

Stage 3 Overview Term 3-2023

Litteracy

Big Idea: Young Entrepreneurs



Students will spend the next 5 weeks of the term reading and writing a range of Persuasive texts as well as Poetry.

Students will:

- Learn the purpose, audience and message of a range of persuasive texts
- Engage in a variety of videos and online texts.
- Identify techniques authors use to persuade and entertain us.
- Create multiple persuasive texts for the Mini Fete such as: a letter, posters and banners.
- Reflect, edit, revise and self-asses their work.
- Explore indigenous poetry and stories 'We are going' Poem and 'Jandamarra' by Mark Greenwood.
- Write a poem of their own based on the story 'Black Cockatoo'.



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Students will

- Choose a young Australian entrepreneur and explore their impact in the community.
- Use a range of inquiry and investigative skills such as researching, team work, collaboration, perseverance, grit and curiosity.
- Create a poster, banner, stall layout, online page to present during the Mini Fete.


NUMERACY


Big Idea: Deepening Mathematical thinking through Indigenous Storytelling.

Students will learn to:

- Embed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives into the teaching and learning of mathematics.
- Use the Maths as storytelling (MAST) approach and use Indigenous knowledge of symbols (within, e.g., sport, driving, art and dance).
- Explore the meaning of symbols and how symbols can be assembled to tell and create a story.
- Select and apply appropriate mental and written strategies for the four operations (addition, subtraction, division and multiplication).
- Represent addition and subtraction problems using illustrations.
- Represent prime and composite numbers using illustrations.







- Collect materials/resources for their mini fete stall such as food items, packaging, accessories etc.
- Watch news and summarise the main issues such as BTN, SkyNews,
 Channel 7 and 9 news.
- Read at home for at least 20 minutes every day and use the reading response prompts below to help with comprehension.
- Maths: play card games (target number, circles and stars). Do a number talk with your parents and complete maths activities on study ladder.

A Game For Two Players

Materials Needed: Playing Cards

Jack = [] Queen = 12 King = I3 Ace = I

Directions:

*Shuffle the deck of cards. Place them face down in between you and your partner.

*Turn over five cards to make a row, then flip the top card of the deck. This top card is your target card. Using at least two cards and any combination of operations, be the first to "make" the target number.

*If you have a way to make your target, say, "LIGHTNING!" and tell your partner the complete number sentence. If it is a true number sentence, you keep the cards you used to make the target number (including the target card) and replace the empty places with new cards from the deck. There should always be 5 cards in play and one new target for each round.

*The person with the most cards at the end is the winner- so try to use as many cards as you can for your target! For example:













Rhyme

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Words that have the same ending sounds

Repetition

Metaphor

A comparison stating one thing *is* another

The white puffy clouds are cotton balls in the sky.

Simile

A comparison using the words "like" or "as"

The surface of the water looked as smooth as glass.

Eight Poetic Devices Definitions & Examples

Alliteration

Words in a poem that have the same beginning sounds

Last spring Polly planted purple pansies in her garden.

Onomatopoeia

Words that sound like the objects or actions to which they refer

A mosquito zoomed and buzzed around my head.

Personification

A figure of speech in which objects are given human qualities

The sun played a game of peek-a-boo with the clouds.

Rhythm

The "beat" or regular pattern of sounds found in some poems

One, two, buckle my shoe. Three, four, shut the door.
