reflected in the readings of the four Sundays of Advent. The expectation of the second coming of the Lord is evident in the first two weeks. The preparation for the incarnation of the Lord is evident in the liturgies of the fourth Sunday of Advent and the days of the "Great Advent (17-24 December)". The third Sunday of Advent is a bridge, which connects the two characters. While we await his second coming we come to realise gradually that he is here already in our midst. Therefore this Sunday we rejoice, our hope is being realised. It is the age of the Messiah, evident in Jesus' miracles and teaching. Now is the time of peace and justice. The Fourth Sunday and week we hear of the Annunciations to Joseph, to Mary and to Zechariah and Elizabeth.

### Looking at the Readings

The Entrance Antiphon (see below) and the Collect for this Sunday express the joy of salvation. The subtitle of the third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday – Rejoice! The A cycle of readings this year do not have the character of the Cycles B & C in which St Paul urges his readers to: "Be Happy at all times" (1 Thess 5:16) and "Always be happy in the Lord." (Phil 4:4) The second reading today, however, urges us to "Be patient" (James 5:7) and uses the image of the farmer waiting for the rain and for the harvest and the example of the patience of the prophets. We are waiting for the Lord's coming as the Prophet Isaiah proclaims in the first reading.

John the Baptist, introduced to us last week, is now in prison. Jesus reminds us that he is the prophet heralding the coming of the Messiah, the Messiah who fulfils the words of Isaiah: the blind see, the deaf hear, the lame walk, the sick healed, the Good News is proclaimed. John also fulfils the prophets in other ways: he wears the clothes of Elijah, stands firm like Jeremiah, preaches the message of Malachi. Yes, he comes as the greatest and the last of the prophets .The prophets of old and the saints in our time focus not on themselves but on the message of Christ and they point us towards our salvation.

# <u>REFLECTION FROM FR PETER</u>

As I reflect upon this Sunday's Gospel with John the Baptist in his prison isolation, I'm reminded of a religious sister, Mary O'Shannesy SGS who belongs to the religious order of sisters known as the Good Samaritan Sisters. Mary and I have known each since the 1980's when we did a hospital ministry program called Clinical Pastoral Education. I have admired Mary from a distance in this field of work with our Victorian Prison System. From all I have read in her works, Mary companion's our state's prisnors.

Almost two thousand years ago, Matthew in his gospel writing, describes the hard-edged questions that John asks of Jesus through the messengers he has sent to him from Herod's prison. Doubts breed a loneliness and darkness, and they take John away from his confident self whom we met on Jordan's river bank last Sunday. With a desperation of hope, John sends his disciples with the question ....'Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?'

Women like Mary O'Shannesy are a prophet going into the darkness of another's life so as to restore a confidence easily taken away. Advent as a season fills with many contrasts of situations where the light and darkness of peoples' lives are met. Advent as a season of hope and joy takes one on a path of light and where darkness is put behind. John the Baptist is the great witness. People who witness to faith and light are ones giving our world new direction. The Mary O'Shannessy's of our time in prison chaplaincy give witness to the darkness giving way to flickers of hope and light.

May this week of Advent, the joyful week, enable us being living witness to the light we embrace of God's love and joy, bringing a transformation from within one-self to an openness of living as God's people of light and peace.

<u>A THOUGHT TO PONDER OVER</u> This is an adaptation of an article appearing in THE SWAG a quarterly magazine from the National Council of Priests of Australia.

### **READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY DECEMBER 18th 2022**

### First Reading

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

The virgin will conceive.

The Lord spoke to Ahaz and said, 'Ask the Lord your God for a sign for yourself coming either from the depths of Sheol or from the heights above.' 'No', Ahaz answered 'I will not put the Lord to the test.'

Then Isaiah said: 'Listen now, House of David: are you not satisfied with trying the patience of men without trying the patience of my God, too?

The Lord himself, therefore, will give you a sign.

It is this: the maiden is with child and will soon give birth to a son whom she will call Immanuel, a name which means "God-is-with-us".'

#### Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Jesus Christ, a descendant of David, is the Son of God.

From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures.

This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead. Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

### <u>Gospel</u>

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and they will call him Emmanuel, a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.
