

Applying through VTAC

1. Registering your VTAC account

Before you can apply through VTAC, you first need to register a VTAC account. Your VTAC account is where you manage applications for courses, SEAS and scholarships, bookings for admission tests and workshops, changing your preferences and updating your personal details.



How to Preference Your VTAC Application

You have up to 8 course preferences with VTAC.

It can be a little tricky getting your preferences in the right order to give yourself the best chance of getting the course(s) you want.





What is SEAS?

The Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) is a scheme aimed at helping students if they have experienced various types of disadvantage that has affected their education. If you are eligible for SEAS you still have to meet the institutional and course entry requirements, but it enables course selection officers to consider circumstances that may have affected your results or educational progress.

SEAS Categories:

There are four categories within SEAS that cover personal information and location, difficult circumstances, disadvantaged financial background and disability or medical condition.

Category 1 has a range of sub categories including age, living or school location, under-representation of a particular gender in a course or field of study, recognition as an Indigenous Australian, recognition for being from a non-English speaking background and first in family to attend tertiary study.

How Do You Apply for SEAS?

You apply for SEAS from within your VTAC account (so you will need to have created this already).

How to complete the SEAS application

- 1. Log in to your VTAC account
- To access the SEAS application, you must log in to your VTAC account using your VTAC ID and P
- 2. Make sure you've lodged a course application
 If you are eligible, SEAS becomes available once you lodge a course application.
- 3. Open the SEAS application
- o open the application, select 'Special consideration (SEAS) application' in your VTAC account and then click on the SEAS application link at the top of the page
- 4. Fill in the SEAS application and complete the evidence requirements
 There are four categories that make up SEAS. You only need to fill out the sections that are relevant to your circumstances. You must fill out at least one category for your SEAS application to be valid.

Note that each section has strict character limits (letters, spaces and punctuation marks), not a word limit. Keep your responses brief and to the point to avoid going over the character limit.

When Do You Apply?

SEAS applications open on Monday August1, 2022 and close on Friday October 7, 2022

What Evidence Will I Have to Provide?

The evidence you will need to provide to support your SEAS application will depend on the category(s) you are applying for.

There are 3 types of evidence you might be asked to submit:


- Impact Statement
- Statement of Support
- Financial Evidence
