Are you a Critical Thinker?

Lots of careers list critical thinking as a core skill that's required in order to be successful.

Find out if you are a critical thinker, get examples of why you might need this skill in the workplace and get tips on how to develop your critical thinking skills.

What does Critical Thinking actually mean?

Essentially, it's the skills where you:

- learn to recognise or develop an argument
- use evidence to support your argument
- draw reasoned conclusions, and
- put your knowledge to use by using that information to solve problems

Why critical thinking in the workplace is important

Critical thinkers in the workplace are more likely to understand the meaning behind their role, which increases the chances of them engaging with the work.

Employers want job candidates who can evaluate a situation using logical thought and offer the best solution.

Plus, critical thinkers can reduce wastage and increase productivity through analysing processes and identifying areas for improvement, be trusted to make decisions independently, and won't need constant handholding.

Examples of jobs that require critical thinking:

- <u>Nurses</u> working in Emergency triage need to assess the cases waiting to be seen and decide who needs to be treated first
- Criminologists are required to do a lot of research and critical thinking to solve crimes
- **Plumbers** called to a job need to evaluate what action needs to be taken (and the order work needs to be done) then decide on the best materials to do the job.
- <u>Lawyers</u> review evidence, quickly refer to past rulings and laws to come up with strategies to win a case or get the best outcome for their clients
- <u>Logistics Managers</u> dealing with large quantities of goods and complex supply chains requires strong critical thinking skills
- <u>Accountants</u> clients will appreciate your critical thinking skills when you help and direct them use their money productively
- Managers need to find ways to obtain customer feedback, review it and use the information to make changes or improve on their service, products and staff performance to increase the sales
- **Software Developers** need critical thinking to design today's complex but efficient code making things easier for people who use them
- <u>Doctors</u> need to use critical thinking skills as patients often present with complex symptoms and issues, you'll have to come up with appropriate solutions and make sure you're providing the best possible care
- Safety is incredibly important, so being able to think critically and identify any problems is crucial for <u>WH&S Officers</u>

Develop your critical thinking skills

Practise the steps of critical thinking by applying them in as many situations as you can:

 Pinpoint the issue – what is the problem that needs solving or the question that needs answering

- Collect information do some research and collect data, be sure to include sources that challenge your own opinions
- Scrutinise the evidence is your data from a reliable source, is it biased, is there hard evidence
- Decide what's relevant reject any dodgy information, then make sure everything that's left is actually relevant to the original issue
- Self-evaluate have you approached this exercise with an open mind, willing to learn, done enough research?
- Conclude based on your work, create a couple of conclusions. Then assess each one for weaknesses, validity and decide which one is the most sound
- Share your ideas communicating your findings to other people is the last but really important part of critical thinking. If you can't effectively share your thinking or solutions, then you may have wasted your time.

Improving on these **skills** could help you to become a better critical thinker:

Observation – take notice of what's going on around you, it could help you to see opportunities and problems as well as help you to come up with solutions **Analysis** – this could help you to gather the right information, understand it and draw useful

information from it

Inference – use relevant data and personal experience to draw valid conclusions
<u>Communication</u> – active listening, <u>teamwork and collaboration</u>, presentations, working on your verbal and written work will all ensure that you're learning and sharing the right information in the best way

<u>Problem solving</u> – learn to identify problems, find solutions and then, importantly, assess whether the solution is working or not

Objectivity – this skill will allow you to really 'see' the information in front of you rather than working from assumptions or your own personal bias. Get outside your comfort zone, be inclusive, and saying yes to a variety of opportunities could really help you to learn how to be more objective.

10 Things to Teach your High School Leaver

The end of high school is a huge milestone in life. Not just for your children either, this is a huge thing for you as parents as well.

It probably seems like yesterday when your child started out at kindy or prep with backpacks bigger than they were, and Year 12 seemed like forever away, and now the time is nearly here.

If you're having a last minute wobble and are wondering how to prepare your child for leaving school or support them through this time, we've put together 10 things to focus on that could help you both to feel more equipped before they fly the nest.

1. How to cook

The novelty of eating two minute noodles every day will soon wear off, so if your teen has never been interested in cooking, now's the time to get them started. They don't have to be gourmet chefs, being able to prepare a few simple meals from scratch could set your child up to eat more healthily and save money.

2. How to care for themselves

Self-care means lots of things.

From knowing how to do your laundry (and saving you from dealing with a whole semesters worth of stinky socks coming home), cleaning where you live, knowing some basic maintenance – even if it's just putting up pictures and keeping the drains unblocked. To being responsible for their own health and wellbeing as well as knowing when and where to ask for help.

3. How to manage money

It's great for your school leaver to know how to plan a budget based on their income, (whether that's from a salary, scholarship or loan); and also to keep track of their expenses. They'll also need to know how to:

- pay bills
- start saving
- stay out of debt
- pay taxes
- contribute to their super
- avoid credits cards and debt
- compare prices
- be aware of scams

4. Staying safe

This is no doubt something you've been drumming into your child since day dot. But if they're leaving home and becoming more independent, then you may not be around to remind.

It's a great idea have a chat together and work out a few ways to stay safe, including:

- avoid walking alone at night or in unsafe areas
- locking doors and windows
- understanding how their own and other people's behaviour can change under the influence of drugs or alcohol
- knowing some first aid, CPR and self defence
- be careful who they share information with or allow to get close
- keeping their online details safe and secure
- having an emergency plan if something happens

5. How to get around

It's hard to be independent if you rely on others for lifts everywhere or haven't experienced using public transport.

Get your kids to use the local buses and trains, from working out which route they need to figuring out the timetables and fares. Ask them to organise Ubers and taxis, maybe even pay for them too.

If they're learning to drive – great! They'll also need to feel confident about driving in the dark and all kinds of weather conditions. And it's a good idea to teach them some basic mechanics from filling their wiper washers, to checking oil, pumping up or changing tyres. (You could also buy them or encourage them to but their own roadside assistance cover for additional peace of mind).

6. Finding work

It's called "job hunting" for a reason. If your child hasn't had a job before, now's the time to encourage them to find something part time.

Make sure they have a decent looking resume and know where to look for jobs, how to apply and practise their interview techniques too.

7. Work life balance

We all want our kids to be hard workers and do well. They often put plenty of pressure on themselves though, so it's great to talk about and role model great work life balance. Having fun and taking time out to care for yourself is important too.

8. Dealing with relationships

You and your child might be used to you dealing with problems in the past, but letting them handle their own issues and giving them tips on how to deal with situations themselves will really empower them.

Get them to speak up and be assertive, use their initiative and ask questions, compromise, set boundaries that they feel comfortable with, voice concerns and settle arguments. Remaining calm, walking away from conflict, being professional are also good pointers to go over.

9. Being a great global citizen

Encouraging your teen to:

- be kind
- take responsibility for their actions and impacts on others
- be aware of what's going on around them not just on a local scale but around the world
- travel
- seek out opportunities
- live by their values
- stand up to ignorance and intolerance
- get involved in communities, projects and programs
- take action and advocate for themselves and for others

You'll help to show your child that they have a voice. Even if the world is changing fast, they can always make a positive difference, and do their bit help to build a fairer, happier, safer, and more secure world.

10. Be true to yourself

Inspire your young person to be themselves, remind them that:

- It's ok if not everyone likes you
- You should follow your passion
- Listen to your intuition
- · You can change your mind
- Let go of past mistakes and issues and move on
- Be honest about what you want to do, how you feel, and what you need
- You are enough

How to become an Aircraft Pilot

Soar the skies

What do Aircraft Pilots do?

Aircraft Pilots operate planes in order to transport passengers and goods from one location to their destination. They may also provide agricultural, aerial surveillance, or other aviation services.

If you are hard working and confident, are willing to work long hours away from home, and want a job that can take you anywhere in the world, becoming an Aircraft Pilot could be ideal for you.

About you:

- Trustworthy and reliable
- Confident with a steady hand
- Excellent communicator
- Analytical and thorough
- Alert and quick-thinking
- Works well under pressure
- Good problem-solver
- Patient and thorough

The job:

- Preparing flight plans before take-off
- Considering weather conditions and other factors
- Completing comprehensive system checks before take-off
- Operating a variety of aircraft and associated technology
- Communicating with other staff on the ground and on board
- Monitoring aircraft performance and safety
- Taking important directions from air traffic control

Lifestyle Impact: Moderate

- Part Time opportunities: Low only around 29% of Aircraft Pilots work part-time (source: joboutlook.gov.au).
- Average hours for full-time workers: 45 hours a week, which is average (source: joboutlook.gov.au).
- Aircraft Pilots' salary (average) \$130,000* per year (source: seek.com.au). *Salaries vary depending on your skills and experience.
- Future career growth: Stable (source: joboutlook.gov.au).
- You will be spending a lot of time away from home travelling, and may need to work at all hours of the day or night.

Pilots are most in demand in these locations:

This is a small occupation, with around 8,000 people working as Aircraft Pilots in 2016 (source: joboutlook.gov.au), with stable growth expected over the next five years. Demand for Aircraft Pilots is highest in Queensland, Western Australia and the Northern Territory. Most Aircraft Pilots work in the Transport, Postal and Warehousing industry.

Your job as an Aircraft Pilot could take you nearly anywhere around the country and even the world. Although the impact of COVID-19 has slowed international travel, there is still high demand for air travel within Australia.

How to become an Aircraft Pilot in Australia

You will need to complete a combination of both practical and theoretical assessment in order to become a qualified Aircraft Pilot in Australia.

Step 1 – Complete Year 12 with a strong focus on English, Maths and Sciences.

Step 2 – Start your flight training, either through a private flying school, or in combination with a VET or university degree.

Step 3 – Obtain your recreational or private pilot license.

Step 4 – Obtain an aviation reference number (ARN) from the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA).

Step 5 – Gain extensive experience and pass further examinations to obtain a commercial pilot license. You may also need to complete further training in order to operate specific types of aircraft.
