We hope that you have all had a great start to 2018! This newsletter will provide you with some key dates for upcoming events. It will also have information about our next focus areas in the classroom, for Maths, Literacy and our Unit of Inquiry. As we have just wrapped up our Natural Disaster unit, we are looking forward to beginning our Australian History unit. This unit will inquire into significant events and people in Australian history. It will involve us learning about the perspectives and experiences of diverse people, during significant periods of time. Students will develop their skills in research during this unit, and have the opportunity to interact with primary and secondary sources to support their learning. Our Year 5 Camp, to Sovereign Hill, will link into this unit, and provide students with valuable learning experiences to support our classroom learning.

We have worked on our Narrative Writing over the past couple of weeks. During this time, we have developed our use of language features in narratives, including using descriptive language, metaphors and similes. We are working on our abilities to "show, not tell" in our writing. Moving forward, we are exploring the structural and language features of persuasive texts. In Reading, we are using several reading strategies, with a focus on practicing our inferring and predicting skills, and looking for literal and inferential meaning in fiction and non-fiction texts.

The Year 5 students have been studying Place Value since the start of Term One, which has encompassed number patterns, rounding, using decimal numbers, and use of number lines. We are moving onto our Addition unit next, exploring both number equations and worded problems.

Unit of Inquiry

<u>Transdisciplinary Theme:</u> Where we are in place and time

An inquiry into orientation in place and time; personal histories; homes and journeys; the discoveries, explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationships between and the interconnectedness of individuals and civilizations, from local and global perspectives.

<u>Central Idea</u>

Significant people and events, help shape a nation.

Lines of Inquiry:

- Causes and effects of the formation colonies

- Significance of an event that, or person who, influenced change in society

- The different experiences and perspectives of people throughout history

<u>Concepts we will consider during</u> <u>this unit of inquiry:</u> Change, Causation, Perspective

Related Concepts:

Chronology History Settlements



The skills and attributes this unit of inquiry will help us to develop:

Research Skills, Social Skills, Thinking Skills

<u>Research Skills</u> - Students will <u>collect</u>, <u>organise</u>, <u>interpret</u> and <u>present</u> research findings to effectively use data to develop their knowledge of emotions, conflict resolution and wellbeing.

<u>Social Skills</u> - students will develop an understanding of the impact their decisions and behaviours have on others. They will develop their <u>responsibility</u> and learn <u>co-operatively</u> to ensure positive learning outcomes and personal wellbeing. They will understand that fairness is all students getting what they need and <u>respect</u> that they may not all get the same thing. Students will learn and apply a range of strategies to recognise and manage their emotions to avoid or <u>resolve conflict</u>.

<u>Thinking Skills</u> - Students will acquire knowledge of: emotional literacy, a range of strategies for managing emotions and how relationships are affected by behaviour and neuroplasticity. They will conduct inquiries and <u>analyse</u>, <u>synthesise</u> and <u>evaluate</u> data to <u>comprehend</u> the relationship between their emotions, behaviours, relationships and personal identity.
