Apprenticeships & Traineeships



A drivers licence is a must!

Thinking about an apprenticeship, especially in construction or automotive? A driver licence is a MUST! You can apply for your learner licence at 16. By 17, if you've logged 100 hours of supervised driving and passed your practical test, you can get your provisional licence and drive on your own. Getting this sorted early can really help — leaving it until the end of Year 12 may limit your options when applying for apprenticeships. [Check the Department of Transport and Main Roads](#) website for the steps to get your licence.

A School-Based apprenticeship could be for you!

A school-based apprenticeship or traineeship lets you start training while you're still at school and it counts towards your QCE. When you finish Year 12, you and your employer usually continue the arrangement as a full-time apprenticeship. - You can earn while you learn through VET courses in lots of different jobs
- They are available full-time, part-time or as a school-based option

Cybersecurity

Cybersecurity is about protecting computers, networks and data from digital attacks like hacking, phishing and ransomware. It helps keep information safe and systems running properly. It focuses on three key things:

- Confidentiality – keeping information private
- Integrity – making sure data isn't changed or damaged
- Availability – ensuring systems and data are accessible when needed

Cybersecurity uses technology, processes and skilled people to stop threats such as network breaches, data theft and identity fraud.

Why this matters for your future?

There is currently a shortage of skilled cybersecurity professionals, which means strong job demand and growing career opportunities. This industry trend looks at:

ABS Labour Force Data - January 2026

The Australian Bureau of Statistics have released the [Labour Force Data for January 2026](#): in seasonally adjusted terms:

- unemployment rate remained at 4.1%.
- participation rate remained at 66.7%.
- employment increased to 14,703,800.
- employment to population ratio decreased to 63.9%.
- underemployment rate increased to 5.9%.
- monthly hours worked increased to 2,013 million.
- full-time employment increased by 50,500 to 10,155,500 people.
- part-time employment decreased by 32,700 to 4,548,400 people.

Aerospace Industry in Queensland

Aerospace covers the technology and systems that make flight possible — from planes and helicopters to drones. It includes designing, building, testing, operating and maintaining aircraft and their equipment. Queensland is a major aviation hub in the Indo-Pacific, attracting leading civil and defence aviation companies. This gives the state strong opportunities for future growth in aerospace. Around 5,200 people were employed in Queensland's aerospace sector in early 2023. The industry offers a wide range of career opportunities, including roles in engineering, piloting, drafting, and communications, with strong job demand and competitive salaries. Get prepared for a phone call interview

If you're job hunting, be ready for a phone pre-screen. Employers often use a short call (about 15–30 minutes) before inviting you to a full interview. You'll usually be asked common interview questions like "Tell me about yourself", "Why do you want this role?" and "What are your strengths?". What is a Blue Card and do I need one?

In Queensland, a Blue Card is required if you work with people under 18. It helps keep young people safe. You'll need a Blue Card if you're paid to work with young people or if your course (TAFE, certificate, diploma or uni) includes a placement with anyone under 18. For VET students, your school or training provider will usually apply for the Blue Card for you - check with your VET coordinator. [Visit the Blue Card Services website](#) to learn more.

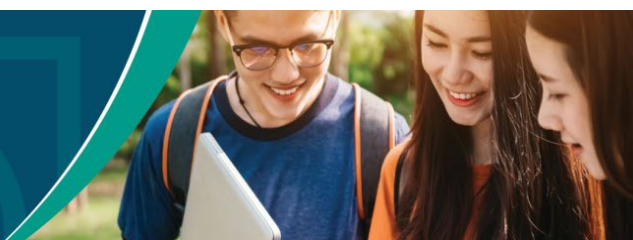

2025 ATAR Report

[The 2025 ATAR report](#) explains how the ATAR was calculated for Queensland students in 2025. It includes students who completed Queensland school subjects and/or VET qualifications that contributed to an ATAR and were part of the scaling process. The report outlines:

- what information is used to scale subjects
- how ATAR scores are calculated
- how different subjects are adjusted through scaling
- how students are distributed across the ATAR bands

The data is based on results available in December 2025. It is designed to provide an overview of the process, rather than a full analysis of all student results. For detailed information about how the Queensland ATAR works, you can visit the QTAC website, which provides step-by-step explanations and FAQs.

Parent FAQ

Does my child need to choose certain subjects to get a good ATAR?

No. There are no 'bonus' subjects. What matters most is that your child chooses subjects they are good at and enjoy, as stronger results lead to a higher ATAR.

What is scaling?

Scaling adjusts subject results so students are treated fairly across different subjects. It does not automatically make one subject better than another.

Do VET qualifications count towards the ATAR?

Yes — some completed Certificate III or higher VET qualifications can contribute to an ATAR.

Is the ATAR the only pathway to university?

No. Many students enter university through alternative pathways such as diplomas, bridging programs, or by starting in one course and transferring later.

What ATAR does my child need?

It depends on the course and university. Entry requirements vary each year based on demand.

Assistance schemes that can make you more competitive for uni entry

There are [several adjustment](#) factor schemes that can boost your selection rank and make you more competitive for your preferred course. These include:

- Financial assistance schemes
- Year 12 subject schemes – extra rank points for certain subjects (check each uni)
- Educational Access Scheme (EAS)
- Access and Equity schemes – support for students from different backgrounds
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander entry schemes
- Rural and regional access schemes
- Elite Athlete and Performer schemes (available at [ACU](#), [Bond](#), [CQU](#), [Griffith](#), [JCU](#), [QUT](#), [UNE](#), [UniSC](#), [UniSQ](#), [UQ](#))

Some unis also have their own programs, such as:

These don't change your ATAR, but they add bonus rank points to improve your chance of getting an offer.

Certificates, Diplomas and Bachelor Degrees – How are they different?

Australia uses the AQF (Australian Qualifications Framework) to organise all study levels after Year 12. Your main options are:

- Bachelor degree – 3–5 years, more theory, competitive entry
- Associate degree / Advanced Diploma – about 2 years, mix of theory and practical
- Diploma – 1–2 years, mostly practical with some theory
- Certificate I–IV – 1 month to 1 year, very hands-on, usually open entry

You can move up levels over time (for example, Cert → Diploma → Degree) if your results meet the entry rules. To choose what's right for you, think about:

- what qualifications your career needs
- your school results
- whether you prefer practical or academic learning
- how long you want to study
- course costs and commitment

The mystery surrounding selection ranks

A selection rank is the score universities actually use to decide if you're eligible for a course. It can include your ATAR, VET qualifications and adjustment factors. Common myths (and the facts):

- **Myth:** ATAR = selection rank → **No.** Your ATAR is converted so bonus points can be added
- **Myth:** Bonus points change your ATAR → **No.** Your ATAR stays the same, your selection rank increases
- **Myth:** All unis calculate ranks the same way → **No.** Each uni has its own rules
- **Myth:** The required rank never changes → **No.** It can go up or down each year depending on demand
- **Myth:** VET gives the same rank everywhere → **No.** Every uni has its own VET ranking scale

- **Myth:** Only Year 12 students can use VET → **No.** Anyone applying through QTAC can use completed VET qualifications

Bottom line: always check each uni's website so you know exactly how your selection rank will be calculated.

Senior External Examination registrations open for 2026

Year 12 students can sit Senior External Examinations if a General subject isn't available at their school or there's a timetable clash. Available subjects include Arabic, Chinese, English, Indonesian, Korean, Latin, General Mathematics, Modern Greek, Polish, Punjabi, Russian, Sinhala, Tamil and Vietnamese. Exams are held in October and November. You must have school approval and your school will register you with the QCAA. Registrations close 30 April 2026. Managing your stress levels is doable!

Bachelors or Bachelors Honours - and the difference is

Bachelor degree

This is the main undergraduate qualification at university. It gives you a strong understanding of a specific subject area and prepares you for a career or further study. Most bachelor degrees take 3 years full-time, but some can take up to 5 years.

Bachelor Honours degree

Honours is an extra level of study that can be built into a bachelor degree or completed as an additional year. It involves more advanced learning and research and can lead to professional roles or postgraduate study.

Higher-Level Apprenticeship Dual Bachelor of Engineering Science

This 6-year dual qualification pathway provides you with 2 qualifications: the Certificate III Electrotechnology Electrician (UEE30820) and the Bachelor Degree of Engineering Science. You will commence both qualifications at the same time. After gaining the trade licence at the end of Year 4, you will focus on completing the degree program. Click [here](#) for more information.

Medical Schools in Australia

Queensland students who want to study medicine can apply to medical schools across Australia. The [Australian Medical Council website](#) lists all medical schools and links to their courses. There are three main entry pathways in Queensland:

- Direct entry from Year 12 – offered by Bond University, James Cook University and The University of Queensland
- Graduate entry – complete a bachelor degree first, then apply (eg Griffith University and The University of Queensland)
- Provisional entry – secure a future place while in Year 12 if you achieve high results (eg Griffith University, University of the Sunshine Coast and The University of Queensland)
