Liturgical JottingsArs celebrandi 1

One way of caring for and growing in a vital understanding of the symbols of the Liturgy is certainly the "ars celebrandi", the art of celebrating. This expression also is subject to different interpretations. Its sense becomes clear if we refer to the theological sense of the Liturgy described in Vatican Council Sacrosanctum II. Concilium n7, [the Mystery of Christ present and active by means of signs addressed to our senses so that the Spirit might transform every dimension of our life, conforming us more and more to Christ]. The ars celebrandi cannot reduced to rubrical mechanism, much less should it be thought of as imaginative creativity without rules. The rite is in itself a norm, and the norm is never an end in itself, but it is always at the service of a higher reality that it means to protect.

Looking at the Readings

'The Day of the Lord is coming" (Mal 3:19) is the opening line of the first reading and the thread woven through all the readings and prayers for this second last Sunday of the Liturgical Year. The Prophet Malachi is brief but complex. The Day of the Lord brings judgement and salvation, it may be a day of great fear or joy. The Readings give the faithful person confidence: "the sun of righteousness will shine out with healing in its rays" Mal 3:20; The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice. Ps 97:9; Gospel Acclamation: "Lift up your heads and see; your redemption is near at hand." Luke 21:28; Gospel: "Your endurance will win you your lives." Luke 21:19.

We, as a church community, may be weakened by crises and disasters or bewildered by doubts. Malachi calls us to persevere and be confident in the Lord's Coming. Jesus encourages us to be trusting in his presence in times of trial. While the Thessalonians were waiting of the imminent return of Christ, some stopped their daily work, St Paul had to urge them to keep on working, the Lord is coming but not yet.

Each Sunday is the Day of the Lord, Every Eucharist celebrates the Lord who has come, is coming and will come again!

A Grace before Meals

While scripture may be used in our prayer before meals, today's second reading has proven to be unsuitable. Here is an alternative:

Lord God, may this food restore our strength, giving new energy to tired limbs, new thoughts to weary minds. May this drink restore our souls, giving new vision to dry spirits, new warmth to cold hearts. And once refreshed, may we give new pleasure to you, who gives us all. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.


Next Sunday, November 20th at the St Mel's Parish Hall. Doors will open at 11:30am.



First Reading

A reading from the second book of Samuel

They anointed David king of Israel.

All the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron. 'Look' they said 'we are your own flesh and blood. In days past when Saul was our king, it was you who led Israel in all their exploits; and the Lord said to you, "You are the man who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you shall be the leader of Israel." So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron, and King David made a pact with them at Hebron in the presence of the Lord, and they anointed David king of Israel.

Because that is what he has done: he has taken us out of the power of darkness and created a place for us in the kingdom of the Son that he loves, and in him, we gain our freedom, the forgiveness of our sins.

He is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation, for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth: everything visible and everything invisible, Thrones, Dominations, Sovereignties, Powers – all things were created through him and for him.

Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things in unity.

Now the Church is his body, he is its head.

As he is the Beginning, he was first to be born from the dead, so that he should be first in every way; because God wanted all perfection to be found in him and all things to be reconciled through him and for him, everything in heaven and everything on earth, when he made peace by his death on the cross.

A reading from the holy Gospel according Luke

Lord remember me when you come into your kingdom.

The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus. As for the leaders, they jeered at him. 'He saved others,' they said, 'let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One.' The soldiers mocked him too, and when they approached to offer him vinegar they said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.' Above him there was an inscription: 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said, 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied, 'today you will be with me in paradise.'
