Skills for Work

What's the difference between a reference and a referee?

If you're hunting for work, you've probably put together a resume to hand out to potential employers. One of the most important parts of the hiring process is the employer looking for information about you from other people. This is usually done through references and referees. But what are references and referees, and what's the difference?

Reference vs referee - the difference

A *referee* refers to an actual person - someone you'll put down on your resume who can vouch for your skills and effectiveness.

A reference is a written document or statement from a person you've worked for. It usually includes information about the kind of work you undertook and your skills and abilities. So someone may be willing to write up a reference for you, but that doesn't necessarily mean you also need to include them as a referee on your resume.

The purpose of references and referees is so employers can cross-check any information you've put on your resume to ensure you're not making anything up.

The benefit of references is that once you have one, you can use it over and over again without needing to worry about it changing. On the other hand, the benefit of referees is that they can potentially provide more relevant and up-to-date information.

Who can be a referee?

Your referees need to be people who know about your work experience and skills and are willing to vouch for you in a positive way.

Keep in mind you should never put your parents or friends down as references - employers will usually consider them as biased and unreliable. The best referees are people you know in a professional capacity, such as an employer or coworker. If you've never had a job before, you can include people like teachers, mentors, or coaches instead.

If you're going to add someone as a referee to your resume, make sure you let them know in advance. Not only is it the polite thing to do, it also means they can be prepared in case a potential employer calls them for information.

Ensure your referee details are always kept up to date - if an employer can't get in touch with your referees, this might affect your application.

Who can I get a reference from?

If you'd like to add some references to your resume, they don't just need to come from people you've been employed by.

If you're undertaking work experience, it's a good idea to ask if you can get a reference at the end of your placement. Or if you do any sort of volunteer work, this is great to get a reference for too.

If you have no work experience (either paid or unpaid), you can also ask for what's known as a <u>character reference</u>. Obviously this won't include any details of your work, but can tell a potential employer more about the type of person you are. These might come from people like teachers or coaches.

References are most credible if they're written or typed on a company letterhead, and also signed by the person who wrote the reference. Keep in mind that employers might contact the business or person you've received a reference from to make sure it's legit.

Kooth

<u>Kooth</u> is an online community for young people, designed to provide free, safe and anonymous support. You can find helpful articles, join discussions with the community, live chat with the Kooth team, and keep track of your emotions with a daily journal.

Smiling Mind

<u>Smiling Mind</u> is a mindfulness and meditation app, packed with a ton of exercises, including some designed especially for young people. The best part is it's totally free.

Catch It

<u>Catch It</u> is a diary app that lets you record your feelings, and encourages you to reflect on your mood and how you can change it.

Woebot

<u>Woebot</u> is an AI therapist you can chat with, who will offer you insights and guidance when you're struggling. Check-in with Woebot whenever you need, any time of the day or night.

Calm

voice (if that's the sort of thing you're into). Most of the content is behind a paywall, but there's some available for free too.

University

Early entry FAQs

We know that Year 12 is big - huge, in fact. You probably already have a lot on your plate, but have you thought about early entry? It's a pathway to university that could save you a whole lot of time and stress later in the year. If you have some frequently asked questions (FAQs) about early entry, we're here to provide you with all the answers.

What is early entry?

Some universities and Tertiary Admissions Centres (TACs) have programs in place that allow them to process applications for specific programs that allow offers to be issued before the main rounds begin after the academic year is over. By applying for one of these programs, you could receive an offer earlier than if you apply through the normal process, often before you've even sat your end of year exams.

It's a way to give you some peace of mind knowing you have a place secured at university next year and one less thing to stress about during exam time.

Who is eligible to apply for early entry?

Each program has it's own eligibility criteria, but here are some of the most common:

- Academic achievement
- Community involvement, e.g. volunteering
- Leadership roles, e.g. school leader, team captain
- Disadvantage consideration of factors that may have cause challenges to your studies during your final years e.g. financial, social, or physical

If there's a program you're really interested in applying for but you're unsure if you meet the criteria, it's definitely worth doing some more research. Get in touch with the university or TAC and ask what your options might be.

Which universities have early entry programs?

A lot of universities now provide early entry programs. Here's a list:

- Australian Catholic University: Opens 21 July 2025
- Australian National University: Opens 3 March 2025 and closes 15 May. Offers released 4 September.
- Avondale University: Opens 6 March and offers released from 2 September.

Don't see your chosen university on this list? You might like to contact them directly anyway and ask about their pathway options.

Note: many of these programs are still showing information from 2024, and it is up to the university whether they will be offered again in 2025. Dates, courses, and eligibility requirements are subject to change.

When can I expect to receive an early offer?

Each program is different; some of them might send you an offer within a couple of weeks of submitting your application, while for others you may need to wait until later in the year. But all of them will send out offers earlier than the normal application timeline.

However, in 2024 in Australia the <u>Universities Accord recommendation</u> was adopted that "university offers to secondary school students in 2025 and 2026 should not be issued before September in the preceding year."

When do applications open?

Some programs are opening now or very soon, and closing dates can come around as quick as the end of Term 2. So make sure that you carefully check the key dates for **all** the programs you're interested in to ensure you don't miss out.

What is a conditional offer?

If you receive an offer, be proud! It means that the university definitely sees your potential and thinks you'll be a great candidate to study with them. Usually, the offer you'll receive will be "conditional" – basically, this means it comes with conditions. For example, your offer might be conditional on you achieving a certain ATAR or completing specific subjects.

If you fail to meet the conditions of your offer, it might expire. But you can still always apply through the normal processes, as well as see what your alternative pathway options are.

What's the difference between guaranteed and conditional offers?

Guaranteed offers are much less common than conditional offers. As the name suggests, once you receive a guaranteed offer, your place at university is secured, no matter what. But do note that some conditions still apply in extreme circumstances (e.g. not finishing Year 12 may void your guaranteed offer). Make sure you thoroughly check the small print before accepting any offer.

What are the advantages of applying for early entry?

If you're still unsure about whether to apply, here are a few benefits to consider:

- Get the applications requirements out of the way now, instead of worrying about it when you're already busy with study
- Enjoy the security of knowing you already have an offer before going into exams
- Many programs have scholarships, bursaries, and other perks affiliated with them
- It can help you concentrate better on schoolwork later in the year
- You could get a head start on getting organised for life at university
- If you'll be moving away from home, you can get your accommodation applications in early
- You could save money, as the majority of early entry program applications are free (whereas TACs charge a fee for the application process)
- There's no commitment you don't have to accept any offers and can still apply through the traditional route later in the year

How many early entry programs can I apply for?

As long as you meet the eligibility criteria, you can apply for every early entry program on offer. There are no limits, and applying for one program will *never* make you ineligible for another.

What happens if I receive more than one early offer?

There is a chance you could receive multiple offers, and there's nothing wrong with that - it just broadens your choices. But you can only accept one of them. So think carefully before making any final decision, and of course don't forget to reply to your other offers with a 'no'.

What happens if I don't receive any early offers?

You might be disappointed if you don't receive an offer, but that's about as serious as it gets. You can still apply to the same university and course through the traditional application system later in the year.

On the bright side, now that you're familiar with the application process, you'll find it easier and quicker next time, and you'll probably have all the documentation you need already organised.

Early entry sounds great - what's next?

If you think you're ready, the last thing to do is apply.

Each program and university has their own processes and systems, so navigating it all can seem like a bit of a nightmare. That's why each we created the Early Entry Guide - it details all the different options available, eligibility criteria, important key dates and deadlines, and much more.

Career opportunities in medicine beyond being a doctor

If you're passionate about health and helping others, <u>becoming a doctor</u> is an incredible and rewarding career choice. But what if you don't get in on your first try? Or perhaps, you discover along the way that being a doctor isn't quite the path for you after all?

The good news is that the world of medicine and health is full of exciting career opportunities beyond the traditional doctor role. There are countless ways to get involved in healthcare and make a meaningful difference. In this blog, we'll highlight just a few of the alternative career pathways in medicine that you might want to consider.

Nursing

<u>Nurses</u> are at the heart of healthcare, providing direct care to patients, assisting with treatments, and being advocates for health and well-being. Whether you're interested in working in hospitals, clinics, or in the community, there are various specialties within nursing, including <u>midwifery</u>, paediatric, emergency, mental health, NICU, oncology, and surgical nursing - just to name a few.

With the flexibility of nursing, you can work in diverse settings and have plenty of career development opportunities, such as becoming a nurse practitioner or a clinical nurse specialist.

Physical Therapy

If you're interested in helping people recover from injuries, manage pain, or improve mobility, physiotherapy or occupational therapy could be the path for you. Physiotherapists work with patients to restore movement and function, often through exercise, massage, or other treatments. Qccupational therapists focus on helping people develop or regain the skills needed for daily activities, using adaptive techniques, exercises, and assistive devices. Both careers offer the opportunity to work directly with people and make a meaningful impact on their quality of life without pursuing a full medical degree.

Pharmacy

<u>Pharmacists</u> play a vital role in healthcare by ensuring patients receive the correct medications and advising them on how to use them safely. This is an excellent choice if you have an interest in drugs, their effects on the body, and providing personalised health advice.

Pharmacists work in hospitals, retail pharmacies, and even research settings, contributing to

You'll work with cutting-edge technology to analyse blood, urine, and tissue samples, helping doctors diagnose conditions and track patients' progress.

Health Administration and Management

Health <u>administrators</u> manage hospitals, clinics, or public health organisations, ensuring that everything runs smoothly. This role might appeal to you if you're interested in healthcare but are more drawn to organisational, <u>leadership</u>, and business tasks rather than direct patient care. Health administrators help streamline healthcare systems and improve patient outcomes by managing resources, <u>budgets</u>, and <u>staff</u>.

Speech Therapy

Speech-language pathologists (SLPs) work with patients who have speech, language, or swallowing disorders. If you have an interest in communication and enjoy working closely with individuals to make a significant difference in their lives, this could be a great option. You'll help people regain their ability to speak or swallow, often after an illness or injury.

Public Health and Epidemiology

Public health professionals focus on improving health on a larger scale. If you're passionate about preventing illness and improving health outcomes for entire populations, a career in public health might be right for you.

This could involve roles in epidemiology, health policy, environmental health, or health education. Epidemiologists, for example, study disease patterns and help control outbreaks.

Biomedical Science and Research

Biomedical scientists and researchers work in labs to understand diseases, develop new treatments, and advance medical knowledge. If you're more interested in discovering the science behind health conditions and exploring new ways to treat them, biomedical research is an exciting field with plenty of opportunities to make a real difference in medicine. Examples of careers in this field include <u>Computational Biology</u> and <u>Data Science</u>.

Radiography and Medical Imaging

Radiographers or medical imaging technologists use imaging technology, like X-rays, MRIs, and CT scans, to help doctors diagnose and monitor illnesses. If you have an interest in technology and enjoy working in a healthcare environment, this can be an exciting role that combines technical skills with patient care.

Dietetics and Nutrition

<u>Dietitians</u> and nutritionists work with patients to develop healthy eating plans, manage dietrelated health conditions, and promote overall well-being. If you have a passion for food and health and want to help others improve their lives through nutrition, this could be a career for you.

There are plenty of specialties within dietetics, including sports nutrition, paediatric nutrition, and clinical nutrition.

Alternative Therapies and Complementary Medicine

While traditional medicine plays a big role in healthcare, many people also look to alternative therapies, like acupuncture, massage therapy, or naturopathy, to support their well-being. If you're interested in holistic health practices, this could be a pathway for you to explore. Many practitioners work in <u>private settings</u> or as part of integrated healthcare teams.

Counselling is a professional field dedicated to helping individuals navigate through life's challenges and improve their overall wellbeing. Highly trained and compassionate counsellors provide a safe and supportive environment for clients to explore their thoughts, emotions, and behaviours.

This pathway might be right for you if you are interested in helping others navigate challenges and find solutions, enjoy listening and understanding, and want to make a positive impact on individuals' mental and emotional wellbeing.

What do careers in this pathway involve?

Counselling encompasses various specialties, such as mental health, marriage and family therapy, addiction counselling, and career counselling, ensuring individuals receive the specialised support they need to lead fulfilling lives.

The growing demand for counsellors means this pathway offers both job security and the opportunity to make a meaningful difference in people's lives.

What are some important human skills for this pathway?

- Social awareness
- Communication
- Collaboration
- Innovation
- Self-management

What are some of the tasks involved?

- Provide counselling services
- Develop treatment plans
- Monitor individual progress
- Collaborate with other health workers
- Prepare reports and evaluations
- Provide relevant advice
- Run group sessions
- Teach life skills
- Maintain client records

What kind of work environment and conditions can I expect?

Most counsellors work indoors in an office setting, such as in private practices, community health centres, schools, hospitals, or government agencies. Some counsellors also work remotely, offering telehealth services via video or phone.

While some positions follow standard business hours, many counsellors offer evening or weekend appointments to accommodate clients who work or study during the day.

The Clusters in counselling

Guardians

Guardians are common in this pathway, providing emotional and psychological support to individuals or groups.

Linkers

Linkers in this pathway are also vital, connecting clients with appropriate services and resources.

Coordinators

Coordinators manage counselling services, from scheduling to program development.

Informers

Informers in this pathway educate clients on coping strategies and mental health resources.

Makers

Makers are rare in this pathway, but may help to run one-on-one or group counselling sessions.

Innovators

Innovators in this pathway develop new counselling techniques or technologies for improved outcomes.

Where can a counselling pathway take me?

Interested in a career in counselling? There are many roles you might like to consider – here are just a few.

Entry level roles

These jobs can be started with little or no training or experience, and are great as a stepping stone towards more senior roles in the pathway.

Community Support Worker

Provide practical assistance and emotional support to vulnerable individuals in community settings.

Family Support Worker

Help families develop skills to overcome challenges and create safe, nurturing environments for children.

Youth Worker

Work with young people to develop their skills, address personal issues, and connect them with appropriate services.

Mid-level roles

Once you have some further study or experience under your belt, you might like to consider moving into one of these roles.

Careers Advisor

Provide guidance on education, training, and employment options to help people make informed career decisions.

Financial Counsellor

Help people manage financial difficulties and develop strategies for overcoming money problems.

Alcohol and Drugs Counsellor

Help people overcome substance dependency issues through specialised counselling techniques.

Senior level roles

These jobs will require extensive further education or many years of experience, but are also highly rewarding.

Psychotherapist

Provide in-depth therapy addressing underlying issues and patterns that affect mental health and relationships.

Family Dispute Resolution Practitioner

Help separating families resolve disputes and develop parenting arrangements outside of court.

Psychologist

Assess, diagnose, and treat mental health conditions using scientific methods and evidence-based approaches.

Provide therapeutic treatments and support to improve individuals' mental and physical wellbeing.
