

Functional & Comforting: Ms Thornton and Food By Zach Servadei

Each edition, Zach Servadei asks Glen Eira teachers the 'hard' questions by rolling a die. The number they land on is the topic they're given. This edition, he chats with our College's new principal Ms Thornton, a fan of popcorn and Lindt dark chocolate, about everything food.

"Lindt dark chocolate [is one of my guilty pleasures]," she tells me excitedly. And we can all agree there's nothing on earth better than a block of Lindt.

AS A KID, Ms Thornton was a sweet tooth, and it's clear where her liking for Lindt came from. "When I was young, I used to like birthday cake," she recalls fondly. "[Or] the strawberry donut with the icing." Whether you're pro-glazed or profilled, strawberry is unarguably a delicious flavour. Another favourite of hers is "popcorn lightly salted... [and] slightly sweet" because of the "crunch" and "saltiness". I agree: like strawberry donuts, a sweet-salty combination of popcorn is irresistible, as is that satisfying crunch of the kernels. But when it comes to drinks, Ms Thornton enjoys life's simple pleasures. "I drink a lot of tea, like turmeric and T2. That's my favourite." I say you can't go wrong with a peppermint cuppa.

HOWEVER, FOR MS THORNTON, food is not just a matter of taste, but also of nutrition. As a student of PE/Health, and teacher of Health & Human Development, she was

She also "played a lot of sports" like "martial arts" and "basketball", which meant food was largely "functional".






Celebrating the Release of Deltarune Chapter 3 & 4 Artwork by Jana Agpoon
