Reflection by Greg Sunter

Stay awakel With these words, Jesus cautions his disciples to be constantly vigilant and to be alert to the return of the Lord. It is a very fitting way to begin the season of Advent. Advent has traditionally been observed as a time of preparation and waiting. It culminates in the Christmas season and so the waiting and preparation is related to the celebration of the coming of Christ into the world.

Perhaps the time of preparation this Advent is also a call to stay awake and stay alert in faith. One of the great challenges to faith today is the complacency that has taken hold of many In our society. When life is comfortable, the perceived need for faith appears to diminish. Many young people in our society cannot see the value of religious belief or religious practice. In a world of instant communication and Instant 'satisfaction', the reflective and slow work of faith can seem too much effort for some people. The gospel call to stay awake in preparation for the coming of the Lord is a call to continue the work of bringing about the Kingdom of God.

Over the last three weeks, the gospel passages from Matthew 25 were reminders about continuing to prepare for the coming of the Kingdom. This week, with the beginning of Advent, it is the gospel of Mark that also reminds us that we cannot take the Kingdom for granted and must remain vigilant in working to realise the Kingdom. This vigilance needs to be applied to nurturing our own faith life as well as making a difference in the lives of those around us and the needy in society. Rather than 'Stay awakel' maybe some of us need to be told, 'Wake upl' It is never too late to pay closer attention to faith and perhaps this Advent is an ideal time to do that.

'It's Not Fair'

It's easy to be overwhelmed by the state of the world and to feel



helpless. There's not much any single individual can do. A starting point is to see how the world works through the eyes of the disadvantaged, the poor, the marginalised and those most impacted by climate change. When leading sixth year Quo Vadis pilgrims on a three-day hike over the mountains, there was an implicit understanding. 'I' am not there yet until 'we' are all there. No matter how fast or athletic a person was, the pace had to accommodate the weakest.

We would often stop to wait for the stragglers who were finding it difficult to climb the steep sections and then continue only after they had recovered. While the stronger may have been frustrated from time to time, there was an invaluable lesson. We walked as a community where people watched out for one another. We weren't in competition. We were in empathetic solidarity. This experience mirrors our better nature.

As Time Goes By

Sometimes we wonder where the time went. It just seems to disappear, perhaps not in the down times when it just seems to drag on and on but in general we wonder, where did it go?

Songs can strike a chord (pardon the pun) and they sometimes capture how we feel. I Dreamed the Dream is one.

I dreamed a dream in time gone by, When hope was high and life, worth living. I dreamed that love would never die, I dreamed that God would be forgiving. Then I was young and unafraid......

But when I was young we were afraid. I grew up in a time of rules and regulations, a time of people seeking stability and certainty because we had just been through a devastating World War and we were in another conflict in Korea. Communism, we were told, threatened our very way of life. The church I grew up in reflected that - it was about rules and regulations, about earning our place in heaven out of this 'vale of tears'. Dogma and certainty and soldier-like obedience gave us security, a sense of 'rightness'. Pope Pius XII had been there forever and we assumed he would continue for that long too. Then John XXIII threw open the windows and began the process of revitalising a rather moribund church. Many struggle with that today and look to the past as a Golden Era but I firmly believe, in the words of Pope John XXIII, Divine Providence is leading us to a new order of human relations which is beyond what we can even imagine! At that time, hope was high and full of promise. It was, after all, "The Sixties".

There are still signs of that everywhere. Isn't it wonderful to see the mix of people who call Australia home now - those who have inhabited this land for fifty thousand years, others from Europe, India and Asia, the Americas and Africa. It is a joy and a challenge to be part of this emerging nation and an emerging church too, to be one with those who have a dream of what life might be, what they might create. Signs of hope are everywhere.

For many years I was a teacher. Teaching is primarily about hope, about enabling students to see that life is worth living, that God is forgiving, that real love never dies. It is a wonderful profession. I remember an interview with President Clinton. Andrew Denton asked him "What was the best part of being President?" He thought for a while and then said, "When I went to bed at night, I knew I made a difference to someone's life today". A teacher can say that every day. There are

tough days and tough classes but that adds to the richness of the experience. Despite the fact that sometimes life may have, in the words of the song 'killed the dream' in a particular teacher or a student, love, forgiveness, hope and dedication can help them find a way forward. That's part of the role of a good leader – restoring hope.

John XXIII's 'new order of human relations' also includes how we are finally coming to understand and appreciate the beauty and complexity of the world we live in and how creation is so interconnected. It is a pity that it took a climate crisis to bring us to such a realisation but at least we have begun. Pope Francis encourages "a new dialogue about how we are shaping the future of our planet" (Laudate Si No. 14), about "our care for our common home" The Pope says:

"Disregard for the duty to cultivate and maintain a proper relationship with my neighbour, for whose care and custody I am responsible, ruins my relationship with my own self, with others, with God and with the earth" (No. 70).

So where to from here? When I was young, people who were in their forties were old! Those in their fifties were ancient and sixties – well, that defied description. My great grandfather lived until he was a hundred and eight, the oldest man in the colony at that time but we never really believed that. We thought it was just another one of Dad's stories. It wasn't. His brother back in Ireland died at 111.

So what? Well, I am eighty today! Yes, I have been around for that long, or that short really. I can't believe it myself! It was touch and go once or twice – my wife revived me in a restaurant in Block Arcade once and the nurses did the same in Emergency in Townsville, but here I am. We always think other people are getting older, not ourselves.

So thank you for your part in my eighty years, for being loyal readers who have kept me thinking and dreaming, for helping to make life worth living and thank you that you continue to give me hope.

To quote 94 year old Val Fell, Australia's oldest university student: I might be beyond my "Best Before" date, but I'm nowhere near my "Use By" date.

Amen.


Group Activity




