#### INTRODUCTION

Despite Covid 19, 2020 was a year of excellent development in many aspects of the Magis Program. A major highlight was the enormous success of the new Magis House Academic Challenge Program, which saw students from years 7-12 representing their houses in a series of five challenges - Mental Maths, Academic Spelling, Arts/HASS, STEM, and Language/Literature. About 50 students from each year group competed in the program, with years 11 and 12 setting a wonderful example. This program is expected to develop further

Outstanding new gifted and talented competitions in 2020 included Ethics Olympiad, Global Goals Challenge and International debating, whilst Drone Club, Astronomy Club, Tournamemnt of Minds and Mock Trials were alligned to the Magis Program. In 2021 the aim is to participate further in several of these programs, whilst welcoming the return of some of our key events like WADL Debating, World Scholar's Cup and Da Vinci Decathlon which were missing in 2020.

This year there will be a special focus and Magis Leadership, and it is exciting that we have a team of 10 wonderful Year 12 students as key leaders in 2021, with the appointment of the 6 Magis House captains, plus the new role of Magis Secretary.

A new Magis Leadership Camp will be held in term one at Point Walter for Magis leaders and other interested students, whilst a Rottnest Enrichment Camp will be held in term two, and the popular Magis Middle School camp in term 3.

#### 2020 ATAR RESULTS

John XXIII excelled in the 2020 ATAR tables, finishing 8th in WA with an average of 89.50. Magis students actively involved in year 11/12 averaged over 94.

#### **MAGIS CAPTAIN**

Reports on Magis events at Secondary assemblies and Year 12 Assemblies, chairs parts of Magis Committee meetings, chairs Magis Awards Presentations and some Magis Breakfast seminars, provides leadership on Magis camps, writes a report for the John XXIII Yearbook and the Magis Chronicle, works with the Magis coordinator and Magis leaders to enure that the program achieves an exemplary standard of excellence.

#### **MAGIS SECRETARY**

### MAGIS CHAMPION SCHOLAR AWARD 2021

The Magis Champion Scholar Awards overall academic excellence, gifted and talented competition results at each year level, service, and involvement in the program.

The points system includes points for the following;

- 1. Academic Performance based on your semester one report (100 points)
- 2. Partcipation in up to three interschool **gifted and talented competitions** such as WADL Debating, Da Vinci Decathlon, Tim Winton Award etc (Max. 50 points each) (Note: Max. 2 in years 11/12)
- Participation in up to three Magis House Academic Challenges (Max. 30 points each)
- 4. Performance in up to 3 **John XXIII Competitions** run by Magis (Magis Public speaking Creative Writing or Chess) or learning areas within the school such as the Atticus Finch Award (Max. 40 points each)
- 5. Special Sections performance in up to 2 (30 points each
  - A. Goal-setting Challenge with Strategic Plan for academic success
  - B. Academic Journal kept for at least one term
  - C. **Academic service** including speaking at events such as a Magis Camp or Breakfast, coaching a team of younger students, or judging in events such as Creative writing or Public Speaking.
- 6. Attendance at least one Magis event for the year (25 points) eg Magis Camp, Seminar Breakfast, TED-X Talk, Bell Shakespeare etc

#### **CHAMPION SCHOLAR AWARDS**

You may participate in as many events as you wish and can receive separate prizes, trophies or certificates for these, but the final winners will be determined by:

**Seniors (Year 10-12) Best 6 scores** which must include your school academic result and at least one house academic challenge score plus the automatic 25 points for attendance at at least one Magis event for the year as listed above.

**Juniors (Year 7-9) Best 7 scores** which must include your school academic result and at least one house academic challenge score plus the automatic 25 points for attendance at at least one Magis event for the year as listed above.

#### **OTHER AWARDS**

Certificates are presented for top three performers in each section of the House Challenges at each year level. There are trophies and medals for the top aggregates for each year over the series of 5 house challenges. There are also major prizes, trophies or certificates for all interschool competitions plus the John XXIII Public Speaking, Creative Writing and Chess.

## INTERSCHOOL GIFTED & TALENTED COMPETITIONS

### WADL SCHOOLS DEBATING







John XXIII College will compete in the WADL Competition on Tuesday evenings at Christchurch Grammar School in 2021. We expect to field between one and five teams at each year level from year 7 to 12. Each team will have a Coach/Manager - either teachers, past students or current seniors (with teachers as managers where a current student is coaching. In years 7-9 all debates will be prepared, whilst in years 10-12 there will be two prepared and four impromptu debates. See the JTC DEBATING HANDBOOK for full details. This will be circulated once teams and fixtures are finalised. There will be trophies for top debaters in each year.

Six rounds plus finals this year, with round one expected to be on **Tuesday March 16** and round six on **Tuesday June 22.** Finals will be in term threee.

Practice sessions are held for three weeks prior to round one, and then in the week prior to each round. These normally last for about 75-90 minutes and may be held before or after school at times convenient to each team. There will also be a seminar breakfast at the college run by WADL



## INTERSCHOOL GIFTED & TALENTED COMPETITIONS

## CREATIVE EDGE CHALLENGE







The Creative Edge Challenge events are held each year at Curtin University.

They involve challenges similar to Tournament of Minds and Optiminds, and are designed for teams of 4-8 students.

The Senior Creative Edge Challenge event is ideal for the older students as it involves no prior preparation and is completed in one Saturday morning at Curtin University. John XXIII were senior WA Champions in 2018. Our year 8 team finished 3rd in Literature and Communication in 2020 The junior challenge involves a **6-week challenge in term three.** Teams choose one of the following

Science-Engineering Humanities Literature & Communication

2021 Dates: Seniors: Sat. March 27 Juniors: August 28

The Junior event for year 7-9 teams is held at Curtin University and includes a Spontaneous Challenge

#### WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP

The World Scholar's Cup, like other programs including Da Vinci Decathlon and WADL Debating, did not run in 2020, and is very doubtful for 2021. It is hoped however that regional and Global rounds may be able to be held in Australia in semester two, 2021.

The competition involves teams of three from any year group from year 7-11.

There are four sections in World Scholar's Cup:

Scholar's Bowl, Collaborative Writing, Scholar's Challenge and Team Debate. A JTC Scholar's Cup Guide Book will be produced if the competition goes ahead in 2021

The 2021 theme will be A World Renewed.

John XXIII competed in the Global rounds in Melbourne (2018) and Sydney (2019) and at the Tournament of Champions at Yale, USA in both 2018 and 2019.







#### **TOURNAMENT OF MINDS**



Tournament of Minds is a problem-solving program for secondary and primary teams. Teams have six weeks to solve open-ended challenges from the following disciplines:

#### ARTS STEM LANGUAGE-LITERATURE SOCIAL SCIENCES

Teams of 7 students must come from at least two year groups (Years 7-12) and must include two year 7 students.

On Tournament day students must also complete an unseen spontaneous challenge

Dates and further information will become available early in term one.



#### ETHICS OLYMPIAD

John XXIII intends to field two teams in the 2021 Junior (Years 7-9) Ethics Olympiad scheduled to be held in November. The program aims to assist students to develop skills in critical thinking, collaboration and communication.

Student teams consist of 5 students and they participate on the day in 4 Ethics Olympiad heats - dealing with the 8 current ethical cases students prepare arguments for prior to the event.

**EVENT DATE: Early November TBA Competition is via zoom.** It is an all-daty event held at school.


Winning teams have the opportunity to compete at National and Internation Level via zoom





### **MOCK TRIALS**







The Mock Trials competition is for Politics and Law students in years 11 and 12. The competition takes place at the Western Australian Supreme Courts on Wednesday evenings in terms two and three.

John XXIII won all three Mock Trials in 2020, finishing fourth in WA on percentages.

#### CATHOLIC SCHOOLS' MOOTING

The University of Notre Dame is expected to offer the Secondary Schools' Mooting competition in 2021. The Program is for senior Politics and Law students, and is likerly to run in first term. Teams consist of four students.

#### JESUIT NATIONAL DEBATING







John XXIII will send a team of four to the 2021 Jesuit National Debating Championships in Sydney during the second term holidays, depending on the situation with COVID. Students are billetted with families from the host college, and compete against teams from other Jesuit Schools from around Australia. This is a four day tour with 3 debates of debates and functions.

Debates are impromtu with 45-60 minutes' preparation time, and each school has four debates. The John XXIIII team will consist of students from years 11 and 12 only.

Speaking times are 6-8 minutes with a warning bell at 6 minutes.



## INTERNATIONAL DEBATING

John XXIII College will field up to four teams from years 7 to 10 in the International Debating competition in term four, 2021. The competition involves most Australia states, New Zealand, Canada and several Asian countries including Singapore, China and Malaysia. Debates are impromptu with 45 minutes' preparation time and are held on Frioday afternoons from 3.30-5.00pm via Zoom (irrespective of COVID).

Interschool debaters and other interested students are encouraged to participate. This is a prestigious competition and an ideal way to develop your debating skills.

A Trophy will be presented to the top student in each year group, and special certificates to all who participate Speaking times are 3-5 minutes, and there are no points of information.





#### **BRITISH PARLIAMENTARY DEBATING**







In term three he Western Australian Debating League runs an exciting program British Parliamentary Debating, which will suit interschool debaters and students of Politics and Law. The competition is held on Saturdays and Sundays, and each team participates for one full day.

Four teams participate in any one debate, with two schools on the Government side and two the opposition. Full details will be in the **John XXIII British Parliamentary Debating handbook.** 

Teams consisting of two speakers can be nominated from any year level from year 7-12. In 2020 we fielded five teams - two from year 12, and one team each from years 8, 10 and 11.



#### SLEEK GEEK EUREKA SCIENCE COMPETITION

The Sleek Geek Eureka Prize is an opportunity for students to showcase their passion for science and filmmaking. Students are encouraged to prepare a 2-minute video that communicates a scientific concept in an interesting, fun, and accessible manner. The theme for the competition this year is "Big". Students can compete individually or in teams.

So if you are a budding filmmaker and/or really keen on exploring "Big" scientific concepts this may be the competition for you!

#### THE TIM WINTON AWARD

If your story is handwritten you can submit the physical copy, together with your printed confirmation of entry to Subiaco Library in person or via post. If you have a digital copy of your story you can submit it online during the online entry process.



## DOROTHEA MACKELLAR POETRY AWARD

The Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Awards seek to capture the imaginations of school students across Australia, inspiring them to express their thoughts and feelings through the medium of poetry in their pursuit of literary excellence.

The competition opens on the first day of March and ends on the last day of June each year.

Award categories include lower and upper primary as well as junior and senior secondary students. This year's theme is to be announced.

#### HOUSE CHAMPIONSHIP - MAGIS SECTION

The Magis House Academic Championship consists of a total of 8 events open to students of all years from 7-12:

The **5 Academic Challenges** listed on the next page which are held in the GBLT during homeroom (15 minutes). Each Challenge consists of 30 questions. There are 3 divisions each with questions differing slightly in terms of degree of difficulty: Years 11/12 Years 9/10 and Years 7/8

The 3 John XXIII College Championships run by Magis:

Public Speaking Creative writing (Short Stories) Chess

Points for the five academic challenges and three John XXII College Competitions are based on the following points system at each year level:

First place 10 points Second Place 8 points Third Place 6 points Fourth Place 4 points Fifth place: 3 points Sixth place 2 points All other entrants up to the maximum allowed: 1 point

Please note that multiple students can receive the same points for a particular place/score. For instance in some 2020 competitions there were three equal top scores - each would receive 10 points and three equal 4th highest score would all receive 4 points. Overall scores are scaled/modified.

Any number of students may enter for the 5 Academic Challenges, Creative Writing and Chess but only the top 6 in any house for any year group will count for house points. Only 12 (2 per house) can compete at each year level for Public Speaking with the top 3 overall going into the night Grandfinal.

The House Academic Challenge Program consists of a series of five challenges listed below. Challenges take place in the GBLT during homeroom time (15 minutes). There are three divisions with slightly different questions reflecting the age of contests.

The John XXIII Chess Championship, run by Magis, is open to all students from year 7-12 and is part of the Academic House competition. Up to 6 students from each house may nominate from each year group, and the competition is run on a knockout basis. Most games are played in the library, at lunchtime, but opponents may play anywhere, anytime by arrangement, within the 3 days allowed for each round to be completed.

## MAGIS GOAL-SETTING CHALLENGE (optional)

The Magis Goal-setting challenge counts for 30 points for the Magis Champion Scholar Award and is considered a very important brief task for Magis students. There are two sections:

- 1. Goal-setting where students are required to set SMART Goals for themselves in academic pursuits plus a range of other personal goals
- 2. Students must also create a strategic plan for academic success.

Articles on both goal-setting and strageic plans are in the Magis Resources handbook and Resources folder and entries should be informed by these.

## ACADEMIC JOURNAL (Optional)- 30 points)

Students keep an academic journal for a minimum of 8 weeks/1 term. Hard copy journals are available or these may be completed online. Instructions are in the booklet and articles to assist are in Magis Resources









#### PERSONAL PROJECTS

The year 7 and 8 Magis option classes complete an International Baccalaureate-style Personal Project as part of their assessment. Students have about 15 weeks to complete the program. Class time is allocated for work on the projects, but depending on the nature of the task, many students complete a large part of it at home.

Students may choose a project topic of their choice, and we have seen art, pottery, drones, trebuchets, light sabres, books of poems or short stories, family histories, glossy picture books, projects on history, astronomy, mythology, nature, fancy dresses and other clothes, powerpoints, sporting club histories, some great recipes and foods, and various powerponts and videos created over the years - to name just a few.

One of the key aspects of the Personal Project is the process journal which requires the students to plan their project carefully, organise timelines and purchases, and constantly reflect on their work, tweaking it to gain their best possible results. The process journal is an important part of the assessment.




