
Strategic Plan 2023-2025







About us

Good Shepherd Lutheran School is an Early Learning - Year 6 school situated in the north eastern suburbs of Adelaide.

Our ELC and Primary years are organised into 5 distinct stages of learning. Pedagogically, we embrace an inquiry approach to learning and strive to equip students with future-focused skills and capabilities.

Demand for places at Good Shepherd is high and the school has responded with measured growth (6 additional classes) and an Early Learning Centre over recent years, all the while striving to ensure culture and community are not simply maintained but strengthened.

The school has a clear focus on proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ and providing a quality educational program that seeks to prepare students for life. This is done in the context of a caring community. All students are valued as unique individuals challenged to fulfil their God-given potential. The curriculum is built around an inquiry pedagogy and has a strong focus on Literacy and Numeracy while also providing transdisciplinary experiences across all other disciplines.

Specialist areas include Wellbeing, Visual and Creative Arts, Physical Education and Auslan. Structures and resources are in place to provide support to students along their learning journey. On-demand clubs challenge children to develop 'future skills' and capabilities.

Impacted by COVID-19, Good Shepherd continues to enjoy strong partnerships with families, who are re-engaging with many aspects of school life. Our students and staff enjoy the benefits of working in a well-resourced and safe environment.

We operate in partnership with Endeavour College at Mawson Lakes, a Year 7 to 12 Lutheran secondary school to which our graduating students have priority entry.

Good Shepherd is a member of 'Connected Schools' and works in partnership with Salisbury Lutheran Kindergarten, Golden Grove Lutheran Primary School, St Paul Lutheran School and Endeavour College. Together we offer a seamless Early Learning – Year 12 education with a vision to be a future-focused, vibrant community of schools, working in partnership to achieve more than we could imagine or achieve individually.

We support also, the transition of students to non-Lutheran secondary schools, respecting freedom of choice.

Wellbeing

A 'lens' for future planning

Wellbeing in the Good Shepherd community can be defined as the state of contentment, satisfaction, and fulfillment experienced by the individuals within the community, including students, staff and parents.

It encompasses all aspects of life psychological, emotional, social, spiritual and physical health.

Therefore, wellbeing in Good Shepherd Lutheran School can be seen as a holistic experience that includes positive emotions, engagement, relationships, meaning, accomplishment, achievement, optimism, resilience, and mindfulness.

Good Shepherd Lutheran School has an ongoing commitment to understanding and improving learner and educator wellbeing, and as students and teachers return to the classroom (and parents to the physical school environment) after extended periods of remote learning for some due to COVID-19, the following insights are significant. To understand and support learner wellbeing,

educators require opportunities to develop their capabilities to explicitly teach social and emotional skills, as well as freedom to access and develop evidence-informed, strengthsbased programs and approaches.

With a focus firstly on the wellbeing of staff and in acknowledgement of the demanding nature of teaching as a vocation, Good Shepherd provides an environment for its staff that exceeds award and enterprise conditions. Good Shepherd recognises that wellbeing is a condition of heart and head. Through a posture of care and compassion, staff will continue to be valued and cared for.

Good Shepherd is ideally positioned to partner with students, parents and carers, and the wider community, to ensure that all students feel connected at school, and in their life more generally. Armed with a sense of selfworth, self-awareness and personal identity, learners will be better equipped to manage their emotional, mental, cultural, spiritual and physical wellbeing.

As we enact this Strategic Plan we do so through a 'wellbeing lens' acknowledging:

- the LEA Growing Deep Formation and Leadership Framework as a blueprint for wellbeing and success;
- Compassionate Systems are recognised as a driver of organisational wellbeing
- educators and school communities play a significant role in supporting and developing learner wellbeing;
- wellbeing is crucial to academic achievement, and wellbeing interventions can support and accelerate students' learning;
- teaching is a demanding profession and educators require time and experience to determine which non-teaching tasks to prioritise in order to best support learner growth and achievement, as well as professional learning to best support their students' wellbeing;
- as is the case for their students, the wellbeing of educators and school leaders has come under increasing strain in recent years and various initiatives ought be developed to foster their wellbeing; and
- choosing the right wellbeing interventions and measuring impact and effectiveness are important components of a whole-school community approach to wellbeing.
