Liturgical Jottings

Shrove Tuesday

The day before or eve of Ash Wednesday is called variously Shrove Tuesday, pancake Tuesday or Fat Tuesday (from the French *Mardi Gras*). Originally it was the day that Christians confessed their sins, then did their penance during Lent and received absolution in Holy Week.

The season of Lent is the most appropriate time for celebrating the Sacrament of Penance. We hear the call to "Turn away from sin and believe the Good News." It is therefore fitting to have several penitential celebrations during Lent, so that all the faithful may have an opportunity to be reconcil-ed with God and their neighbour and so be able to celebrate the paschal mystery in the Easter Triduum with renewed hearts.

Focus on the Gospel

The Law of Talion, found in Leviticus 24:17-20, decreed "an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth," was written to limit retaliation to the same degree as the offence and therefore not exact more. It seemed a just way at the time. In our ears it seems harsh and vengeful. Our Lord, in the final section of Chapter Five on the Sermon on the Mount he suggests a complete turn around: "offer no resistance", do not retaliate but offer extra goodness and kindness. Indeed kindness and generosity, in Christian experience, unarms the enemy and opens the way restoration.

Therefore the Old Testament reading that accompanies today's Gospel is not the Law of Talion, quoted above but rather the first reading is from an earlier passage from the same book. It is the second half of the Law of Christ. The first half is: "Love God with all you heart ..." (Deut 6:5) and then Jesus added the quote from Leviticus 19:18 "You must love your neighbour as yourself." And he added further in today's Gospel passage: "You must love your enemies, and pray for them."

In the liturgical reading of these texts and the celebration of the Eucharist we must become what we are, the Body of Christ and the Temple of the Spirit. Our gestures of kindness, mercy and peace bring forth the Kingdom of God and convert individuals and communities to the way of Christ.

Pope Francis on the Word of God

Nehemiah, who was the governor [of Israel after the Babylonian Exile], and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep'. For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, 'Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions to him for whom nothing is prepared; for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength'" (Neh 8:8-10). These words contain a great teaching. The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. It cannot be restricted to select groups. It cannot be that way. The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people.



REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

PROJECT COMPASSION SUNDAY

Where parts of our country have been devastated by bushfire over recent weeks, and where for many of these communities severely affected and now begin the arduous task of restoring their lives and properties ,we find ourselves drawn to **PROJECT COMPASSION**. We are asked to begin a new season of our faith and living as we see solidarity with one another and for many needing their moment of compassion.

Solidarity is an engaging word. Recently the Catholic Bishops of Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands took up appeals for those affected by the bushfires. Caritas Australia, have received messages of support from Caritas Bangladesh – a country not immune to disaster and tragedy. Project Compassion Sunday still asks something from us as we begin Lent this week. The hope of Caritas and their appeal through Project Compassion does raise our awareness to many who are coming to terms with loss, and recovery.

The late Mother Teresa said ... "Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love". Many 'small things' by many people can bring great change!

We turn our thoughts to this Sunday through the readings presented. Jesus goes beyond the law of retaliation of an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. The way of discipleship goes beyond legitimate retaliation and offers a significant development. Then a further twist in the next injunction Jesus issues. This is about praying for one's persecutors rather than to hate them. It's identifying a theme of Lent. Where we give a thought to those we find hard to love and support.

Jesus' way is for revenge to be moved aside. To see the neighbour is in itself to be on side with positive intention. Given the times we live and where to exact revenge is a way out for some, our Christian motivation is to see renewed moments for living with faith and purpose to human situations we find challenging.



First Reading - Leviticus 19:1-2. 17-18

A reading from the book of Leviticus

You must love your neighbour, as yourself.

The Lord spoke to Moses; he said: 'Speak to the whole community of the sons of Israel and say to them: "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy."

"You must not bear hatred for your brother in your heart. You must openly tell him, your neighbour, of his offence; this way you will not take a sin upon yourself. You must not exact vengeance, nor must you bear a grudge against the children of your people. You must love your neighbour as yourself. I am the Lord.

Second Reading - 1 Corinthians 3:16-23

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

All things are yours, but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God.

Didn't you realise that you were God's temple and that the Spirit of God was living among you? If anybody should destroy the temple of God, God will destroy him, because the temple of God is sacred; and you are that temple.

Make no mistake about it: if any one of you thinks of himself as wise, in the ordinary sense of the word, then he must learn to be a fool before he really can be wise. Why? Because the wisdom of this world is foolishness to God. As scripture says: The Lord knows wise men's thoughts: he knows how useless they are, or again: God is not convinced by the arguments of the wise. So there is nothing to boast about in anything human: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, the world, life and death, the present and the future, are all your servants; but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God. Gospel - Matthew 5:38-48

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Love your enemies.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your Father in heaven, for he causes his sun to rise on bad men as well as good, and his rain to fall on honest and dishonest men alike. For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not? And if you save your greetings for your brothers, are you doing anything exceptional? Even the pagans do as much, do they not? You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect.'
