Looking at the Readings

Joy, Praise, Happiness and Witness are the key words of the First Reading the Response, the Second Reading and the Gospel. Would we take these words home in our minds and hearts we have captured the sense of the advent celebration. To express the Lord's year of favour and joy, Isaiah seeks new words to convey the great enthusiasm of the people. He uses similes of an overjoyed bride and groom, the fresh and fruitful earth and people leaping for joy. While he prophesises the first coming of the Lord we may justly interpret his words for the second coming of the Lord. We have the sense of now but not yet, he has come but yet to come.

The response to the reading is not a psalm but the words of Mary from Luke's Gospel – the *Magnificat.* It is a hymn of thanksgiving to God for his mighty deed for Mary and also and especially for the poor and lowly.

The Entrance Antiphon: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice," sets the tone, the name and the colour of the day's liturgy "*Gaudete*". Rejoice and be happy, Christmas is a week away!

Advent Prayer

O God, most high and most near, you send glad tidings to the lowly, you hide not your face from the poor; those who dwell in darkness you call into the light. Take away our blindness, remove the hardness of our hearts, and form us into a humble people, that, at the advent of your Son, we may recognise him in our midst and find joy in his saving presence. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ,

whose coming is certain, whose day draws near. Amen.

Advent Customs: Misas de Aguinaldo

In the Philippines, Advent is celebrated by attending nine Masses in a row. These are known as Misas de Aguinaldo – or Gift Masses. They begin on December 16 and end on Christmas Eve. After every Mass, families celebrate together by eating traditional desserts and sweets. Maligayang Pasko is how Filipinos would wish you a Merry Christmas!

Liturgical Jottings Blessings 3 – Christmas Tree

The use of the Christmas tree is relatively modern. Its origins are found in the medieval mystery plays which depicted the tree of paradise and the Christmas light or candle which symbolized Christ, the Light of the world. According to custom, the Christmas tree is set up just before Christmas and may remain in place until Epiphany. The Christmas tree may be blessed on or before Christmas during a celebration of the word of God, or during Morning or Evening Prayer. In the home the Christmas tree may be blessed by a parent or another family member, in connection with the evening meal on the Vigil of Christmas or at another suitable time on Christmas Day. This Week's Readings

Weekly Reflection

Rejoice, the Messiah is Already Here

This Sunday is also known as Gaudete Sunday. It is not Christmas Day yet, but it is a day to celebrate the realization that the Messiah is already here and will appear soon. In the First Reading, Isaiah reminds us that the coming of the Anointed of the Lord (the Messiah) will bring good things and is a cause for rejoicing. The Anointed One will bring comfort and healing to those who are suffering and will bring freedom to the enslaved. Isaiah describes our reaction to the Messiah's coming as one of great joy, similar to Mary's Magnificat in Luke 1:46-55. In the Second Reading, St. Paul reminds us that we should always be joyful, even when things are not going well, because the joy that comes from doing God's will is greater than any temporary suffering. St. Paul encourages us to be led by the Spirit and to discern what is truly good and truly evil. In the Gospel, John the Baptist announces that the Messiah has arrived and he is heralding him. John identifies himself as the one who prepares the way for the Lord. He tells the priests, Levites, and Pharisees that the Messiah is already among them, but hidden. This Gospel is fitting for Advent because it reminds us that Our Savior is in Mary's womb, waiting to be born.

St Anne's Year End Mass

On Friday December 8th St Anne's College community were blessed to have both Fr. Rene Ramirez RCJ and Fr Ruel Desamparado RCJ lead us in our end of school year Mass and celebration at Christ the King Church. The day was made more special for our students in Foundation to year 11, staff, and members of the St Anne's College community as we were joined by parishioners from St Mel's Parish.

Our students in all year levels had the opportunity to participate through ministries including Altar Servers, Lectors, Gospel procession, General Intercession, Offertory procession, Choir, Acknowledgment of Country and through being part of the wider community during the Mass.
