Reflection by Rev Mark O'Brien OP

This Sunday's readings from Matthew contains parables two, three and four of the series of seven that begins with the parable of the sower. What binds these three parables together is the theme of the kingdom of heaven. One could imagine that as Jesus the master preacher tells his parable questions arise among his listeners which lead to the second parable, which raises further questions which in turn lead to the third parable. One gains the impression that each parable is designed to stimulate people to think, ask questions and make decisions. It is significant that a number of parables end with Jesus saying 'listen, anyone who has ears to hear'. In keeping with the Bible as an invitation to think rather than the imposition of thought, parables are meant to encourage people to reflect and make decisions about their lives.

The first parable about the wheat and the darnel addresses the troubling question why evil seems to permeate and threaten the lives of good, faithful people who believe in a God of justice (who is by definition intolerant of evil). If one's theology did not present God as intolerant of evil then who would be interested in following such a God? According to this parable, God (the sower) is portrayed as well aware of the conflict between good and evil and knows the best way of dealing with it. The wheat will be protected so that it can flourish; the darnel will not be allowed to overcome and destroy it. Thus, the situation is not out of (God's) control and good will ultimately triumph over evil at the harvest.

The parable of the wheat and darnel could give the impression that good and evil are sort of evenly matched, at least until the harvest. How can you be sure you are on the winning side (the kingdom)? The second parable of the mustard seed responds to this question. It assures its listeners that the kingdom of heaven is the reality that grows vigorously and vibrantly; even though it may begin like a mustard seed in a tiny way it far outstrips any rival and becomes a tree that offers protection for all those who seek it (the birds).

Although the second parable answers a question that is likely to arise from the first one, it in turn raises another question – Jesus, you say that the kingdom of heaven grows from tiny beginnings like a mustard seed to become a highly visible and welcoming 'tree', but I don't see it growing in any visible way in my life. How do I know the kingdom is here? In answer, Jesus tells the parable of the woman mixing yeast in flour. Once mixed in with the flour, the yeast effectively disappears. All one sees is flour. But the yeast works its way invisible to the human eye and transforms the dough into something new and highly desirable. Even though the presence of God may appear at times invisible to human perception, it permeates all creation and is bringing about its transformation.

Parables are an ingenious way of preaching the word of God and Jesus was a master storyteller. But words are not the only way human beings communicate; indeed at times words, even the words that Jesus spoke, are not the appropriate way to respond to a situation. Paul assures his readers that when words fail us or are not the appropriate way to 'speak' to God, the Spirit enables us to express ourselves and our needs in the most appropriate way, a way that is 'according to the mind of God'. God listens as attentively to those who are lost for words as to those who are gifted with words. No one is left unheard. Well aware of this, the author of the book of Wisdom celebrates our God who 'cares for everything' in a way that is perfectly just and merciful.

Gospel

Matthew 13:24-43

Jesus put another parable before the crowds: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everybody was asleep his enemy came, sowed darnel all among the wheat, and made off. When the new wheat sprouted and ripened, the darnel appeared as well. The owner's servants went to him and said, "Sir, was it not good seed that you sowed in your field? If so, where does the darnel come from?" "Some enemy has done this" he answered. And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" But he said, "No, because when you weed out the darnel you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow till the harvest; and at harvest time I shall say to the

reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn."

He put another parable before them: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the biggest shrub of all and becomes a tree so that the birds of the air come and shelter in its branches.'

He told them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like the yeast a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour till it was leavened all through.'

In all this Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed, he would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy:

I will speak to you in parables

and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Then, leaving the crowds, he went to the house; and his disciples came to him and said, 'Explain the parable about the darnel in the field to us.' He said in reply, 'The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom; the darnel, the subjects of the evil one; the enemy who sowed them, the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Well then, just as the darnel is gathered up and burnt in the fire, so it will be at the end of time. The Son of Man will send his angels and they will gather out of his kingdom all things that provoke offences and all who do evil, and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth. Then the virtuous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION: THE SPIRIT COMES TO HELP US IN OUR WEAKNESS

God's mercy and compassion are the themes running through today's readings.

The First Reading offers a description of God's divine nature. The author emphasises God's universal care and patience as signs of strength: characteristics that stand at odds with worldly values. In the midst of his troubles, the Psalmist also reflects on the qualities of the God of mercy and compassion. In the Second Reading, St Paul tells of the consequences of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in Christian prayer. Even when prayer is difficult for us as finite and limited human beings, Paul encourages us to hand over our struggles to the Spirit who prays deeply in our hearts to our Father.

The Gospel shares three parables about growth, each seen from a different perspective. The first tells of the wheat and the weeds. It challenges us to recognise that sometimes we must learn to live with situations we don't like, because the effort to remove or change them would do more harm than good. This is a shrewd picture of the patience and compassion needed to live with the ambiguities and complexities of human life.

Let us pray this week for a spirit of self-compassion in our frailty and limitations. We ask for the grace of deep humility and freedom to give of our best, and also to have faith in the God of surprises.
