Our new Unit of Inquiry is based around the idea of Human Rights, it is...

An inquiry into: the history of human rights, defence and infringement of human rights, obligations as global citizens.

Central Idea: We have rights and responsibilities as global citizens.

Key concepts: Form - Students will recognise the features of human rights throughout history. Perspective - Students will understand that people will fight for and prioritise different rights for different reasons. Responsibility - Students will understand their responsibility to be aware of human rights and treat everyone fairly and equally.

Related concepts: Rights - Students will understand the rights which every human is entitled to. Equality - Students will understand the state of being equal in status, rights or opportunities. Freedom - Students will understand that people should have the power or right to act, speak or think as they want.

Attitudes: Empathy - Students will be able to put themselves in someone else's shoes. Tolerance - Students will be sensitive about the differences and diversity in the world and be responsive to the needs of others. Curiosity - Students will ask questions to learn more about human rights locally and globally.

Transdisciplinary Skills: Thinking - Acquisition of knowledge - Students will gain specific facts, ideas and vocabulary. Comprehension - Students will understand new material and communicate to others. Evaluation - Students will make judgements or decisions based on their new understandings. Social - Accepting responsibility - Students will be willing to share responsibility. Respecting others - Students will make decisions based on fairness and equality. Research - Collecting data - Students will gather information from a variety of primary and secondary sources. Formulating questions - Students will identify what they need to know and ask compelling and relevant questions that can be researched.

About our recent learning...

Literacy

Our current focus for writing is biographies and autobiographies, which link into our unit of inquiry. We are also using biographical texts in reading and during our literacy rotation tasks. We are discussing the difference between facts and opinions as our current reading focus. Our SMART Spelling program is thriving in our classrooms, as students have developed their skills in sounding out words and used their SMART Spelling skills to analyse each week's letter combinations.

Numeracy

Our current focus for mathematics is fractions, decimals and angles. We completed our division and multiplication units at the end of Term 2 and were impressed by the growth in the students' knowledge and skills on this topic.
