GUIDELINES

STRUCTURE OF SPEECHES

- Students select one topic from the list of topics
- Prepared speeches, not impromptu
- Speeches are to be 2-3min in duration (a bell will be rung at 2min, followed by a final bell at 3min.)
- Students can complete their speeches at home and at school
- Palm cards may be used, but no other props
- Students will use the same speech throughout the different stages of the competition

- A speech is based on a central theme which is suggested by the topic
- The speaker should choose material suitable for the audience
- The speaker should choose a style of delivery suited to the material
- The purpose of this competition is for students to:
 - a. communicate their ideas
 - b. to inform
 - c. entertain
 - d. persuade
 - e. or any combination of these.
- The speaker must present a speech, not an act, recitation or a comedy performance.

Material:

- The content must be linked to the given topic, either directly or by suggestion.
- The speech must be substantially the speaker's own material.
