I had these ideas because I was reflecting on my own experience and what I wished for myself but I wasn't sure if anyone would listen. I shared them with Mr Andrew Osnain and others, he was the one who championed my cause. My ideas led to something really big for me - I had the honour of becoming the first - and hopefully not the last - Mary Ward Ambassador.

To me it signified representation, inclusion, leadership opportunities, leadership training and last but not least, student-led initiatives in this area.

I really hope that there will be another Mary Ward Ambassador. The next one may be a Mary Ward student or it could be someone with 'lived experience' of disability - one example might be a sibling of someone with a disability.

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Now to introduce our two guest speakers. I have several things in common with both Ben and Poppy. Like Ben, my potential was seen by others as being more limited than it really was. When that happens, you run the risk of questioning your own potential. I didn't know if I would achieve WACE, or succeed at Certs, or get into Uni. I'm so happy I did it all.

Ben Popham is a Curtin University student and is here now as an educator. He has many other achievements under his belt... also around his neck in the form of medals. He is a world record holder too. At the Tokyo Paralympics he received 2 gold medals and 1 silver in Swimming. It was

mainly because of that amazing achievement that Ben was chosen for an OAM - the Medal of the Order of Australia.
