

LITERACY

In Term 3, we will continue to embed our new Literacy structure. Our first text that we will be engaging in is 'Storm Boy' by Colin Thiele and then 'The Wild Robot' by Colin Brown. We will be purchasing class sets of these books so that students are able to more actively engage in these texts as we read them.





SMART SPELLING

Our spelling practices have been a big focus for us this term as all classes implemented the SMART program. Our students are loving the consistency of the program and development of their spelling skills is evident through SeeSaw. We encourage all parents to celebrate their child's achievements and practice their spelling words which are recorded on SeeSaw weekly. SMART Spelling is an explicit and systematics approach to teaching spelling, which will be implemented from Foundation to Year 6. Students will focus on a list of words each week, with 80% of the words belonging to a particular sound-letter relationship. 20% of the words will come from the students' own writing and they are

called 'BOB' words. Within the Literacy program, we explicitly teach spelling patterns and rules aligned to a scope and sequence. Weekly word lists will be shared with families on See Saw for opportunities to practice them at home (optional).



INQUIRY

BIOLOGY

Inquiry this term will be integrated across the curriculum. In our Grade 4, 5, and 6 biology classes, students will explore key concepts from the Victorian Curriculum to build a strong understanding of the natural world. Grade 4 will focus on identifying the characteristics and life cycles of plants and animals. In Grade 5, students will learn about growth and changes in animals, including humans, and how living things rely on each other and their environment. Grade 6 will deepen this knowledge by studying how living things are classified and how adaptations help them survive in different habitats. Through engaging activities and investigations, your child will develop both their scientific knowledge and critical thinking skills.

READING JOURNAL

Thank you to all families who have purchased a Resilience Journal Reading Log. We have continued to track reading nights across the school and celebrate milestones through tokens and certificates for students achieving 25, 50, 75 etc recorded nights. The journals offer wellbeing resources which align to our school practices and help create a shared understanding of positive wellbeing strategies between home and school and in turn will help enhance happiness and resilience in and out of the classroom.





Did you know that just 10 minutes of reading a day will change your child's life? While that may seem like a big statement to make, numerous studies have consistently shown that 10 minutes exposure to reading materials each day is all it takes to positively shape your child's future. And this doesn't just include complicated educational texts—any reading materials, be it comic books, novels, picture books, recipes, the television guide or the back of food packets, all count towards your child's daily reading goal. Reading any of these materials for 10 minutes a day exposes your child to more than 600,000 words in one year interestingly, that's more than double the word exposure of a child who only reads for 5 minutes or less each day. The benefit of this word exposure is immense—research shows us that reading more improves a child's performance in general knowledge, vocabulary, reading comprehension, verbal fluency and spelling. But this goal of reading for 10 minutes each day isn't only to improve your child's academic success; the effects of this achievement are far more long-term than you may have anticipated.

NUMERACY

Our topics this term will include:


- Space symmetry and translations
- Measurement angles and capacity
- Place value patterns, prime, composite, triangular and square number
- Number operations
- Space nets, 3D shapes
- Statistics interpreting graphs



All students have access to Mathletics and Essential Assessment that can be used a home to further reinforce the concepts we cover at school. We encourage all students to access these at home were possible.

VALUES

Did you know that we have revised our school Values? We now have the 3R's: **Respect, Resilience and Responsibility**. These core values are entrenched in our school and follow our 'Positive Behaviour Matrix' (please see below). Throughout our weekly Values lessons, we teach the Values, along with the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships Curriculum. Through this, we explore the topic of Emotional Literacy. We will also be incorporating the 'Resilience Project' into our Wellbeing curriculum again this year. Each student will receive their own 'Resilience Project' journal to practise and promote positive mental health strategies to build resilience.






LITERACY - POEMS




