Page 10- 'Oh, the naughty girl! I told her to wait in the garden for you,' said her aunt. 'Now she's gone off somewhere. I must tell you, children, you may find George a bit difficult at first-she's always been one on her own, you know, and at first may not like you being here'

This part tells us that Georgina is a bit rebellious to her parents and that her behaviour is unruly. This is proven later in the chapter. This section also tells us that Anne, Dick and George's arrival will not be welcomed by Georgina.

Page 13-' Well, she's a funny little girl,' said her aunt.'She can be very rude and haughty- but she's kind at heart, very loyal and absolutely truthful. Once she makes friends with you, she will always be your friend- but she finds it very difficult indeed to make friends, which is a great pity'

This section gives us a few pros of Georgina, such as her kindness, her loyalty and her honesty. However, this section also gives us two cons. These two cons are her behaviour and her abysmal social skills.

Page 15-' She had very short curly hair, almost as short as a boy's. Her face was burnt with the sun, and her very blue eyes looked as bright as forget-me-nots in her face. But her mouth was rather sulky, and she had a frown like her father's '

This section gives us a good description of her facial features. She has curly hair, which is short, much like a boy's. She has a burnt face, suggesting that she goes outside a lot, and bright blue eyes. The proof that she is Uncle Quentin's child is her mouth. She has a frown which is identical to her father's frown, which is on his face 24/7.

Page 15, Second Paragraph - This gives us proof that Georgina is a tomboy. She says that she hates being a girl and the activities associated with it. She boasts about how she is better than the boys in their own activities.

Page 16- From This page, we see examples of Georgina's rude behaviour when she calls Anne a baby and when she insults all three of the cousins. She states that she is happy on her own. We can also see that she is a tomboy when the book states that she wears a boy's jersey.

Page 17, Second last or last paragraph- The book says that Georgina scowls at her cousins, which shows her negative opinion on her cousins staying here.

Page 18, Third paragraph- We can see George's love of the sea when her frown is removed from her face when they arrive at the beach.

Page 18, last paragraph- We find a new feature about her appearance in this section. She does not slouch.

Page 19- 2nd paragraph- When Julian suggests that they may not like Georgina as well, Georgina acts surprised, which shows her selfishness and how she only thinks about her own feelings.

Her best companion is a dog named Timothy, who she is extremely protective of. Since her parents disapprove of Timothy, she gave Timothy to a fisher boy named Alf and pays him all her money to take care of Timothy. Since she does not have money, she does not have treats and does not accept them from others. She is an only child and has no friends except for Timothy. She is stubborn and headstrong. She is also misunderstood. When she smiles, her face is pretty. When Julian mentions that they like George's mother, George becomes more friendly, suggesting that George loves her mother and is willing to be kind to people who have a liking for her.
