The [Australian Tertiary Admission Rank](#) (ATAR) is just one way Universities select students for their courses. Most Universities offer alternative entry pathways for people who:

- didn't get the ATAR needed for standard admission.
- didn't get an ATAR at all.

Perhaps your education was disrupted, your family circumstances and responsibilities reduced the amount of time you could dedicate to study, you chose subjects that meant you were ineligible for an ATAR or your ATAR was not competitive enough. Whatever the case, there are other ways you can apply for university.

National Awards for Disability Leadership nominations now open

National Awards for Disability Leadership nominations are now open and close on 17 October. They recognise outstanding achievements by individuals, or disabled people's organisations, that have significantly contributed to advancing the status of disabled people. Disability leaders will be acknowledged across seven categories reflecting the diversity of this community and the intersectional* nature of their lives in:

1. The Arts – advancing the status of disabled people through artistic expression.
2. Change Making – achieving greater equality for disabled people by changing policy, programs or legislation.
3. Rights Activism – advancing the status of disabled people by using human rights mechanisms including the *Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities*.
4. Innovation – achieving outcomes to the status of disabled people by working outside the box, developing new systems, technology and/or tools.
5. Social Impact – achieving visibility of disabled people by using mainstream or social media or other digital interfaces.
6. Inclusion – illustrating the intersectional diversity of disabled people by designing processes, systems or programs.
7. The Lesley Hall Award for Lifetime Achievement – awarded to an individual who has shown commitment to the disability rights movement and worked overtime to achieve significant outcomes for disabled people.

Financial Assistance & Scholarships



Commonwealth Prac Payment (CPP)

The Commonwealth Prac Payment (CPP) will provide eligible domestic students access to \$331.65 per week (benchmarked to the single Austudy rate) while they are undertaking a mandatory placement in a Bachelor's or Master's in teaching, nursing, midwifery or social work degree or a Diploma of Nursing. Financial help if you're 24 or younger and a student or Australian Apprentice

Youth Allowance is a financial payment from the Australian Government to support students and Australian apprentices while they gain their qualifications. To get this, you must be one of the following:

- 18 to 24 and studying full time
- 16 to 17, studying full time and either independent or needing to live away from home to study
- 16 to 17, studying full time and have completed Year 12 or equivalent
- 16 to 24 and doing a full time Australian Apprenticeship.

Rent Assistance

Tertiary students who are receiving Youth Allowance, Austudy and/or Abstudy and are paying rent or board while studying may also be able to receive rent assistance. You do not need to make a separate claim as you will automatically be assessed on whether you are eligible to receive Rent Assistance payments. The amount you receive depends on the type and amount of rent you pay and your living arrangements (whether you share accommodation with others, for example). How to start a conversation at Open Day

The following will give you some ideas when you are speaking with university staff and students. When you have some key questions, it's not difficult talking with someone you don't know.

What to do on the day

In and amongst the freebies, food and entertainment, there are a few key things you should do on the day.

- Take a tour of the campus and facilities
- Collect brochures, course guides and other useful information for further reading
- Talk to students and staff and ask plenty of questions
- Attend information sessions for courses or faculties of interest

Key questions to ask staff and students about courses

- What are the entry requirements? Are there any prerequisite subjects or additional requirements (such as a portfolio or interview)?
- How much time can you expect to spend in classes each week? How many hours will need to be dedicated to study outside of class?
- What are the most common forms of assessment (for example: exams, group projects or essays)?
- Where are graduates of the course working now? What are some typical career paths?
- Are there opportunities for practical learning, work experience or internships?
- Are there any pathway options to help you gain entry to the course?
- Does the course offer a pathway to further study?
- Are double degrees available?
- Does the university have any industry connections in the field?
- How much choice is there in subject selection? Are there opportunities to study elective subjects?

Key questions to ask staff and students about the university

- What facilities are available on campus?
- What support services are offered to students?
- Are there accommodation options on campus or nearby?
- Does the university offer any scholarships?
- Does the university have any exchange agreements with institutions overseas?
- Does the university provide assistance with finding work after graduation?

Key questions to ask staff and students about student life

- What clubs and societies are on offer?
- Are there opportunities to socialise on campus?

- Is there a student union? What services and activities does the union coordinate?

Other things to consider

- **Getting there:** Is the campus easy to get to? Can you catch public transport? If you plan to drive, what are the parking options around the campus?
- **Accommodation:** For those planning on moving out of home to study, consider having a look around the local area for potential neighbourhoods to live in or take a tour of on-campus accommodation.
- **Facilities:** What facilities are available on and around campus? Look at food options, gyms, banks, medical centres, libraries and any other facilities you consider important. It's also worth investigating the practical facilities available for your course, such as laboratories and studios.

Are you studying the International Baccalaureate (IB) Studies

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme (DP) is a two year assessed senior secondary program that is offered throughout the world. QTAC Institutions can accept the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma as equivalent to an Australian Year 12 qualification. To facilitate comparisons for selection purposes, QTAC converts the IB Diploma score to a QTAC Selection Rank, similar to an ATAR.

IB Diploma results range between 24 and 45 and are mapped to an IB Admissions Score (IBAS) to allow IB Diploma students to be considered for tertiary places alongside their QCE counterparts. This ATAR-like rank is known as the National ATAR because it is a national conversion which combines student data gathered from across all states in Australia. This means that IB students can apply in any Australian state or territory with confidence about how their results compare to their peers who have completed state-based programs and received an ATAR. Changes to QTAC application fees

QTAC has changed their fees for 2025/6 applications. They have now introduced a cheaper Early Bird fee schedule. The \$70 Early Bird fee schedule closes on 30 September 2025. Applications from 1 October 2025 is \$150. You have 3 free changes to your course preferences included in your application fee. QTAC Updates

Key dates for 2025:

Tuesday 5 August 2025 - Opening of Admissions. You will be able to register for the ATAR Portal (apply to have QTAC calculate your ATAR). You will need to use a personal email address, your Learner Unique Identifier (LUI), Date of Birth (DOB) and full name (as on QCAA/School record). You will also be able to begin

your 2026 QTAC Application.

Thursday 18 December 2025 - QTAC will notify you of your ATAR at 9am via the ATAR Portal.

Rumours, Myths and legends from QTAC

Rumour: The Queensland ATAR can include other inputs like IB subjects, Music and Dance qualifications, Certificate I and II qualifications...

Reality: The ATAR only includes General subjects, Applied Subjects, Completed VET qualifications at Certificate III level and higher. The ATAR must include at least 4 General subjects.

Rumour: Some Mathematics subjects scale better for ATARs.

Reality: The difficulty of a subject has nothing to do with how well it will scale! How a subject scales is dependent on the achievement of students in all their subjects (including their Mathematics subject).

Rumour: It is possible to game the system to get the highest ATAR

Reality: The ATAR is entirely data driven. ATAR is a rank, so if a student's results place them in the top percentile, then they will get the top ATAR.

Myths and Legends: Can certain subjects like Physics increase a student's ATAR?

Reality: NO - A student can only maximise their ATAR by performing well in all their subjects.

Myth and Legends: What pattern of subjects will guarantee an ATAR of 99.95?

Reality: The ATAR is entirely data driven, so if a student's results place them in the top percentile, then they will get the top ATAR regardless of the subjects they do.

Myths and Legends: I will only get an ATAR if I apply to QTAC for tertiary entry.

Reality: No, QTAC will calculate an ATAR for all students who have qualified and registered for an ATAR, even if they are not applying for tertiary entry.

Myths and Legends: I will not qualify for an ATAR so higher education is closed off to me.

Reality: Some tertiary courses are accessible without a formal tertiary ranking like ATAR. There are other pathways to tertiary study, including via VET. Check with the institutions/Unis you are interested in to see what they pathway options are.

Term 3 - an important time for Year 12 students

Term 3 is very important and busy for Year 12 students. If you haven't already decided what you are going to do in 2026, this is the time to find out information about your options. The following is a selection of events and activities that will assist you with your decision-making.

QTAC Guide – You will receive your QTAC Guide usually, early in Term 3 or you can access/download it on the QTAC [website](#). It contains information about the application process and the courses you can apply for in 2026. *Don't lose this book as you may need it after you leave school to change course preferences on your QTAC application when Year 12 results are released and during QTAC offer rounds.* You need to regularly check the QTAC website to ensure the information is up to date as information can change throughout the year.

Institution open days - Most of the University open days occur in Term 3. Open days provide an opportunity to learn more about the institutions and courses you are interested in. Attend the Open Days and be prepared with questions for the representatives. See Open day dates on the QTAC [website](#) and in the *Open Day and Career Expos* section of the fortnightly Options' Bulletins.

QTAC applications open - QTAC applications for Semester 1 2026 courses open on 5 August 2025. Closing dates for some courses and some scholarship applications can vary so read your QTAC book carefully. You can find information about the application process and offer process in the guide and on the [QTAC website](#).

ATAR application portal - You need to apply to QTAC to get your ATAR calculated by them. The ATAR portal opens on 1 August. You will need your LUI number (Learning Unique Identifier)

Scholarships - Most university scholarship applications open in Term 3 and close in October, November or December. An exception is Bond University, which has its scholarship applications open now and each scholarship can have a different closing date. It is best to check the closing date on the Bond [website](#) under each scholarship entry. Every university has a scholarship section on its website. Find out the application process and due date early, to avoid missing out on a scholarship. If in doubt about your chances, apply anyway.

What senior subjects should you study to gain an excellent ATAR

Year 10 students and their parents often ask this question. The answer is, the subjects that you enjoy, have had past success in and meet any future tertiary course prerequisites. You want to get to the end of Year 12, receive your results and be able to say to yourself that they are the best results you could get while maintaining life balance and wellbeing. Your ATAR is just a tool used by QTAC for competitive entry into tertiary institution courses. It is NOT an indication of your 'intelligence' and future success and happiness in life.

Life skills are important!

Life skills are talked about a lot but not often explained. 'Life skills' is a term used to describe a set of basic skills acquired through learning and/or direct life experience that enable you to effectively handle issues and problems commonly encountered in daily life. The following are some ways that could help you recognise and develop your own set of life skills (source unknown):

1. **Building a Good Attitude:** Stay positive, hungry, humble and do whatever it takes.
2. **Taking Initiative:** If you're willing to go first, others will see you as a leader.
3. **Capturing Vision:** See the big picture and pursue something bigger than you.
4. **Communicating Effectively:** Understand that if listeners don't get it, you haven't communicated well.
5. **Teamwork:** To go faster, travel alone. To go further, learn to travel together.
6. **Creativity:** Learn the art of combining two existing ideas to generate a new one.
7. **Grit:** Resilience and work ethic can replace what you lack in talent or personality.
8. **Emotional Intelligence:** To connect with others, understand yourself and them.

9. **Resourcefulness:** Searching and finding new answers keeps you relevant.
10. **Critical Thinking:** Seeing all sides of an issue enables you to act intelligently.
11. **Problem-solving:** The best way to influence is to serve people and solve problems.
12. **Getting Over Yourself:** The clearest sign of maturity is focusing on others.

Mistakes that can lead to poor study habits

The following are some study tips that may assist you to study more effectively and avoid the 'big cram' just before exams ... and wouldn't that be a sweet spot! Although the article is written for Uni students, the tips are great for all students. Read through the tips below that can help you be organised and positive:

1. **The Marathon** - You find a comfortable spot to study and refuse to move ever again. You don't even think about taking a break as that would be a waste of time. Don't you know this assignment is due in 16 hours? Taking a short break is good for your body and excellent for your brain!
2. **The Full-Page Highlight** - You try to study by reading the textbook but somehow end up highlighting everything and remembering nothing. Highlight only the key words, NOT the 'key sentences'!
3. **The Multitasker** - You try to do work for all of your classes at the same time by constantly switching back and forth between assignments. This one is particularly common during finals. Plan a study schedule so that you move from subject to subject in an organised and timely way.
4. **The Media Frenzy** - You study while texting your friends, checking 10 different social media tabs, listening to loud music (or worse, watching Netflix) and looking at your phone every 5 seconds as it buzzes away on your desk. DON'T DO THIS! You end up not learning anything and even end up sending the wrong message to the wrong person!!!!
5. **The Solo Mission** - You only ever study in solitude and refuse to ask anyone else for help. Always remember: Team work makes the dream work - discussion helps the brain recall information.
6. **The Full-Out Panic** - You suddenly realise how much work you have to do and completely freak out, ripping up pages and curling into a ball under your desk. This gets you to a place that you don't want to be in ... trust me. Instead, stop, breath and take a 5 minute break. Come back and organise your thoughts and tasks then work through them methodically.

Why am I so tired you may ask!

Although we are all individuals, the article outlines some of the common reasons why young people can always feel tired and struggle to meet their family, school and work commitments. VET qualifications for tertiary selection

Successfully completed VET qualifications, at a certificate III level or higher, may be used for tertiary selection in two ways:

- an input into an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR), and/or
- a stand-alone qualification for tertiary admission at some universities (may apply to non-ATAR eligible applicants)

Education institutions may allocate a selection rank depending on the level of VET qualification completed. Additional entry requirements for Nursing and/or Midwifery

To enrol in Nursing and/or Midwifery at any university you must meet the following educational requirements:

- **English is your primary language** AND you have attended and satisfactorily completed at least six years of primary and secondary education taught and assessed solely in English.

At least two years of this education must have been between grades 7 and 12.

- You are already **registered with AHPRA** as an Enrolled Nurse (EN), Registered Nurse (RN), or Midwife.
- If you do not meet the above criteria you will need to sit an approved **English language proficiency test**.

If you do not meet these educational requirements, you are required to provide evidence of an acceptable English Language test. Click [here](#) for more information (Scroll down).

Assumed knowledge and prerequisites

You don't need to have studied specific subjects at school to apply for the majority of QUT's undergraduate courses. They assume you have a minimum level of knowledge in certain subject areas before you start your course which they call 'assumed knowledge'. You can still apply if you don't have the assumed knowledge for your course, but we strongly encourage you to undertake bridging courses to get the knowledge you'll need.

Some courses have prerequisite subjects instead of or in addition to, assumed knowledge. That means you must have studied and met the required grade in the required subjects to gain entry to these courses.
