VTAC – the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre – is the central body that takes applications on behalf of many universities, TAFE's and private colleges primarily in Victoria. This document gives you a summary of the key points relating to VTAC and making a VTAC application, however, your main source of information should be the VTAC website.

Fees and Payments

For your course application to be considered, you must pay the processing fee by the final payment date through your VTAC account. You can pay:

- Immediately at the end of your application or later.
- Via a PayPal account, or by Visa or MasterCard.



Applying through VTAC

1. Register your VTAC account

Your VTAC account is where you manage your course, SEAS, and scholarship applications, change your preferences, and update your personal details. Before you can create your VTAC account, you will need a USI which you can <u>find or create here</u>. 2. Use CourseSearch

<u>CourseSearch</u> provides information about essential requirements and admission criteria for courses such as prerequisite studies and lowest selection ranks.. You will need to familiarise yourself with it to make your application. Download the <u>How to use CourseSearch fact sheet</u>, or watch the video below to learn how it works.



3. Apply for courses

How to correctly list your preferences

You can list up to 8 course preferences. It's extremely important to list the course you most want most at number 1 and to work your way down. Understanding course preferences and offers can be a little tricky, so be sure to watch the video below so you get it right and give yourself the best chance of getting offers for the course(s) you want! You can change your preferences as many times as you need to until the closing date.



SEAS Special Entry Access Scheme

What is SEAS?

If circumstances have made it hard to do your best, consider putting in a special consideration application via VTAC's <u>Special Entry Access Scheme</u> (SEAS). A SEAS application allows selection officers to grant you course entry with a lower rank than otherwise required, although you must still meet course prerequisites. All Domestic students, and some International students on specific humanitarian visas can apply for SEAS.

SEAS Categories

There are four SEAS categories. These following links/videos will help you understand the eligibility and documentation required, and you can practise with the <u>SEAS Application Demo</u>.

Category 1: Personal Information and Location

VTAC encourages all applicants to apply for Category 1, even if you don't feel disadvantaged. The below video provides an overview of SEAS and Category 1.



Category 2: Disadvantaged financial background

of SEAG deals with financial disadvantage.

Category 3: <u>Disability or medical condition</u>

If your studies have been dispantaged for reasons of health...

Category 4: Difficult Circumstances

Category 4 of SEAS deals with family and life circustances that have affected your education...



Category 1 includes location, gender, being an Indigenous Australian, being from a non-English speaking background, and being the first in your family to attend tertiary study.

Scholarships and Personal Statements

Applying for Scholarships

VTAC manage some scholarship applications on behalf of Charles Sturt, Deakin, La Trobe, Monash, RMIT, Swinburne, and Victoria universities. These scholarships are generally awarded for three categories such as <u>access and equity</u>, <u>merit</u>, and <u>Indigenous Commonwealth scholarships</u>.

Evidence

You may need to provide evidence as part of your scholarship application. This could be a written response, a statement of support, or financial evidence. You can find out what evidence is required by practising at the <u>Scholarship Application Demo</u>. Evidence is not required for community service or leadership categories.



SEAS and scholarships are separate applications but you can often use the same evidence for both. This means if you've applied for SEAS, you should also apply for scholarships!

Other Institutions' Scholarships

In addition to the scholarships <u>available through</u> <u>VTAC</u>, there are many more <u>scholarships on offer</u> which you apply for directly through each institution.

Writing a VTAC Personal Statement

A personal statement lets you submit information about your motivation for study, work experience, community experience, academic performance, languages, or other relevant information.

If a Personal Statement is listed under essential requirements and admission criteria for any of your preferences, you MUST submit one to be considered for the course. If it is not listed as essential or recommended but you choose to submit one anyway, the selection authorities may not consider it.

The deadline for submitting your Personal Statement to guarantee consideration for all offer rounds is Sunday 3 December (5pm).
