SPX RED under 14 div 2,7/131 after 30 overs. Harbord Knights, 7/116 after 30 overs. SPX Red defeat Harbord Knights by 15 runs.

Overcast skies and the threat of rain greeted SPX Red U/14 Div 2 for its semi-final match against Harbord Knights on a rare but well-earned visit to our home ground at Oxford Falls. Following several indifferent efforts the boys were ready to raise their game from recent weeks and were sent into bat first by Harbord who won an important toss under gloomy skies.

With morning dew on the pitch the openers looked solid until the fall of the first wicket in the third over for 14 runs providing an air of confidence for the Harbord bowlers. A succession of tight bowling with a swinging ball saw an uncomfortable collapse from the top order to see SPX Red at 5/40 at the end of the 10th over. The recovery commenced with the inform batsmen of the last two matches, Nick Green playing a season defining innings of cover drives and pull shorts to form a match saving partnership with Cormac Molloy which saw the score reach 98 in the 23 over. This saw the enforced retirement of Nick Green on 29 not out. The remaining lower order batsmen then worked to build good partnerships to see the team complete their 30 overs at a very respectable score of 7/131. Other notable contributions from the bat came from Cormac Molloy who scored 15 runs and contributed to a 58 run partnership with Nick Green.

With the threat of rain pending and the voice of the coach reminding them to minimize sundries, the Harbord innings did not start well with Darcy Keenlyside taking a wicket in the first over of the innings. This was the catalyst for a mini collapse which saw the Harbord knights struggling at 3/14 in the seven over and well behind the required run rate. Just as the SPX Red bowlers looked like strolling through the remaining batsmen, light drizzle turned into heavy rain and play stopped for the first of two rain delays. A combination of a wet field, light rain, a slippery ball that resembled bowling with a piece of soap and a solid 5th wicket stand by Harbord Knights, the match quickly turned in Harbord's favour as they reached 5/90 in the 22nd over.

With the rain gone and the sun showing its face for the first time in the day, the SPX bowlers recovered to put the squeeze on the run rate by bowling tight lines , taking wickets and by restricting sundries to the lowest total of the whole season. With 17 runs required from the last over the boys celebrated a great team win where they performed well with bat and ball whilst having the worst of the weather conditions. Notable bowling figures were from Darcy Keenlyside (2/16), James Maloney (2/15), Declan Carroll and Antony DiMauro (both 1/10) and Andrew Guerrera the best of the day with 3 overs, 2 maidens, 1 wicket for 1 run. Another special mention to Leo Hart for taking close to the catch of the season to turn the game for SPX Red.

With their best performance of the season, and the lowest contribution to sundries the team enter into the Grand Final against Collaroy Plateau full of confidence and ready to give another performance to try and bring home the victory.
