To put it into a nutshell, the resilience is the outcome of all - as we economists say - "agents" and I would like to thank all of you once more, students, teachers, parents, and fellow governors. My special thanks go to the Governor Jan Kovařovic, who decided to leave our Board after many years. Jan's valuable contributions were always appreciated in the Board and I would like to thank him for his long service to the English College.

Before moving forward in today's agenda, it is my honour to pass along the message from our Chairman, Ann Lewis:

"I am extremely sorry to be prevented by the dreaded virus from joining you today. This will be the first time since the College opened that I have missed Graduation and Prize-giving, which is always an inspiring and moving occasion. I hope you all have a wonderful time. I would very much like to have met your honoured guest, who has based his whole life on the very principles on which the English College was founded. I look forward to seeing Mr Bratinka's remarks in the ECP Newsletter.

I have seen the usual impressive list of prize-winners. Some of you I have met and remember with pleasure. My congratulations to you all. A particular word for Karolina Zvonickova, winner of the Chairman of Governors' Prize for academic achievement. I always like to have a longer chat with the winner of this prize. That will not happen on this occasion but I hope to see you in the UK, Karolina. And indeed, to meet all those students who will be heading to British universities in the autumn.

May I wish all you graduating students health, happiness, and a long and fulfilling life."
