What you need to know about Co-op Scholarships

Successfully applying for a co-op scholarship could do much more for you than simply covering your costs.

Premium scholarships with extra value

[Scholarships](#) are generally sums of money donated to applicants who meet the eligibility requirements specific to that scholarship. There are thousands available in Australia.

They could really make a difference to your tertiary education experience by removing financial pressure and other barriers that could otherwise prevent you from achieving your goals. Or they could help you start your working life with less debt than you'd otherwise have.

How great is that?

Co-op Scholarships go the extra mile. Not only do they provide some financial benefit (or in some cases **a lot**), they could also provide you with amazing extras such as:

- Mentoring
- Leadership and development programs
- Work experience
- Paid internships
- Tuition fees paid
- Guaranteed accommodation
- Access to workshops and special events
- Networking

Who can apply for a Co-op Scholarship?

Each scholarship is unique to the institution or provider, so you'll have to check that you'll meet the eligibility requirements before you spend time applying.

Co-op scholarships are generally open to high achievers. If you think that doesn't sound like you, it's still worth checking – merit isn't just given for amazing academic results, although it is often a pre-requisite.

Some scholarships will accept applications from people who've been recommended by their school for their outstanding contributions. Others want to reward individuals who've worked hard and made a difference with community involvement, or perhaps have shown great potential with their leadership abilities.

Competitive but worth the rewards

These esteemed scholarships are highly sought after, so the applications can be highly competitive – but they are definitely worth your time applying.

Many of these programs have a 100% success rate for employment upon graduation.

You might receive an income while you're still studying at uni, as some internships are salaried.

If you don't leave university with a job already lined up, the fact that you received a Co-op Scholarship will look fantastic on your resume, could appeal to potential employers, and may have provided you with relevant work experience and useful industry contacts.

In other words, you'll definitely be ahead of the pack.

There are benefits to just applying for a co-op scholarship

Putting yourself forward for Co-op Scholarships and completing the application will give you invaluable experience in completing intricate applications and doing well at interviews.

Your confidence could receive a little boost knowing that you're considered eligible, that your application was considered, and that you put yourself outside your comfort zone and survived intact.

In some cases, if your application isn't successful but the panel were impressed by your application, they could suggest alternative scholarships and programs to apply for.

Even if you don't exactly meet the eligibility requirements but you're close, you've excelled in some areas and your application really stands out, providers might just bend the rules for an outstanding candidate...it could be you.

So what's the catch?

If you're granted one of these highly prized Co-op Scholarships you'll be expected to take your studies seriously.

You'll have to make sure you stay on track and achieve your predicted ATAR results (or better).

Once you've enrolled at university and started your course, you'll have to maintain the required GPA in order to keep the scholarship. You might even have to comply with other requirements, e.g.:

- Help out at orientation week
- Commit to helping out on campus
- Active involvement within your chosen department
- Attending all additional programs and events that you're entitled to

Frequently asked questions (FAQs) about Co-op Scholarships

What ATAR do I need to be eligible for a co-op scholarship?

It really depends on the institution. For example, at [UNSW](#) you'll need a predicted ATAR of 96 or above to apply, whereas at [Federation Uni](#) if you have a predicted ATAR of 80 you could be eligible.

Some programs don't even specify an ATAR.

How are co-op scholars selected?

The application process for each scholarship varies, but you'll often have to:

- Meet all the eligibility requirement
- Complete a special application form available from the institutions before the closing date
- Provide supporting evidence and recommendations
- Complete a personal statement, answer some questions, or prepare a video or other element of the application
- Attend and interview to be assessed

You should carefully read all of the application details for the Co-op Scholarship you're interested in applying for to make sure you know exactly what to do.

Can I defer my Co-op Scholarship?

Some scholarships allow you to defer, but it's unlikely Co-op Scholarships will because they are so competitive and sought after – you'll need to check with the individual provider to confirm this though.

If you are successful in receiving a scholarship and then need to defer your enrolment, you might have to complete another application and go through the entire process the following year (if the institution allows for that).

Applying to University in the UK from Australia

If you'd like to study in the UK, there are a few things that you'll need to know.

Step 1 – Find out about Student Visa requirements

It's a great idea to start by looking at the [UKCISA \(UK Council for International Student Affairs\)](#) website. They specialise in providing advice and information to international students.

You'll have to make sure that you meet the [requirements for a Student Visa](#) and are eligible before you apply.

Make sure that you only take advice about your student visa from lawyers authorised by a designated professional body (for example, barristers, solicitors and legal executives) or advisers regulated by the [Office of the Immigration Services Commissioner](#) (OISC).

Step 2 – Will your Australian results qualify you to apply?

As a general guide, universities look for qualifications that are equivalent to the British high school A-levels. This usually means finishing Year 12 and receiving your high school certificate.

Each university you apply to will look at your results (including ATAR and individual subject results) and use them to determine the equivalent UK results. For example, the [London School of Economics](#) considers an ATAR of 96 to be equivalent to an A-level grade of AAB.

Similar to universities here, some degrees might also have pre-requisite subjects (such as Biology for medicine).

A portfolio may also be required for some art and design courses.

Step 3 – Make sure your studies will be officially recognised

Check if the University you'd like to study at provides officially recognised degrees on the gov.uk website here: <https://www.gov.uk/check-university-award-degree>.

Step 4 – Apply

The UK has a centralised applications system over there that's a little like our TACs here in Australia (UAC, VTAC, QTAC, SATAC, TISC). It's called [UCAS](#) (the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service) and is generally the easiest way for you to get into a UK-based institution.

You can apply for up to a maximum of five universities through this one online portal.

Writing a personal statement

If you're applying through UCAS, you'll need to include a personal statement as part of your application. The personal statement is one of (if not the most) important parts of your university application in the UK.

It's a chance for you to tell the unis about yourself and why you should study with them. Keep in mind that you will only submit one statement that goes to all the unis you apply to.

Getting a reference

You'll also need to include a reference in your application. This is a written recommendation from a teacher, careers adviser, or professional who knows you academically. Everyone needs a reference unless you get permission from your chosen universities and colleges.

Your exam results

Because Australian schools run on a different schedule to schools in the UK (their academic year begins in September and ends in June/July), you'll need to manually submit your results to the universities once you receive them. Some universities will ask for your results as soon as you submit your application, while others may conduct a preliminary assessment before asking for proof of your results.

If you haven't received your results yet, you'll need to supply predicted results instead.

You might be asked to attend an interview

Part of your application might include attending an interview. This is an important step in the process, so being prepared is crucial.

Make sure you apply before the [2023 entry application deadlines](#)

Like here in Australia, you'll need to get your applications in on time. Late applications aren't accepted, so if you miss out you're going to have to wait until next year (which isn't the end of the world as you'll be able to take your time choosing subjects, work to save up some money, or take a Gap Year).

- **Applications are open now for 2023 study** – they opened on 17 May this year.
- **15 October 2022 at 18:00 (UK time) early applications close** for 2023 entry to any course at the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, or for most courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry. You can add choices with a different deadline later, but don't forget you can only have five choices in total.
- **25 January 2023 at 18:00 (UK time) equal consideration applications close** for 2023 entry to the majority of courses.
- **30 June 2023 at 18.00 (UK time)** is the last chance for you to have your applications sent to the university of your choice. Any applications received after this date will go through the clearing system (see below).
- **21 September 2023 at 18.00 (UK time)** is the final deadline for applications to 2023 courses.

Types of offers

Once your application has been processed by the university, they will send you an offer. It can either be conditional (you need to meet extra requirements before it becomes certain), unconditional (you're in as soon as you accept), or unsuccessful (unfortunately you didn't get in during this round of applications).

Step 6: If you don't get an offer you can still apply though Clearing

If you didn't get an offer from any universities, all is not lost. UCAS has a process known as Clearing – a way for universities to fill any spots they have remaining after offers have been sent.

Once Clearing applications open (usually around July) search on the UCAS website for any courses available in Clearing, then either express your interest or contact the university directly to discuss your options.

Step 7: Research and apply for any Scholarships, grants, and bursaries for international students

Just like here in Australia, universities and other providers in the UK offer a variety of scholarships and grants to help you fund your studies.

To find scholarships, the best place to look is on the website of the university you're interested in or contact them directly.

Step 8: Plan where you'll be living

If you get into a uni in the UK, the next thing you'll need to do is find accommodation. Like here in Australia, you can choose between on-campus accommodation at the university, or private accommodation somewhere else.

Before you start your applications, attending open days is a great way to get a feel for a university and ask any lingering questions you might have. Even if you're on the other side of the world, you can always attend a virtual open day from the comfort of home.

You can apply directly to universities as well

The same as here, in the UK lots of universities allow you to apply directly as well. If you know where you'd like to study, hop onto the uni website and look for their applications pages or head for the international students' pages.

Contact them for more details about the process and what you'll need to do to apply. They're there to help you and will often have students who've been through the process to advise you.

Student Exchange Programs

Have you always dreamed of travelling overseas and experiencing new things? Through a Student Exchange Program, you could have the opportunity to study and live in another country.

What is Student Exchange?

As the name suggests, Student Exchange gives you the opportunity to travel to another country and attend school there – and in return, a student from the country you're visiting will live and study in Australia.

You'll attend school and learn just like the other students, and experience life with a host family. You can study overseas from as little as four weeks all the way up to an entire year.

Where can I go?

There are lots of countries you can choose from – you'll need to check with your school or private provider. The most popular destination countries for Australian and New Zealand students include USA, UK, Germany, France, Japan, Italy, Canada, Belgium, Spain and Argentina.

Am I eligible?

If you'd like to participate in a Student Exchange program, you generally need to be between the ages of 15-18 (in Year 9-12), and an Australian or New Zealand citizen or permanent resident. Some schools and States might have additional specific eligibility criteria, including minimum academic requirements, so make sure to check first.

You'll also need to be prepared to travel away from your friends and family, feel comfortable in an unfamiliar place, and potentially meet language requirements (depending on where you'd like to travel).

How can I organise a placement?

You'll need to speak to your school or find a registered provider in order to organise your exchange. If you're organising exchange through a private provider, make sure they are registered to provide programs in your State or Territory – this means the provider is safe and reliable, meaning you can travel with less stress.

You should start organising your placement as soon as possible, as you'll generally need to apply quite early and there may be caps on how many students can go on exchange each year.

How to become a Fitter

Fitters are qualified tradespeople who shape, assemble, and fit machinery parts (generally made of metal). You might be putting together brand new parts as a Fitter and Turner, or repairing and maintaining old parts as a Maintenance Fitter.

If you like to work with your hands and have a mind for maths, this could be the perfect job for you.

About you:

- Excellent problem solver
- Fit and active
- Good with your hands
- Great maths skills
- Precise and analytical
- Safety minded
- Quick thinking
- Works well under pressure

The job:

- Reviewing plans, drawings, and blueprints
- Choosing appropriate materials and machining methods
- Using tools to cut, file, plane, bore and drill metal
- Fitting and assembling fabricated parts
- Checking accuracy and fit of parts
- Diagnosing issues with parts and repairing them
- Performing general maintenance on machines
- Ensuring WHS rules are strictly followed

How to become a Fitter in Australia

To become a Fitter in Australia you will need to complete a relevant VET course, usually as part of an apprenticeship.

Step 1 – Complete Year 10 with a focus on English and Maths.

Step 2 – Find an employer willing to take you on as an apprentice, or consider a school-based apprenticeship.

Step 3 – Complete your VET qualification, usually a [Certificate III in Engineering – Mechanical Trade](#), while getting on-the-job experience.

Step 4 – Once you've completed your apprenticeship, start working as a fully qualified Fitter.

Step 5 – Consider specialising with further training.

What do Fitters do?

Fitters are responsible for manufacturing and fitting machine parts.

Which industries employ Fitters?

Fitters are mostly employed in the Mining, Manufacturing, and Construction industries.

What options are there for career progression?

You can start out with a basic qualification, before choosing to specialise in a particular area, including Diesel and Heavy Machinery, Marine, Mining, Construction, and more.

Do I need to go to university to become a Fitter?

No, but you will need to complete a VET qualification and get some hands-on experience, preferably through an apprenticeship.

Where do Fitters work?

Fitters usually work for private businesses, but can also work for local councils and government bodies. With enough experience, you might even like to consider starting your own business.

What are 3 things I can do right now to help me become a Fitter?

If you're in high school and you'd like to find out if a career as a Fitter is right for you, here's a few things you could do right now:

1. Get hands-on wherever you can – take a woodworking or shop class at school, offer to fix your mate's broken bike, or even put together your own computer at home.
2. See if you can find work experience in manufacturing or a related field. This will help you see if you might enjoy the work, and can help you start building important contacts for the future.
3. Talk to a Fitter to see what a day in their life is like. If you don't know anyone, see if you can watch videos or documentaries about a career in construction or manufacturing.
