

We caught up with mural artist Brad Collings and asked him a few questions regarding his art and his past work. Brad is well known for allowing students and young people of the community to assist him with his art, which is often colourful and very creative.

Displayed to the left are just three of his artworks I took interest in. The first has a soldier's silhouette in the foreground with a sunset in the background. This piece is done in Mount Evelyn where the community goes for remembrance of the soldiers.



The second artwork is called "kings of the mountain", which is a karting madnesstributepiecenearChirnside park. It's along the Maroondah highway, in the go-kart track. The last piece has a desert stretching across a long horizontal landscape. Two camels are in the far left corner of the painting, and a small structure sits in the distance.

An important aspect for an artist to have is inspiration. For Brad, inspiration is found everywhere. His current work of art, The WW1 mural (located at our school near the administration office), has had great inspiration from a number of places and objects such as; The Shrine of Remembrance, other artworks and speaking with members of the community (eg. the RSL). The WW1 mural has been heavily influenced by the book "A stretcher Bearer".

It may be easy to believe that Brad has been an artist forever, but he hasn't. He has taught VCAL, art, and has worked at a community house, just to name a few. Brad has been painting for a long time, but he has been doing a number of other jobs throughout his life. Brad was asked what he has done other than art, and he had replied with multiple jobs.He said that he was a youth worker, that he worked in mental health, and that he has also been doing murals for communities from 12 months to full time. Brad informed us that he's been drawing or painting for as long as he can remember. "I've been drawing since crayons." He says.

Brad was also asked what materials he uses, and he said that he almost always uses what's called Spray paint 94's, which is a spray paint found in the city, that Brad is more than happy to use. Brad also uses oil, but he prefers not to. He also stated that he uses Masks, extra clothing, personal protective equipment and gloves to help protect himself from the chemicals in everything he uses.

The artist paints to allow young people to create and leave a positive mark, to inspire, and to link teens to their community. Brad has been working for the benefit of young people for 10 years, doing artwork to inspire and lift people's spirits. He also said that his favourite piece of his own at the moment is the "kings of the mountain", although it's constantly changing.
