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FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Navigating the challenges together

It has been a year of two distinctive halves. In Semester One we continued to navigate COVID-19 challenges before returning to a sense of normality in the second half of 2022. It is pertinent to recall a message from Pope Francis in the early days of the pandemic. He referenced the Gospel of Matthew, which tells of how Jesus and his disciples were struck by a sudden storm while sailing on the Sea of Galilee. He said:

We have realised that we are on the same boat, all of us fragile and disoriented, but at the same time important and needed, all of us called to row together, each of us in need of comforting the other.

This message of hope was very pertinent throughout the year.

Our Governor General David Hurley shared a similarly positive message at the beginning of the year:

I hope that you share my optimism about the year to come, and our future. There will be challenges and there will be tough days. We will disagree on many things. But, as I said, we are a good people.

Thank you to our community for its understanding and support with respect to COVID-19 communications. It was a steep learning curve for us all as we followed government guidelines.

The pandemic created a wide variety of emotions and opinions. Invariably, we placed ourselves in the hands of health officials to make the best possible decisions on the information available. Our politicians and government officials are tasked with making decisions which are sometimes unpopular, and they will occasionally make mistakes. After all, they are human.

It was wonderful to have the schooling experience return to normality. The understanding, support and encouragement from within the John XXIII College community has been outstanding.

Building program

The 'hasten slowly' approach has been very appropriate to our College Building Program. We have had inevitable delays primarily due to three reasons:

1. Weather conditions – heavy rainfall in the past two winters
2. Underground service issues
3. COVID-19 labour and supply chain concerns.

Our current Building Program has created an opportunity to enhance our learning facilities and provide better amenities for students, staff and families.

There was much excitement in the middle of the year with the opening of our refurbished Ignatius Centre (library). The library is a modern, multi-functional learning space designed to enhance student learning with its distinctive areas to enable students to 'discover, innovate, collaborate and study'.

Each learning space is remarkable in design and caters for different styles of teaching and learning using space, furnishings and technology.

There are also two conference-style rooms which are collaborative spaces for group work and an upstairs mezzanine reading space.

The primary section has its own learning areas, highlighted by a beautiful open learning space for students to listen to teacher-directed stories. Smaller groups of students can gather around tables, couches and mats for reading, learning and game playing.

All of these learning spaces have access to modern technology, smart boards, write-on tables and walls and, of course, the thousands of books in our collection.

Our Year 12 students are also well catered for with access to the Ignatius Café as we create a learning space that is attractive and appealing.

The pandemic continues to significantly impact the construction industry. The uncertainty that it brings makes it challenging to accurately estimate finish dates for our other large projects. The College has been very happy with the guidance provided by our architects and the quality of work completed by our builders.

Early in 2023 it is envisaged that the 'A' Block refurbishment (ten classrooms and Examination Centre) and the new staff building and adjacent primary playgrounds, junior school car park and our existing staffroom and offices (new Wellbeing Centre) will be completed. Following the completion of these elements of the building program, the refurbishments of the existing administration block (new uniform shop and marketing/Alumni/Foundation offices) will be completed.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Strategic planning

The College Council and our College Leadership Team are continually looking to refine our own identity as a Catholic school in the Ignatian tradition. Two of the important directions for our consideration include:

1. What does it mean to be a Catholic school in the 2020s?
2. How do we refine and enhance the relationship between the College, Jesuit Education Australia, Loreto Ministries and Catholic Education Western Australia?

All Catholic schools are inspired by the Gospels of Jesus. Our Loreto and Jesuit charisms and the example of Pope John XXIII provide further insights. Some of our challenges can be articulated in the four-fold mission of Jesuit Education today:

1. Educating for Faith in an increasingly secular world.
2. Educating for Depth in our global society.
3. Educating for Reconciliation as we connect with issues of marginalisation and human rights.

4. Educating for Global Citizenship and a commitment to care for creation.

In the past few years, the College has signed an important System Membership Agreement with Catholic Education Western Australia and a Memorandum of Understanding with Jesuit Education Australia and Loreto Ministries. These documents have enabled greater clarity on lines of responsibility and delegation to enable the College to provide the best possible education for its students.

Our students and staff

We continue to experience huge demand for places, which is a credit to our students, staff and families, both present and past. The energy, enthusiasm and good humour of our students make our College a wonderful school. I am constantly amazed at the depths of their talent and ability and even more impressed with their quality as young people of compassion and conscience. This publication is about our students and the coming pages are a celebration of their giftedness.

The reality for most of our students is that their sense of Church is largely experienced through John XXIII College. The story is told of an elderly man looking at the bottom of a well:

'What are you doing?' a young child asked.

'Looking at God.'

'Can I have a look?'

The man lifted the child so that he could gaze into the well.

'I can only see myself.'

'Exactly' responded the man.

How we can create wonder and awe within our Catholic faith remains the challenge of all Catholic schools. Our weekly College Masses are a highlight and many faith-filled opportunities are provided to our students through our Roncalli Service and Pilgrimage programs. The efforts of our staff in this context have also been outstanding.

This year, we had a theme of '*aggiornamento*' or opening the windows of the Church. It was very appropriate given the 60-year anniversary of the Second Vatican Council.

Our staff told beautiful stories of '*aggiornamento* moments' in their lives and the impact of their own families. At a Secondary Assembly, I stressed the importance of honouring our families and making the most of the opportunities we have been afforded.

It is a theme that has resonated for me.

When I was a child, my parents built a house around the corner from Aquinas College. It enabled their three sons to attend Aquinas and our sister to attend Santa Maria. It has been an emotional time for me with the announcement of my appointment to be Principal at Aquinas as I remember the important influence of my family from my earliest days. However, my decision was tinged with much sadness, as I love John XXIII College and its students, staff and families. I have been appreciative of the incredible understanding and support I have been provided, which is a wonderful reflection of our community.

The College is also farewelling Mrs Jessica Bouwman (Deputy Principal and Acting Vice Principal) at the end of this year. Her contribution to our College has been outstanding over many years.

One of the initiatives of our current Strategic Planning process is succession planning for the College Council and the College Leadership Team. Mr Julius Matthys' term as Chair of the Council has concluded and Dr Courtenay Harris is the new Chair. Both have been outstanding leaders of the Council and have been largely responsible for the excellent relationship between the Council and the College Leadership Team.

I have often reflected on a beautiful question posed by a Vietnamese Loreto Sister:

'Where is the soil of my soul?'

In many ways, the 'soil of my soul' will always be at John XXIII College.

The College Council has been committed to a thorough recruitment process to ensure that there is a smooth transition of leadership. We look forward to the commencement of a new leadership team in 2023, and thank

This year we have had the opportunity to work with our founding Orders, Loreto Ministries and Jesuit Education Australia, to finalise a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to guide the College in our commitment to our history. This MOU aims to enable the Ignatian and Loreto charisms and heritage to be shared and enriched through participation at all levels of the College. Additionally, this year the College has continued working with Catholic Education Western Australia (CEWA) around our System Membership Agreement, ensuring strong governance, while recognising our independence as a non-diocesan Catholic school.

Our Finance and Risk Committee has seen a change in leadership with Mr Simon Martin taking on the role of Chair. We thank Mr Neil Hackett for his excellent stewardship as Chair for the past several years. The committee has continued to provide exceptional guidance and support for the College during our capital development, and continues with planning for the impact of the 2024 changes to federal funding and how we can best minimise the impact of this reduced funding on school fees in the current climate.

Our Property and Planning Committee, now under the leadership of Mr Adrian Iredale, continues to work closely with the College Leadership Team and College architects in finalising the current Building Program. It has been an exciting time watching the campus transform with the new learning and teaching, administration and staff facilities, playgrounds and parking areas. We also acknowledge all the College community members for their flexibility, cooperation and patience this year as timeframes have been extended due to the unforeseen circumstances caused by COVID-19. We look forward to moving in and making use of all the new facilities in 2023.

The College Council has sadly farewellled Mr Julius Matthys (College Chair), Mr Robert Wallwork (Property and Planning Committee Chair), Mr Rom Cirillo (Jesuit Education representative), Ms Cate Sydes (Loreto Ministries) and Mr Michael Anderson (Foundation Chair) this year. All members have provided outstanding leadership to the College and Foundation and we extend our appreciation for their dedicated service and commitment. We also welcomed new Council members Mr Paul Ould (Loreto Ministries), Mr Adrian Iredale and Mr Simon Martin who joined Council during the year, and thank

current member Mr Christian Owen for taking on the Deputy Chair role.

This year, in very challenging times, we have continued to witness the College community striving to ensure our students access the exceptional education available at our College. On behalf of the College Council, I extend our gratitude to our dedicated

staff, parent volunteers, Council and sub-committee members, Foundation members, supportive College parents and carers, and commend our students for their efforts and resilience in navigating their learning this year. This year's edition of *Companions* is a wonderful reflection of the efforts of the College community to bring to life the many events

FINANCE AND RISK

John XXIII is an independent Catholic College with a legacy of delivering exceptional co-education for over 40 years.

The Finance and Risk Committee supports the Council and Leadership Team by providing oversight of the financial and risk management of the College. This includes the review of annual budgets and monitoring ongoing financial performance, review and endorsement of financial accounts, ensuring an appropriate risk management framework and insurance program is in place, recommendations on tuition fee levels and securing financing options to fund the operations of the College and the Master Plan for capital works.

The College has always provided significant financial support for families in times of genuine financial hardship, and we will

continue to offer this support. The Committee oversees written policies and procedures guiding the College Leadership Team on how to balance this compassionate support with fair and equitable treatment for all families at the College.

Changes to the federal government funding model will have a negative impact on the College's finances in forthcoming years. State funding is channelled via Catholic Education Western Australia (CEWA), after the imposition of CEWA levies. From 2024 the College will also lose the benefits of group CEWA funding. The combined impact of this reduced federal and state funding has been incorporated into our long-term financial forecasts and

fee increases will be spread over time to manage the impact.

John XXIII College is extremely fortunate to have the expertise of the members of the Finance and Risk Committee, working alongside the dedicated College Finance and Risk Team, led by John Cumming, to ensure the College's strong financial position. I would like to thank the members of the Committee and College Finance and Risk Team for their ongoing efforts during this last year, which provided numerous challenges including the management of risks associated with COVID-19.

PROPERTY AND PLANNING

I also wish to thank the grounds and maintenance staff for continuing to maintain the outstanding presentation of the College grounds during this period of construction and for their significant contribution to achieving the incredible learning environment at John XXIII College.

Some achievements of the Foundation in 2022 include:

- The creation of the Engagement Committee, which strives to connect with the many sectors of our community and will continue to build on these relationships through additional events and activities
- Hosting (along with Alumni) the Loreto past pupils for a Spring Garden Party that saw over 70 women (and men) come together in the Circle of Friends café
- Creating a reflective space at the College to commemorate Koolyangarra bequests to the Foundation under the Koolyangarra Dove
- Driving the establishment of a bush tucker sustainable garden which incorporates the Noongar six seasons and is an acknowledgement to the First Nations People, from whom the name Koolyangarra has come (Noongar for ‘place of happy children’)
- This commitment to sustainability is also reflected in the Foundation’s stewardship of the funding for the Year 12 Sustainability Award, created by Dr Margaret Yoon.
- Supporting the fundraising for several sporting activities including the Rowing Club, and providing an opportunity for donations to be made to support the STEM Drone Club.

Most significantly, the Foundation has now offered two Bursary placements to families who otherwise could not afford a John XXIII College education. These Bursaries fund the tuition fees for the students and are for the duration of their education at the College. Our Bursary program has only been made possible by the generosity of John XXIII College community members, who continue to live the values of being people for others by generously donating the gift of education.

VICE PRINCIPAL

This year has seen our students continue to grow and develop into wonderful young people ready to actively participate in both our College community and wider society through their involvement in a plethora of learning opportunities, both in and out of the classroom.

Our Wellbeing Programs in Years 7 to 12 were successfully implemented, highlighting the ongoing commitment to teaching our students the necessary skills to be resilient young people, willing to embrace challenges and learn from these experiences. The programs have been developed within our Ignatian context of *cura personalis*, solidarity and kinship and being people for others. The programs aim to develop knowledge and skills within our students to empower them to know themselves, their strengths and also the best ways for them to embrace challenges and maintain perspective, resulting in well-rounded young people confident of their abilities and strong in their desire to be active members of the communities they belong to.

R U OK? Day was celebrated through a variety of means this year. Our annual R U OK? Day Secondary Assembly was highlighted with personal perspectives from two of our Year 12 students, Tom Stokes and Holly Martin. 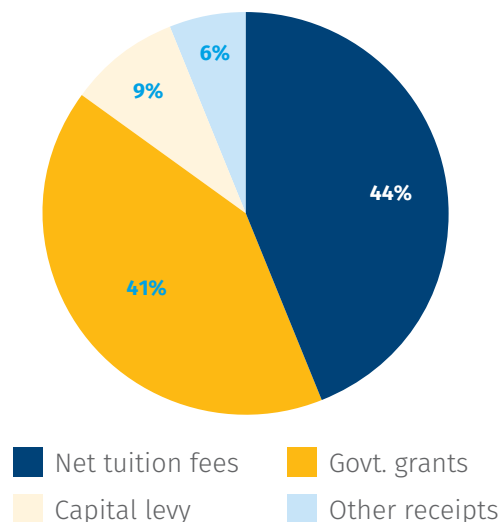

The financial year in review

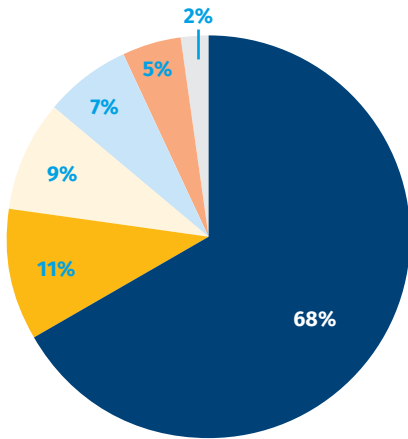
At the time of writing, the College finances were tracking in line with budget, both from an operating and capital perspective. The capital expenditure resulting from the Building Program has been delayed, consistent with timing delays present in the building industry. The College receives 42% of its income from the commonwealth and state governments, with private income accounting for the remaining 58%. The College uses its capital levy to debt-service the existing loans, as well as providing for the necessary capital development and improvement to facilities as indicated above.

School fees and charges are set after taking into account the commonwealth and state government grants we receive. The College is in a transition phase with respect to commonwealth government funding through until 2029. This means that we will receive annual funding decreases from 2024 through to and including 2029. In terms of setting fees and charges each year, the College Council ensures that any increases made during the annual budget process are warranted and necessary to ensure the existing and future financial viability of the College.

Ignatius Centre

The College library (Ignatius Centre) underwent a full redesign and refurbishment in 2021. Starting with a blank canvas, the result is a fantastic, vibrant, modern learning environment, that is being enjoyed by the whole College community.

Our new library embraces best-practice principles of contemporary educational design to support many different styles of teaching and learning. A range of flexible learning spaces, equipped with cutting-edge technology, allows students to work individually and in small or large groups. Careful attention has been paid to design

and furnishings to enhance the learning experience. The upstairs mezzanine reading space and the Library Café have proven to be highly popular features, and help to make the library an enticing space for students. Primary students are also well catered for with their own tailor-made spaces and an inviting open learning area.

Book Week

Each year across Australia, the Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) brings children and books together to celebrate CBCA Book Week. Schools, libraries, booksellers, authors, illustrators and children celebrate Australian children's literature. The theme for Book Week 2022 was 'Dreaming with Eyes Open'.

At John XXIII College, Book Week is a key event on the calendar, a time of great anticipation and celebration. The prospect of celebrating Book Week in 2022, was particularly exciting and challenging.

The recent library transformation certainly facilitated this process. The design of the two larger Innovation and Collaboration spaces lent itself to hosting a combined primary and secondary library event.

Considered our biggest Book Week yet, Book Week 2022 offered a range of opportunities to celebrate literature and authors. Each morning in Homeroom, students

eagerly collaborated on Book Week quizzes and competitions. Giant Games were available at lunch time in the library courtyard. Constructing and crashing giant Jenga towers, competing in Connect Four, and navigating a supersized Snakes and Ladders board inspired teamwork and camaraderie.

The 'Book Week Bake Off' cake competition was held in the Innovation area. Technology innovation

The College has embarked on several significant technology-based projects in 2022. These include:

- Fitting every book in our collection, housed in the Ignatius Centre, with an RFID tag. This allows us to circulate multiple books simultaneously, deploy self-serve kiosks and automate the process of stock-taking.
- Relocating the College ICT Helpdesk to the Ignatius Centre as a central point for students and teachers to gather for ICT assistance.
- The ongoing use of technology in the classroom to enhance learning opportunities.

PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

The John XXIII Parents' Association is the equivalent of the Parents and Friends' Associations in other schools. Its overall aim is to provide opportunities for parents to partner with the College in the education and support of their children and to strengthen the values of the College community. Its main objectives are to provide physical assistance via a parent volunteer network, contribute funds for proposals that support student development and promote social interaction and connection between the parents and guardians of students attending the College. All these elements work together to enhance the strong spirit of inclusion and belonging that characterises John XXIII College community life.

All parents and guardians of students attending the College are deemed members of the John XXIII College Parents' Association. The Committee itself is comprised of a President, two Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary and up to ten General Members. We meet once a term to hear updates from the College Leadership Team and Parent Coordinators, to determine the allocation of funds to proposals presented by members of the College community and to address issues raised by the parent body for consideration and support.

This year the Parents' Association approved funding to purchase some new more advanced drones for the STEM Drone Club, as well as to provide upgrades to existing drones to enable greater capability. The drones are used for photography and videography for all the school events and are

part of a commitment to a strong and varied STEM cocurricular program preparing students for the future. The STEM Drone Club is a great avenue for students who might not otherwise get an opportunity to gain experience in this fast-developing field. We also funded the purchase of new basketball rings and soccer goals for the Primary School playground for use during lunchtime and recess as this was identified by parents as an issue, with the current building affecting the usual facilities available to students. A third year's subscription for all College families to the Sustainable Schools Shop was also approved. This online system enables parents to recycle preloved uniforms and textbooks, in line with the College's strong commitment to sustainable practices. Funding of the annual Year 7 Parents' Welcome Event was also approved. COVID-19 lockdown at the start of the year pushed the event back to Term Three, but it was still a huge success and enthusiastically attended by most of the Year 7 parent cohort.

We are very grateful for the energy and efforts of parents who coordinated the subsidiary arms of the Parents' Association, this year: Inspire (parent education: Jodi Mills and Fiona Bailey; Roncalli Care (parent meal rosters: Paula Hackett); PAL Convenors (coordination of primary and secondary PALs: Head Convener Emma Smith and Secondary Convener Jody Lennon); Men of John XXIII (fathering advice and support: Eric Maroni), and FOMAD (coordination of parent involvement in music and drama: Kristin Serra and Susanne

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

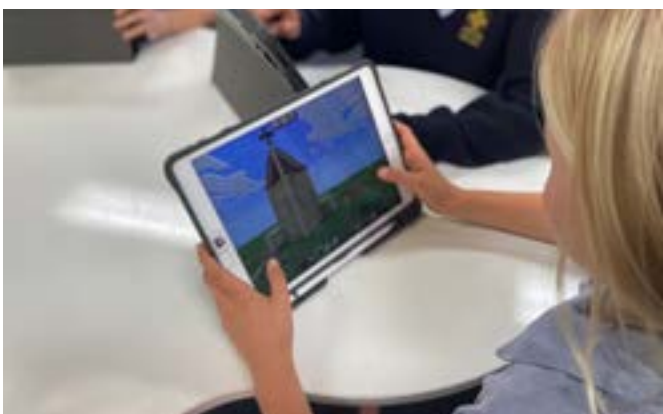
The Digital Technologies Lab has been buzzing this year with robotic devices!

Silence echoed down the street full of ghosts. Blood still flowed through their veins and air still filled their lungs, but they weren't alive. Our hearts were abandoned along with the memories we chose to forget. Our souls stolen by the demons who placed a target on our backs and starred bands on our arms. Leaving us alone with the fear that was suffocating us all.

I hold my breath and send a silent prayer to heaven, begging for mercy and compassion.

The soldiers barely spare me a second glance and I swiftly turn the corner, not before glancing back at the young brunette three storeys high. She's watching me. Her porcelain skin reflecting the sun's rays, as her eyes grind into my soul, what's left of it anyway. And in that moment, I relate to this girl. She is alone, afraid and suffocating in the fear that drowns us all.

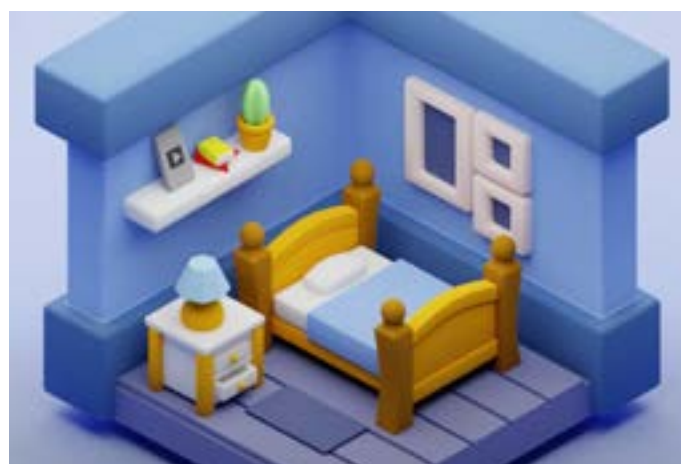


MEDIA STUDIES

Years 11-12 ATAR

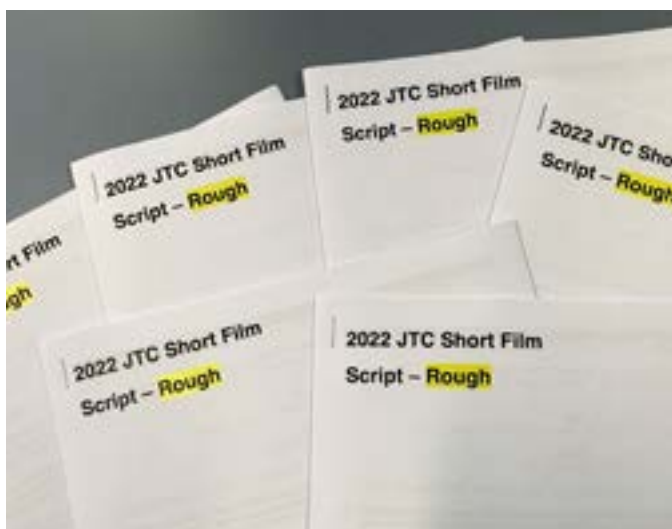

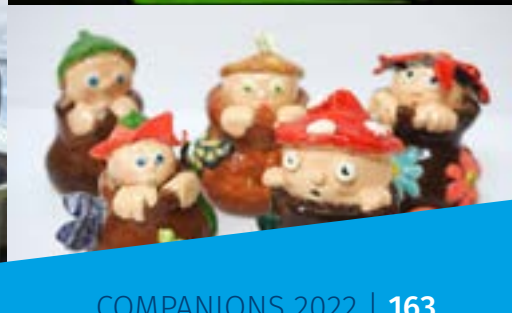

TECHNOLOGIES

At John XXIII College, the Technologies Department includes courses in Digital Technologies, Engineering Studies, Food Science, Materials Design (Textiles), Materials Design (Wood), and Career Pathways. The technologies courses provide students with opportunities to integrate their learning from mathematics, science, and English into real-world applications. This year all courses incorporated new projects and offered co-curricular clubs to foster the students' curiosity.

Digital Technologies

In 2022, the Digital Technologies courses used state-of-the-art microprocessors and robotics to enhance student engagement. With

the inclusion of the BBC Micro:bit, the Hummingbird Robotics Kits, and Lego EV3 Robotics, students were able to bring their digital ideas to life.

In Year 7, students used BBC Micro:bits to reimagine a fidget cube. Teams of students designed a digital fidget cube using the inputs and outputs on the Micro:bit and created a unique skin to give their prototype life. The Wonder Cube, The Skrunkly and The Big Baby were a few of the solutions imagined.

In Year 8, students used the Snap! coding language to program an interactive game and control robots constructed from the Hummingbird Robotics Kits. Some of the outstanding ideas were a robotic helicopter, a carnival chair ride, a microwave and a fishing boat.

The Year 10 Digital Technology course was reimaged this year.

The students explored topics in cybersecurity, learnt how to interrogate a database using SQL Lite, created a web page using HTML and CSS, and innovated with physical computing using the Raspberry Pi.

The JTC Robotics Club team consisting of Izaac Paton (Year 8), Ollie Byrnes (Year 8), Kiran Kulcar (Year 8), George Foster (Year 7), Jack Schoemaker (Year 7), Deiran Raman (Year 8), Lucas Benton (Year 8), Tozi Mhembere (Year 8), Thomas Ellis (Year 8) and Joseph Nankivell (Year 8) competed in the FIRST LEGO League Competition, focusing on the topic of energy transformation this year. The students attended the It Takes A Spark! Conference to learn about energy transformation from industry professionals.

Engineering

The word engineering is derived from two Latin words: *ingenium* meaning 'cleverness' and *ingeniare* meaning 'to contrive, devise'. These two words encapsulate how students at John XXIII have engaged in our Engineering courses this year.

The Year 10 Engineering students competed in the Engineering and Science Challenge for the first time this year. The event was a whole-day excursion where the students worked in groups to compete in a variety of challenges using problem solving, critical thinking and teamwork skills. With fierce competition, the John XXIII students came in second place, and many

students described the day as a highlight of the year.

The dream of computers designing structures for us through artificial intelligence has become a reality for us at John XXIII. The Year 9s have studied generative design, an up-and-coming field in modern engineering. The students input their design parameters and the software creates an optimised structure to withstand the variety of forces experienced. Generative design can be used to create objects such as car parts, buildings, or even a chair as seen in the picture below. Interestingly, the produced model often mimics nature with organic tree-like forms.

Our first cohort of ATAR Engineering Studies students commenced this year. With a specialist field of mechatronics, the students have been learning theory about electronics, control systems, automation and mechanical systems. Using this knowledge, they have developed material handling systems which are able to transport materials and sort them by colour. It has been enjoyable to see each student's unique designs, ranging from Archimedes screws to spinning wheel launchers. They are looking forward to the Year 12 course where they can choose their own project and problem to solve.

TECHNOLOGIES

Food Technology

Food Technology gives students the opportunity to master different cookery methods and design simple dishes given criteria and limitations. This helps students gain the confidence and skills to prepare meals at home.

This year, students have had the opportunity to develop their skills further by taking two Food Technology courses over the year in Years 8 to 10. The Year 8 students created Texas burgers, designed novelty cakes, and made sweet puff pastry. As part of the new Year 9 course, students investigated sustainable ways to avoid food wastage by using food that was in season and locally grown. Students learnt about preserving techniques and made jams, pickles and chutneys. Each used their creations to design a hamper for their family.

The ever-popular Food Truck project was out in full force! The Year 10s created a menu and designed a concept for their personal food trucks. The entries went head-to-head and the best recipes were offered for sale to the College community. All proceeds went to charity. In Semester Two, students investigated the functional properties of food including creating egg yolks from fruit juice, honeycomb, and a smoky aioli. Students used these techniques to create a menu to serve staff at a high tea luncheon.

Hospitality

In Years 11 and 12 Hospitality, the challenge of serving food during COVID-19 provided students with opportunities to develop a range of problem-solving skills. To keep year levels apart, the students served food from different locations

on campus and incorporated a cashless ticket system for food orders. The system was very successful and helped the program to eliminate food wastage thus supporting the sustainability initiatives promoted by Pope Francis's encyclical, *Laudato Si'*.

The Year 11 students helped to support the College's wellness initiatives by providing the staff with a fabulous lunch of lasagne and cinnamon rolls, and the Year 12s provided the staff delicious fish sandwiches during morning tea in Term Two. Coffee experts taught the students how to be excellent baristas. They put their new skills into practice by offering a coffee service to staff during recess on Wednesdays in Term Three.

The interest and enthusiasm from students wishing to learn how to construct and adapt their own clothing grew in 2022. In an age where mainstream trend cycles are moving at a rapid pace the desire for one-off custom clothing is valued by many young people.

Textiles students were encouraged to use their sewing skills to alter and upcycle clothing and materials, encouraging a more sustainable way of viewing fashion and textiles. Ms Kiri Moore and Miss Angie Bollam led lower school Textiles to success this year, producing some amazing wearable and non-wearable items including the Year 8 students' soft sculptures

of monsters and cacti, the Year 9 students' upcycled chip packet pencil cases and snug hoodies, and the Year 10 students' recycled material bucket hats and bags.

In Year 11 and 12 General Textiles students developed their skills and design processes by creating a coordinated set and a costume design garment. During the design process, students need to consider a client and analyse factors such as climate, comfort, versatility and fit. Upper school students developed their practical skills further, focusing on advanced construction techniques by designing and producing a button-up shirt and shorts set. It is amazing to see the variation in designs due to students' design choices and

personal style, with innovations in fabric choice, embellishment and pattern alteration. The students then took on the role of a costume designer, analysing a character from film, television, stage, or literature to create a traditional or contemporary costume design.

Outside of class time, students have been flocking to the lunch time Textiles Club to work on their class projects or other personal projects. The atmosphere of the Textiles room is exciting and engaging, with creativity and collaboration a common practice among those students who are passionate about the subject.

TECHNOLOGIES

Wood Technologies

Materials Design and Technology is becoming increasingly more valuable in today's society where creativity, innovation, problem solving and the use of technology are embedded in our day-to-day lives. At the College, students can learn about Materials Design and Technology in a woodworking context, where they are exposed to the design thinking process, and workshop skills and techniques. Technology is incorporated into the program with the use of design software, laser cutting technology and the latest woodworking tools and machinery.

With the introduction of our new wood lathes, the students were able to learn a variety of new woodworking techniques this year which were evident in the Year 10 coffee table project. Students from Years 11 and 12 also had the opportunity to use the lathes to successfully enhance their design projects, including turned cabinets or table legs.

In Years 7 to 10, students first complete a skills task before working through the design thinking process to create their own unique design project given a particular example. Some design project examples over the year include chopping boards, clocks, shelving units and lamps.

In Years 11 and 12, students are given the opportunity to create larger and more detailed projects and are given greater freedom when it comes to the design thinking process. Students enjoyed experimenting with resin on many of their projects and the Year 12s produced some outstanding cabinets.

The skill and experience students attain in the woodworking context forms a great foundation for a career path in a variety of industries and it fosters a passion for creativity and a hobby in woodwork.

PATHWAYS AND TRANSITION

At the end of 2021 Pathways and Transition farewelled Ms Lyn Alexander, who devoted over two decades of exceptional service to John XXIII College. Ms Jane Hedley took on the Head of Pathways and Transition role this year and has been delighted by the engagement of students, dedication of staff and the care and support from families in the College community. Mrs Kelli Beaton remains steadfast in the Pathways and Transition team and is thanked immensely for her care and commitment.

Year 10 Pathway Planning classes, occurring once per week over Terms One to Three, were an opportunity for Year 10 students to build their understanding of personal aptitudes, interests, values and influences and to explore how these aspects might align with particular careers and industries. The College invested in a new career education platform called The Careers Department, which is aimed at deepening students' exploration of careers via virtual work experience and interactive media. A core objective of Pathways Planning is to arm students with knowledge about different pathways in Years 11 and 12, and beyond school, in the lead up to their course selections. As such, all Year 10 students attended the Perth Careers Expo at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre, as well as our in-house Pathways Expo. Both events

afforded students the opportunity to learn about diverse educational opportunities and career pathways as they networked with staff from John XXIII College, the five WA universities, the two metropolitan TAFE Colleges and several other private registered training organisations and industry bodies.

In 2022 the College had a total of 44 students in Year 11 and 12 who engaged in off-site vocational education and training (VET) and five Year 12 students who undertook the Curtin Uni Ready program. 11 of our Year 12 students studied Certificate IV in Business, eight studied Certificate IV in Education Support and nine students studied either a Certificate III or IV in Fitness. The remainder of our 44 students engaged in diverse areas of VET such as electrical, surveying, cyber-security, engineering, horticulture, hairdressing, nursing

preparation, media production, sport and recreation and automotive.

It is truly wonderful that our students can achieve nationally recognised, industry-endorsed qualifications, as well as engage in safe and authentic workplace learning, all the while sustaining their connection to the College community and fulfilling their schooling and, for many, university entrance requirements. Every student who engaged in off-site VET in 2022 is commended for their courage to step away from their comfort zone and their dedication in managing not only their school-based study and commitments (within a four-day week), but also their workplace learning and/or training commitments.

One of the great privileges of the Head of Pathways and Transition role at John XXIII College is getting

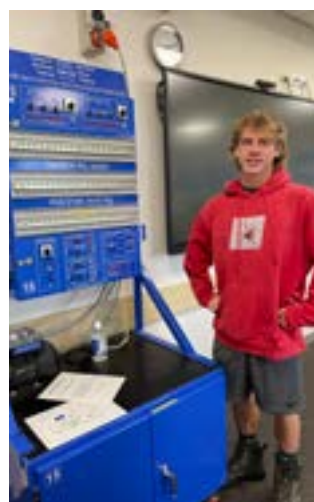
to meet the vast majority of Year 12 students, and many Year 11 students, in one-to-one interviews and hearing about their transition-from-school plans. Year 11 and 12 students showed a tremendous amount of curiosity and personal responsibility by researching courses, careers and scholarships and attending higher education provider open days and career and industry expos throughout the year.

It has been very exciting to hear about the hundreds of early university offers Year 12 students have received since WA university applications opened early in April. Several students have indicated their intention to travel interstate and overseas to pursue their education or gap years, which is especially wonderful to hear after the pandemic-related cessation of travel over the last couple of

years. With no indication from WA universities that they intend to stop early offers, Year 11 and 12 students are encouraged to work hard to ensure that their school reports reflect their best selves; they may well need those school reports to secure early university offers.

Ethics Olympiad

Our Senior Ethics Team, which consisted of four talented Year 10 Magis students, Gemma Bailey, Meg Cleary, Meg Derbyshire and Asha Paton, did exceptionally well at this year's Ethics Olympiad. This competition is designed to get students thinking, talking and ultimately working together on some of the tough moral issues of our time. *'It's always a pleasure to listen to the other teams who challenge your perspectives and ideology – helping you expand the way you view ethical and moral problems,'* said Meg Derbyshire. Our Senior Ethics Team was awarded the Silver Medal in the Australasian division, which meant that they progressed to the International Ethics Olympiad Final. Our team competed against 40 qualifying teams from seven countries: Australia, New Zealand, Canada, China, India, Singapore and Hong Kong. The international panel of judges commended our students on a superb ethical discussion, awarding them the bronze medal. *'I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to represent the College in the Ethics Olympiad. To get into the finals was so unexpected and I am so proud of our team and our achievement,'* said Asha Paton.

SUSTAINABILITY CLUB



This year we have attempted to ensure that the College is interacting positively with our local environment and the planet.

Students, parents and staff participated in a number of sessions this year where we planted native trees and shrubs on the western side of the College. All of the species planted are waterwise and provide food, shelter and nesting spaces for our local reptile and bird species. During these sessions we managed to plant over 150 plants. As well as the native species, we also planted three macadamia and two almond trees on the western bank, which are a nutritious food source for the endangered Carnaby Cockatoo. This native species planting will be an ongoing focus of the sustainability initiatives at the College.

In an effort to become more self-sustaining, we have also planted a number of stone fruit and citrus trees around the College this year. The fruit from these trees will be

distributed to staff and students and can be used by students in Food Technology classes. During Term Four, a bush tucker garden was also established near the Koolyangarra Cross at the front of the College. This garden will teach our students about Aboriginal culture and they will also be able to incorporate these plants and their fruits into their cooking.

There has also been a focus this year on continuing to educate the students about the impact of waste on our local environment and encouraging students to take ownership of the way in which they dispose of their waste. Homerooms have taken turns in participating in morning cleanups around their Homeroom blocks. We have placed decals on many of the bins at the College that feature images of endangered native animals and

messages encouraging the students to help protect our planet by disposing of their rubbish correctly. Many thanks go to the Barry family for the generous donation which made this initiative possible.

On John XXIII Day this year, members of the Sustainability Club ran a secondhand clothing stall and sold plants which they had grown or propagated. The stall managed to raise over \$350.

Thanks go to the Sustainability Captain Jenna Aylmore and all the students, parents and staff members who supported sustainability initiatives this year. A huge thank you must also go to the College grounds staff, who provided much valuable assistance this year.
