How to choose the right international university for you

Deciding to study at university is a huge step – and going overseas to do it is even bigger. With thousands of options out there, it can be hard to know where to start when it comes to choosing the right international university to study at. So where do you begin? We have some tips you might find helpful.

Think about what you want to study

Knowing what you want to study can help narrow down your options. Follow your heart and choose something you're passionate about – but don't forget to be realistic as well. Consider whether your dream job requires certain qualifications, if international qualifications are recognised in your home country, or if your qualification will be sufficient to help you find work if you want to stay after your study is finished.

Start researching locations

Chances are if you want to study overseas, you already have your heart set on a location. Do some research about the country or city you'd like to study in. What is it like to live there? What are living costs like? If you're moving to a country with a different native language, do you feel comfortable speaking it (or are you willing to learn)? If you want to stay and work after finishing your studies, what are the career opportunities like in your chosen field?

Climate and weather can also be a big factor, including whether or not you'll need to be prepared for natural disasters. Depending on how far you move, you might need to buy an entire new wardrobe of clothes! You might also like to research a country's laws and attitude towards certain communities, particularly if you're a woman or LGBTQIA+, as you might find your rights and safety are different compared to your home country.

Take a look at universities

Now that you know what you want to study and where, you can start looking at universities. Check out university websites and see what kinds of courses they offer, or do some research into their ratings. Carefully research their admissions process for international students, and see if you can read reviews from current or former students about their experience. Importantly, find out what language classes are taught in and if this will work for you.

Don't forget to consider other factors too, like clubs, extra-curricular activities, student support services, accommodation options, and careers guidance.

You can also attend virtual open days and webinars to learn more and ask any questions you might have.

Do up a budget

Moving out of home and studying both come with a lot of expenses. Here are some things you'll need to make sure you can cover:

- Tuition fees and study expenses (textbooks, etc.)
- Accommodation fees or rent
- Daily living expenses (food, essentials, luxuries)
- Flights to your destination
- If you're bringing stuff with you, the cost of having things moved
- Visa or sponsorship costs





• Extra money set aside for emergencies

This is also a good time to research <u>scholarship</u> and funding opportunities that might be able to help cover some of these expenses.

You'll also need to consider how you're going to cover these costs on an ongoing basis – are you lucky enough to get funding from parents, or will you need to find part-time work while you study?

Make your move

Once you've done your research and feel confident, the final step is to apply! Or if you're still not quite sure, that's OK too – universities often have multiple intake dates, or you might like to look into similar options like student exchange instead.

What are my future options?

After you finish school, there's a whole wide world of future options out there for you. Maybe you want to study. Maybe you want to work. Maybe you want to travel. But how do you know what the right choice is for you? Well, you've got lots of options. And if one pathway doesn't quite fit, there's bound to be another. Let's take a look.

University

This is probably what most people think of when they're asked about what they want to do after school. University is a great option if you have a career in mind, and know what you need to study to get there (for example, if you want to be a doctor, you're going to have to study medicine).

Many students finish high school and use their results to gain entry to university. But this is far from the only way. There are a ton of alternative pathways you can take if your first option doesn't work out. You can find out more about applying to uni on our website here.

Vocational education

Speaking of study, uni isn't your only option. Vocational education and training (or VET) is a great way to get skilled for work, often in a much shorter time frame than university. Most VET courses don't have any entry requirements either, so you don't need to stress about results.

And if you decide you do want to study at uni one day, you can use your VET qualification for entry. You could even combine work and study by doing an <u>apprenticeship</u> or <u>traineeship</u>.

Work

Maybe you don't want to do any more study, and that's OK too. There are lots of jobs out there that you don't need a qualification to jump into.

Or, you could start at the bottom and work your way up – maybe you've had your retail job for a while, and there's an opportunity to become manager. Even better, you might come up with the next big idea and start your own business.

You might even find that you can access some pathways you thought you'd need a degree for – but this will usually take lots and lots of time and experience.

Gap year

Not quite sure what you want to do just yet? That's totally fine! You can always take some time off to evaluate your future options and spend time growing as a person.

Traditionally people take a gap year to travel, though this changed a bit thanks to COVID. Luckily, lots of travel and exchange programs are opening back up. You can combine your travel with work, or just get out there and have some great experiences.

Even if you don't want to travel, there's so much you can do – you could volunteer, pick up a new hobby, learn a new language, build your soft skills... The list is nearly endless.

Combine your options

You might've already figured this out, but one of the best (and most common) things to do is combine your options.

While you're studying, you might like to get a casual or part-time job. If you want to work full-time, you could upskill with microprograms or short courses that won't take time out of your busy day. Pick up a job while you travel overseas. Get a VET qualification, then use it to get into uni. Take some time off to rest and relax, then start studying mid-year.

The options out there are nearly endless! And if you don't end up liking the pathway you've chosen? You can always try a different one. Even if it's after six months, or twenty years down the track.

Wherever you want to go, there's probably more than one pathway you can take to get there.

How to become a Public Relations Professional

Public relations professionals use their communication skills to build relationships between organisations and the public. They implement communication and marketing strategies that help people understand what organisations do and their role within the community, and help maintain the organisation's good reputation. If you're a skilled communicator, confident with public speaking, and want a job that can take you almost anywhere in the world, becoming a public relations professional could be perfect for you.

What skills do I need as a public relations professional?

- Great communicator
- Can work well under pressure
- Excellent public speaker
- Confident & reliable
- Trustworthy & friendly
- Organised with good time management skills
- Adaptable & can think on your feet
- Works well in a team & independently

What tasks can I expect to do?

- Prepare and implement publicity campaigns and media strategies
- Speak to the media and public on behalf of an organisation
- Organise and attend special events for publicity
- Create crisis management plans to help maintain a good reputation
- Monitor press and media coverage about an organisation
- Advise management and executives on the public impact of their policies and decisions
- Collect and analyse data about public opinion
- Proof and approve external communications about an organisation

What industries do public relations professionals typically work in?

- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services
- Public Administration and Safety
- Health Care and Social Assistance

What kind of lifestyle can I expect?

Part-time roles are relatively uncommon for public relations professionals, with most working full-time. There is also the chance that you will have to do some overtime or weekend work.

Most public relations professionals earn an average wage.

Most of your work will be done indoors, with lots of face-to-face and interpersonal communication. There is





often the opportunity for travel to attend conferences and events. You may be able to do some of your work remotely or from home, but often need to attend events and speak to stakeholders in person.

How to become a public relations professional

You typically need a bachelor's degree in public relations, communications, business, or a related field. Additionally, gaining experience through internships or entry-level positions is highly recommended. Continuing education and professional development courses can also enhance your skills and knowledge in the field.

If you're in high school now and are thinking of a career in public relations in the future, here are some steps you could take:

- Volunteer or find work experience somewhere you will have the chance to work with the public and build your communication skills and confidence.
- Learning another language can help you promote a business or organisation to a much wider audience, and boost your prospects with potential employers.
- Start thinking about which industries and businesses interest you the most and do some research into what they do. Building networks now can help you when looking for work in the future.

7 sweet jobs for chocolate lovers

Are you an ultra sweet tooth, or perhaps fancy yourself the next <u>Chocolate Guy</u>? If you have a love for everything chocolate, we have some interesting jobs for you – take a look.

Chocolate Panning Machine Operator

If you've always wanted to know how chocolates are made behind-the-scenes, this could be the perfect job for you. Chocolate panning machines are used in commercial manufacturing to cover things with chocolate – you could be slathering chocolate on nearly anything, from nuts, coffee beans, and dried fruits to honeycomb, pretzels, and even rice cakes.

For this job, you'll need to be organised and efficient, as well as have good safety knowledge.

Chocolatier

This is probably the first job that comes to mind when people think of chocolate. Chocolatiers are the artisans who hand-create different types of sweet treats, typically in a gourmet or "premium" setting. They don't just make things like truffles and eggs — they even push the limits of chocolate and create mind-blowing sculptures and centrepieces.

Most chocolatiers learn their trade through an apprenticeship, and you'll need to have a steady hand and limitless creativity.





Chocolate Café Manager

If you prefer eating chocolate over making it, this job might be more up your alley. There are lots of cafés and patisseries that specialise in everything chocolate, and you could be the one running everything. You might be supervising other staff, keeping tabs on inventory, or coming up with new marketing promotions for the store. This job is suited to those with great communication, teamwork, and organisation skills.

Cocoa Research Engineer

Chocolate doesn't start out as bars – first, you need to grow the beans. As a cocoa research engineer, you'll be responsible for identifying the most efficient and highest quality cocoa growing and harvesting processes. This job is a mix of agriculture, science, engineering, and business – you won't just ensure that beans are plentiful, you'll also need to find ways of growing that are environmentally sustainable and ethical to the local community and workers.

Cocoa research engineers need to be inquisitive, analytical, and excellent problem-solvers. Here's an overview of what the job might involve at the Hershey Company.

Chocolate Hotelier

Featuring all things chocolate-themed, from chocolate-inspired rooms and chocolate-laden menus, to on-site chocolate shops, specialist chefs, and even chocolate spa experiences, chocolate hotels have been around for a while. Maybe you'll come up with the next cocoa getaway...

Don't believe us? Chocolate hour at the Movenpick Hotel in Melbourne serves up "complimentary chocolate themed sweets that change daily". Visit the Hotel Casa Cacao in Girona for chocolate themed breakfasts amongst other chocolatey treats. Or stay at Hotel Chocolat's Rabot Hotel in St Lucia, built on a cacao farm, where (of course) in-house treats and experiences are available daily. Some hotels like the Chocohotel in Perugia have even gone one step further, offering edible chocolate accessories and furnishings in their suites. If you want to become a chocolate hotelier, you'll need to have good business sense, an eye for design, and great people skills.

Chocolate Maker

Not to be confused with chocolatiers, chocolate makers are the magicians who turn cocoa beans into chocolate. They start by finding the finest beans, then using specialist equipment, they ferment, roast, grind, mill, refine, conch, and temper them, and finally add a variety of ingredients to create the melt-in-your-mouth products we love.

To excel in this role, you'll need to be hands-on, precise, and dedicated (and be able to resist the temptation to eat all your product before it's finished).

Chocolate Taster

Dream job, anyone? Just like it sounds, a chocolate taster's job involves tasting chocolate, ensuring it's just right before it goes on sale. You won't just be checking for flavour; you'll also be testing smell, texture, mouth-feel, and even the noise it makes when you break a piece off. Curious to learn more? In this job, you'll need excellent taste, keen senses, and great communication skills.

Indigenous youth mentoring programs

Mentoring programs are designed to help you get the most out of your education, support your wellbeing, or open up new and exciting opportunities. Mentors could help you achieve all that and more by working on building your confidence, providing inspiration, motivation, and support, and believing in your abilities. We've found some great mentoring programs tailored to Indigenous youth – see if there's one that interests you.

What is mentoring?

Mentors are people with experience and wisdom in a particular area or field who are happy to spend time sharing their knowledge with others who could benefit from it. They're not always old – even young people can make great mentors.

Mentors can provide guidance, motivation, emotional support, and role modelling. They could also help you with exploring careers, setting goals, developing contacts (networking), and identifying other useful resources you might like to engage with.

Indigenous youth mentoring programs that could suit you

Start off by speaking to someone at your school and see what programs or initiatives they already have on offer. If you know someone who has expertise or skills in an area you're interested in, then you could approach them directly and ask if they'd be willing to mentor you.

Or check out these Indigenous youth mentoring programs:

Aurora Education Foundation High School Program

This program provides you with academic, wellbeing, and cultural support over a 7-year period (from the start of Year 7 all the way through to graduation). Through the program, you and your family will be connected with Elders and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander mentors through regular engagement activities. All mentors engaged in the program are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.

Strong Brother Strong Sister

Strong Brother Strong Sister's mentoring program is led and run by Aboriginal youth specialists and professionals who possess a deep understanding of the challenges faced by Aboriginal young people. It's designed to cater to the unique cultural, social, emotional, health, and wellbeing needs of each individual, and it provides 1:1 personalised support, group support, and social, emotional, health, and wellbeing support. Read more about the program here.

The Smith Family

The <u>Smith Family</u> offers opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander youth living in remote communities. Their programs provide exposure to social and work experience you might not otherwise have access to.

There are a few programs you could sign up for, including <u>Girls at the Centre</u> and the <u>Indigenous Youth</u> <u>Leadership Program</u>.

Karreeta Koornong Maar

This new and exciting program is for young people in the Heywood/Portland/Hamilton area. The program will support young people aged 12-25 with a three-year mentoring program which aims to connect them to culture, build leadership skills, and support their future goals.

Deadly Mentorz Saltwater Young Leaders Program

The Deadly Mentorz Saltwater Young Leaders Program is a cultural mentoring program for primary and high school students. It aims to empower youth across the community who may be at risk of disengaging. Participants will foster and grow their confidence as young leaders through hands-on cultural workshops that align with traditional First Peoples cultural practices, and through participation in peer/peer mentoring. AIEF Mentoring Program

AIEF Scholarship Students are paired with an AIEF Mentor at the beginning of Year 10. You'll meet at school monthly and take part in group activities with other mentors and students twice a year. Mentors support students by listening, providing advice and guidance, and by acting as a sounding board for ideas and problems. Read more about the program here.

Ease the financial burden

Of course, the financial benefits of scholarships are one of the top reasons students apply. They're a great way to help you pay for your education and leave you with less debt once you graduate. Look at applying for scholarships as an investment in yourself and your future.

Scholarships could cover the costs of one or many things, such as:

- Tuition fees

Yes, applying for scholarships requires some of your valuable time and a bit of effort. But the rewards could make it all worthwhile; and if you don't apply, you'll never know if you could have been successful. Plus, remember all the benefits associated with just applying:
