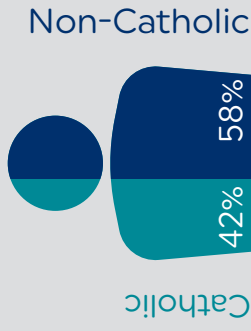
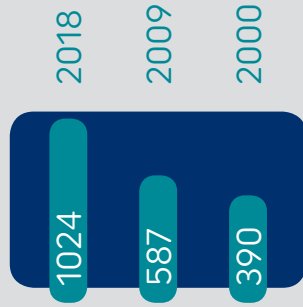


## Percentage of Catholic and Non-Catholic Students



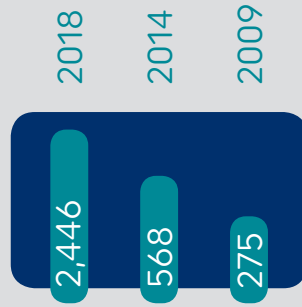

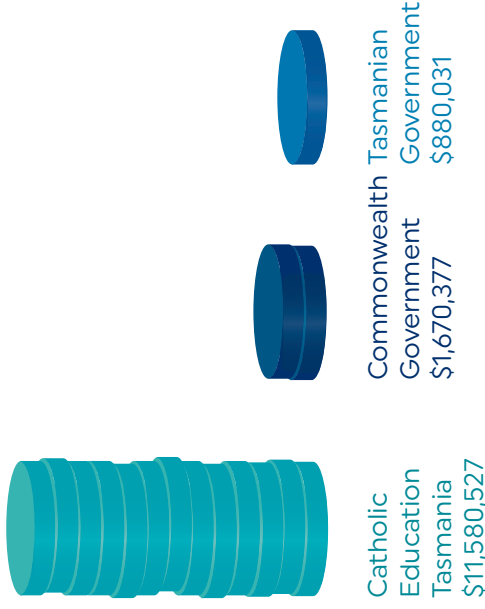

## How Governments help fund our schools

Since the early 1970s all Australian Catholic schools have received significant funding support from Commonwealth and state governments. This support has enabled our Catholic schools to consolidate their collective position as partners in the national educational endeavour – partners with governments, families and Church communities in achieving shared educational goals for young Tasmanians.

Commonwealth Government funding for Catholic schools enjoys bipartisan support. It has long been recognised by successive Australian governments that Catholic schools deliver value for the taxpayers' dollar, and that Catholic schools enhance social capital and community infrastructure.

Government and non-government schools are funded differentially in Australia's current federal and state funding models. Long term stability of funding for low fee Catholic schools remains a source of national debate and concern. To continue to provide quality education, our Catholic schools need appropriate funding from state and federal governments to ensure they remain an affordable option for families into the future.



In 2017 the Commonwealth Government provided 62% of the funding to Catholic schools in Tasmania. The Tasmanian Government provided another 18% and parents contributed 20% through fees and levies.

In 2017 Tasmanian Catholic schools operated at 93.2% of the net recurrent income per student of Tasmanian Government schools.
