First Sunday of Advent Year B

Saint Augustine once said: "It is by design that Our Lord hid the time and date of the last day from us.... It is so that we would be on the lookout for Our Lord every day of our lives."

The Gospel for this first week of Advent reminds us once again: awake, keep watching for the Lord. Jesus uses the image of a master who goes on a journey abroad, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told them to stay awake, be watchful and waiting for his return at an unexpected time.

Advent is a time to look at our lives and see if we are ready and awake to welcome Jesus into our lives again. In Jesus, God spoke to us in our human language. In Jesus, God is journeying with us through our light and darkness, our joys and sorrows

Christians, we are called to share the life of Jesus Christ. Living the life of Jesus Christ means embracing and accepting sufferings, hardship and crosses with love.

Advent is an opportunity for us to experience once again the Word of God taking flesh and living among us. May this Advent deepen our faith and help us to understand and live what the Scriptures reveal to us: be on your guard, stay awake, and vigilant to the daily visitations of our Lord.
