THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

14 December 2025

REFLECTION

JOHN THORNHILL sm

Waiting can be a time of soul-searching. Today's liturgy invites us to ask ourselves whether we are ready to hear the call of the Saviour, whose birth we are preparing to celebrate. Helpless in Herod's prison cell, John the Baptiser is puzzled and discouraged, as he faced a similar question. He has generously pointed Jesus out - as the one who was to bring the realisation of Israel's hopes; why, he asks through his messengers, is God's prophet now suffering in prison at the hands of an unprincipled tyrant; why has the mission of Jesus not brought the time of justice God's people long for?

The reading from Isaiah – a typical example of the message of hope announced by the prophets – helps us to understand why John is puzzled. This magnificent proclamation describes what can be looked forward to, as a New Exodus - a time of liberation, healing and boundless joy, as those who have been banished are brought back to Zion. But this triumph of God is also described as a time of 'vengeance' and 'retribution'. Having for centuries lived in bitterness under a series of occupying powers, the nation's expectations emphasised this latter part of the prophets' message. They looked forward to a vindictive triumph that would crush their hated enemies. This heavily politicised interpretation of Israel's messianic hopes constituted one of the main obstacles to be overcome by Jesus, if he was to bring the people to enter into the inauguration of the final reign of God - about to take place in his own person.

God's triumph was not to be the imposition of divine power. The coming of God's kingdom involves collaboration on the part of our human freedom - inspired and sustained by the example of Jesus, who gave the needy and the powerless a privileged place in all that he did in the name of his Father, and lived out the 'new commandment' of love he had proclaimed. Jesus replied to John's inquiry, therefore, by pointing to the 'messianic signs' foretold by the prophets. But to those included in today's reading from Isaiah he adds another from the later Isaian writings: 'the poor have the Good News preached to them'. In a sense, the divine authenticity of his mission is summed up fully in these words - words that have echoed down the centuries in the life of the Church. In the continuation of our gospel passage, Jesus points to the gospel values so heroically embraced by John – in his courageous witness and his detachment.

The message of Jesus to John is, 'Do not lose faith in me; open your generous heart to the ways of God that define Israel's faith, and you will recognise that I am truly the one who was to come'. Jesus taught, we know, that in the present era the 'coming of the kingdom' is hidden and mysterious, overturning our human expectations. Our reading from James echoes one of the parables of Jesus concerning the coming of the kingdom (Mk 4:26), as James encourages believers in his community to imitate the farmer's patience, as the hidden seed grows.

THE WORD OF GOD

First Reading

Isaiah 35:1-6,10 Gospel

Matthew 11:2-11

Let the wilderness and the dry-lands exult, let the wasteland rejoice and bloom, let it bring forth flowers like the jonquil, let it rejoice and sing for joy. The glory of Lebanon is bestowed on it, the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they shall see the glory of the Lord, the splendour of our God. Strengthen all weary hands, steady all trembling knees and say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid. 'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming, the retribution of God; he is coming to save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy for those the Lord has ransomed shall return. They will come to Zion shouting for joy, everlasting joy on their faces; joy and gladness will go with them and sorrow and lament be ended.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 145:6-10

R. Lord, come and save us.

It is the Lord who keeps faith for ever, who is just to those who are oppressed. It is he who gives bread to the hungry, the Lord, who sets prisoners free. **(R)**

It is the Lord who gives sight to the blind, who raises up those who are bowed down, the Lord, who protects the stranger and upholds the widow and orphan. **(R)**

It is the Lord who loves the just but thwarts the path of the wicked. The Lord will reign for ever, Zion's God, from age to age. **(R)**

2nd Reading

James 5:7-10

Be patient, brothers, until the Lord's coming. Think of a farmer: how patiently he waits for the precious fruit of the ground until it has had the autumn rains and the spring rains! You too have to be patient; do not lose heart, because the Lord's coming will be soon. Do not make complaints against one another, brothers, so as not to be brought to judgement yourselves; the Judge is already to be seen waiting at the gates. For your example, brothers, in submitting with patience, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me; he sent me to bring Good News to the poor.

Alleluia!

'John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says:

'Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you.

'I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'

Advent Week Three Reflections

Parish Belief Team

As we enter the third week of Advent, particularly the period beginning on December 17 - a "Holy Week" preceding Christmas, we are invited to reflect deeply on the mystery of the Incarnation.

- 1. Jesus as both Answer and Question: Sunday's reflection reminds us that like John the Baptist, we may sometimes doubt, asking, "Are you the one who is to come?" Christ's response is not in words, but in actions. We are called to be the hands and feet of Christ, bringing concrete signs of God's love to those around us.
- **2. Authority and Humility:** Monday's Gospel challenges us to examine our own authority and motivations. Jesus was questioned about His authority. How often do we question God's authority in our lives? This Advent, let us humbly submit to God's will, allowing His questions to lead us to a deeper encounter with Divine Love.
- **3. Responding to God's Call with Action:** Tuesday's parable of the two sons invites us to look at our own response to God's call. It's not enough to say "yes" with our lips; our lives must embody our faith. In the quiet waiting of Advent, we are invited to examine what motivates us and prepare our hearts for Jesus' coming.
- **4.** The Mystery of the Incarnation: Wednesday's reflection on Jesus' genealogy reminds us that God chose to enter human history, with all its complexities and imperfections. Like Mary, we are called to bear Christ's presence within us.
- **5. Being Instruments of Peace:** Thursday's message of peace echoes through the readings. In a world often filled with conflict and division, we are called to be instruments of Christ's peace, especially within our families and communities.
- **6.** God's Power to Bring Life from Barrenness: Friday's readings speak to the heart of Advent hope. God promises life from barrenness and purpose from impossibility. Where in our lives do we need the breath of God's Spirit to bring new life and hope?
- 7. Saying "Yes" to God's Mission: Finally, Saturday's reflection on Mary's response to the angel Gabriel reminds us that even the greatest saints had moments of doubt and questioning. Yet it is our "yes" to God that qualifies us for His mission, not our own abilities or worthiness.
