Angus McConnel set the example early, knocking over the stumps along with 2 maidens.

With intensity in the outfield, the win was well deserved for the 2nd XI. On a gloomy day, the match shined with a history making batting performance, backed up with sufficient bowling and fielding closing out the game.

With Wakehurst winning the toss and confidently sending SPX Yellow into bat, the Wakehurst team were expecting to take advantage of a wet pitch and the ball skidding through to the keeper. SPX opened with last week's top scorer Lachlan Jurcevic and Flynn Pavely. Lachlan showed signs of bringing last week's form to this week's game, whilst Flynn looked comfortable with the early pace bowling as both boys maintained a good strike rate through the opening 5 overs. The first SPX wicket fell for 29 in the seventh over bringing another of last week's inform batsman, Victor Mosmann to the crease. Both Lachlan and Victor played soundly through to the 15th over drinks break, dispatching the poor balls to the boundary and defensively sound on the good balls. Victor was his usual calm temperament, working the singles and two's to the teams' advantage. With the rain now settled in, Wakehurst commenced their innings knowing only solid partnerships in the early batting would allow them to chase down the score.
