#### First Reading Jos 5:9-12

The people of God went to the promised land and there kept the passover

The Lord said to Joshua, 'Today I have taken the shame of Egypt away from you.'

The Israelites pitched their camp at Gilgal and kept the Passover there on the fourteenth day of the month, at evening in the plain of Jericho. On the morrow of the Passover they tasted the produce of that country, unleavened bread and roasted ears of corn, that same day. From that time, from their first eating of the produce of that country, the manna stopped falling. #### Second Reading 2 Cor 5:17-21

For anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here. It is all God's work. It was God who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the work of handing on his reconciliation. In other words, God in Christ was reconciling the world to himself, not holding men's faults against them, and he has entrusted to us the news that they are reconciled. So we are ambassadors for Christ; it is as though God were appealing through us, and the appeal that we make in Christ's name is: be reconciled to God. For our sake God made the sinless one into sin, so that in him we might become the goodness of God.

#### Gospel Lk 15:1-3, 11-32

Your brother here was dead and has come to life.

The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man' they said 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

'When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quickl Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing, Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property - he and his women - you kill the calf we had been fattening."

#### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

In the midst of Lent we are given a moment for rejoicing, Laetare Sunday. All of the readings provide us with reasons for rejoicing. The overarching theme is the prodigal goodness of God. The responsorial psalm sets the context for the reflections. The other readings show how needy people were showered with divine favour. Even in the midst of this rejoicing, we find a challenge. We must undergo a change of heart if we are to rejoice in God.

The goodness of God is strikingly portrayed in the radically new image of father. This is a God who allows us to follow our own dreams, who is partial to no one, who faithfully and patiently waits for us to return, who gently corrects our misperceptions. God longs to be reconciled with us even more than we long to be reconciled with God.

The challenges placed before us set out some of the conditions required if we are to be a new creation. We are called to a profound and total reconciliation, first with God and then with each other. Christ was identified with sin so that we might be identified God's righteousness. with Reconciliation requires that we be giving and receiving open to forgiveness. It requires that we both remember and forget. We must always remember the causes of alienation, so that we not succumb to them again. However, we must forget the resentment that we felt so that we not allow it to influence our lives.



#### Transcending time, space and art form

"There are some stories so vivid, so engaging, and so remarkable that they transcend time, space, and art form," said David Hallberg, the Artistic Director of The Australian Ballet. While Hallberg didn't specifically speak about the Scriptures, we can apply the above quote to the stories of the people of God throughout the Old Testament and the New. And, of course, at the heart of it we have The Story: the Gospel of Jesus Christ that has been passed down to us through generations.

When I think about the Gospel stories, I think about the events that took place during the time of Jesus: the miracles, the healings, and the encounters He had with people. But we must remember that "the word of God is living and active" (Hebrews 4:12), which means it is still living and active today, it is speaking to us every time we hear it.

The word that comes from God never returns to Him empty because it will accomplish what He intends (cf. Isaiah 55:11). God wants us to be part of that "accomplishment." He invites us to be part of the story, leaving us free to choose whether or not to participate. Once we say yes—lovingly and freely—He will work in us and through us, making us part of The Greatest Story ever told, one that transcends time, space, and art form.



**Talk with Jesus** about what comes to mind or take some moments to rest in God's loving presence.

#### THE DESTINATION, THE WAY, THE PATH TO FOLLOW

Two sons each choose their own way. As if his father was already dead to him, the younger asks for his inheritance. When, after squandering it all, he returns to beg forgiveness, his father runs to embrace and clothe him with compassion, love, honour - and no words of accusation. The elder son, lost to resentment and self-pity, sees himself as an unrewarded worker. Both sons must discover that they are beloved children of a loving parent who wants nothing but to love, welcome and forgive. How does God feel about me? Can I cope with a God who loves me extravagantly, as I am, and who loves those I might judge unworthy?

#### FROM FELLOW PILGRIMS - FOR REFLECTION

Jesus brought healing, graciousness, compassion and love, in ways never known before. He astonished, touched and frightened those who could not understand the source of such goodness. He was utterly transparent and open to God's love acting through him. Love was dominant over fear. He spoke truth from the heart to the hearts of those ready to listen. He was moved to tears at others' sorrow and moved to anger by exploitation of people. He challenged those who put burdens on others or who discarded the little ones. He welcomed and spoke for the children. He fed the hungry. He said that we who have plenty must share with those who have little. He left disciples to finish what he began. We are among these disciples.



## An Invitation

A long time ago now, not long after I first started teaching, I was assigned a pretty tough class, only four or five periods a week but that was enough for them and for me! Many, if not most of them just wanted to be out of there and into the workforce. The worst of it was that I had them for the last two periods on Friday afternoons and fellow teachers will understand what I mean by that.

Sometimes there are times when we can feel a bit overwhelmed or even a bit helpless, but I was given great advice then that I have since used very, very often. Ask yourself: "What are the possibilities here?" In other words, look for the positives, see the possibility not just the problem.

A few years ago a TED talk called 'Celebrate what is right with the World' became very popular. DeWitt Jones was a long time photographer for the National Geographic magazine and his experiences from those world-wide travels gave him a unique perspective on life. Among his words of wisdom, he offered the following: "When we celebrate what is right with the world, we get the energy to fix what is wrong".

The world we live in today can be overwhelming at times and the questions that confront us seem so big and the pace of change feels impossible to keep up with. Anger and violence seem to be spreading, not just overseas but in our own communities. What life might look like moving forward can be daunting at times and the temptation can be to become negative, to think that all was well in the past (it wasn't) and to become very uncertain about change.

I worked with a boss some years ago who came to meetings where suggestions were made and proposals abounded. He came with this mindset: let's see how we can make this work. He had to confront very difficult situations at times, and I heard him say more than once, I am sorry that I can't do anything about that but I am here to say, what can I help you do to move forward. Most of us know that section in the Book of Ecclesiastes – there is a time for everything. A time, and that's the point. It doesn't have to be forever, we move on, we grow, we mature, we can change. We can't stay the same as the world changes around us.

How we approach situations can mean a lot to us and to others. Are we a 'yes, but...' person or a 'why not? person? We can stay in the negative or dig ourselves out with the positive. Of course there will be times of sadness, times when we get despondent and feel unable to cope, times when everything seems too hard. But these are not the times to throw our dreams away. Sometimes when we feel we are not coping, we think we can escape by just getting busy all the time and that may work for a while but there is a time for everything! The power of a dream, no matter how small the canvas may be, can bring new energy into making life new again. Absolutely nothing new could possibly happen in the world if it weren't for its dreamers. Jesus had a dream of love, justice, peace and real happiness – we call it the Reign of God. He left it with us to bring it about and, as he said on many occasions, it is within your reach.

While dreams are not certainties, they can bring a direction, we can imagine what might be, we can imagine what I might bring to this situation and how it might be transformed. Dreams tell us a lot about ourselves, the quality of my ideals, our beliefs, our hopes. But we tend to suppress them, to think of them as a waste of time, get on with life, take it on the chin etc.

Dreams don't have to be about great things, but what I want to achieve here, in this place, in this classroom perhaps, in this neighbourhood, for my family, our parish. The fact is that without dreams, no plans are possible. Dreams help us not to be stuck in memory, impervious to today. They are an invitation to today, an invitation to a future still in process. Do you want to be part of making that?

## Something to Think About

Can you think of a time you needed to be forgiven? How did it feel before and after you were forgiven?

### The Story

Today's long gospel story is about God's enormous love and compassion for us.

### The Scriptures

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (15:1-3, 11-32)

Tax collectors and sinners were all crowding around to listen to Jesus. So the Pharisees and the teachers of the Law of Moses started grumbling, "This man is friendly with sinners. He even eats with them." Then Jesus told them this story:

"Once a man had two sons. The younger son said to his father, 'Give me my share of the property.'

So the father divided his property between his two sons. Not long after that, the younger son packed up everything he owned and left for a foreign country, where he wasted all his money in wild living. He had spent everything, when a bad famine spread through that whole land. Soon he had nothing to eat.

"He went to work for a man in that country, and the man sent him out to take care of his pigs. He would have been glad to eat what the pigs were eating, but no one gave him a thing. Finally, he came to his senses and said, 'My father's workers have plenty to eat, and here I am, starving to death! His father came out and begged him to go in. But he said to his father, 'For years I have worked for you like a slave and have always obeyed you. But you have never even given me a little goat, so that I could give a dinner for my friends. This other son of yours wasted your money on bad women. And now that he has come home, you ordered the best calf to be killed for a feast.'

#### THE LOVING FATHER



- 6. Add hair to the top of the head using wool or twine.


