Overview

The Northern Territory Youth Parliament is an annual youth-led civics engagement program led by the Y Northern Territory in partnership with the Northern Territory Department of the Legislative Assembly.

For one week during the school holidays each year, 25 Youth Parliamentarians representing the geographic and demographic representation of the Northern Territory, discuss and debate Bills in the Legislative Assembly - proposed legislation they developed on solutions for issues that matter to them.

At the same time, 10 Youth Press Gallery Journalists report on the debates in the Chambers, with the aim of producing, pitching and publishing content on issues that matter to young people, by young people.

While not in Chambers, the young Territorians stay for six nights at the Batchelor Outdoor Education Centre, meeting others from across the Territory and taking part in leadership development programs.



Program Objectives

1. Increase knowledge of local, Territory and national civics
2. Increase the likelihood and interest of participation in civics, such as responsible voting, running for political positions, engaging in non-traditional citizenship activities such as issues-based community organising or art
3. Increase young people's personal sense of leadership, teamwork and self-esteem
4. Provide avenues for young people to be heard by decision-makers
5. Connect young people to a community of people striving to make a better world
6. Showcase excellence in young people to the broader community

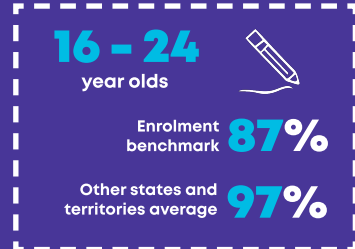
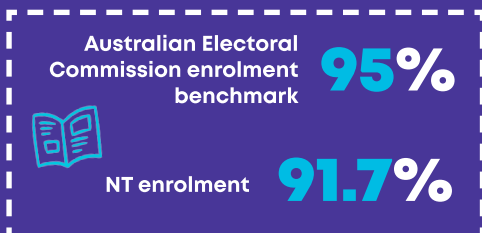
Why Youth Parliament is needed

Young people in the Northern Territory are underrepresented in electoral and political representation, both statistically and when compared to national benchmarks. While 16 to 24 year olds make up approximately 7% of the Northern Territory's population, this is not represented in the average age of local councillors, the Legislative Assembly (the youngest sitting Member is 33), or Federal representatives

This data (sourced late 2023), identifies a need for more meaningful programs that engage young Territorians in civics and citizenship in a way that is relevant locally and individually, whilst providing opportunities and pathways for young people to excel as independent, community-minded and healthy adults.

Northern Territory's Youth Strategy 2023 to 2033 provides a framework for the Northern Territory Youth Parliament to set goals year-on-year to contribute to improving the lived realities and statistics for young Territorians to meaningfully contribute to decision making, now and for generations to come.

There were a total of 16 Youth Parliamentarians and 10 Youth Press Gallery Journalists who participated in the Northern Territory Youth Parliament in June 2024.

Program Outcomes

A feedback survey was conducted following the program covering four key topics: civic knowledge, teamwork and leadership, belonging in the program, and self-esteem with participants answering on a scale ranging from strongly disagree to strongly agree.

'As a result of Youth Parliament, I...'



85% of young people said as a result of Youth Parliament that they could express their authentic selves in this group



59% agree and 23% strongly agree that they feel confident in their ability to be a leader

95% said they feel confident in their ability to work in a team

85% said they know the avenues available to them to have their say in parliament

23% agree and 70% strongly agree that they feel connected with the other young people of the program

When asked if they wanted to run for parliament or local council..

24% said strongly agree

11% agree

18% strongly disagree

6% disagree

29% said they were unsure

85% said they are confident in understanding in how parliament makes decisions

17% agree and 58% strongly agree they would be confident if they were to vote in an upcoming election
