards**
