## Employment grows again in December – Australian Bureau of Statistics Employment and Unemployment

Employment opportunities continue to be strong, which is luring more people into the workforce and causing a slight increase in the number of people seeking work nationally to 4%.

Those people already in the workforce are working more hours, with underemployment going down to 6%. Read the December ABS statistics <u>HERE</u>.

#### More West Australians in job than ever before



The number of Western Australians in work jumped by a massive 15,300 people to a new record 1.63 million people in November and again, to 1.637m in December, according to Australian Bureau of Statistics Labour Force data.

WA's unemployment was just 3.3 % in November and 3.4% in December.

The strength of the labour force has been underpinned by the

WA economy, which continues to outpace the rest of Australia, growing by 4.7% over the year to September, more than double the national growth rate of 2.1%.

#### Internet Vacancy Index - recruitment getting easier

These National figures highlight difficulties in NSW and Victoria. No specific mention was made of the WA experience.

- There has been a small decrease in the number of employers expecting to increase their staffing numbers in the next 3 months.
- Recruitment difficulties also continue to ease.
- The "lack of applicants" is being mentioned less frequently as a reason for recruitment difficulty.

#### New \$39m TAFE Campus for Armadale




The new multi–storey campus on Church Avenue provides business, childcare, community services, ed support and IT.

It almost doubles the capacity of the resources that have been available across campuses in Armadale.

The new campus will also improve

the delivery of VET Delivered in Secondary Schools across the Armadale region.

The Armadale Jobs and Skills Centre is in the new building.



#### **\$51m TAFE campus opens in Balga in February**

A \$51 million upgrade to run down Balga TAFE campus will be open to students in Term 1.

A Construction Skills Innovation Hub is part of the new facility which will help to address the critical shortage of construction skills with 750 apprentices a year going through.

As part of the development the Hub provides:

- Foundation Skills for students who need to boost their literacy and numeracy skills.

North Metropolitan

- English language skills which are needed for those migrants who the government is bringing in to address the skills shortages.
- A Student Resource Centre and Learning Hub

The <u>Balga Jobs and Skills Centre</u> will be relocated to the new building.

### 2,140 more Fee Free TAFE construction and housing places for WA

#### **Fee-Free TAFE Places**

From January 2025, 2,140 new Fee-Free TAFE places will be available, including up to 540 preapprenticeship places.

The extra \$9.4 million funds Fee-Free places to train more construction and housing sector workers and directly contributes to building the homes

needed for the Western Australian community

WA has had lots of free VET courses for years. Over the past 2 years the range of VET courses has increased. Most VET students will be able to identify a free VET course that leads into their chosen industry.

- VET courses traditionally provide smaller classes and more support than uni.
- Students who enrol in fee free courses still need to buy their learning resources.

#### VET courses connect with degrees

The <u>Australian Universities Accord</u> is a Commonwealth government strategy that is driving a more connected higher education system.

- Many graduates from degrees have lots of theoretical knowledge but little practical experience. New pathways are being piloted that deliver practical, hands-on knowledge through VET qualifications that deliver credits to universities courses.
- The lack of practical industry knowledge has been a concern of <u>Australian</u> <u>Industries Group</u> which is supporting the move towards dovetailing VET and undergraduate degrees. (You can read their response to the Accord <u>HERE</u>.)

#### **Curtin Credits from VET into degree**

Six Curtin Faculty of Humanities courses have now undergone mapping to identify VET credits towards a degree:

- Diploma in Early Childhood Education and Care to Bachelor of Education (Early Childhood Education)
   Applied credit reduces course length from 3 years to 4 years.
- Advanced Diploma to Bachelor of Arts (with a choice of 14 majors) Applied credit reduces course length from 3 years to 1.5 years.
- Advanced Diploma of Graphic Design to Bachelor of Design (Graphic Design) Applied credit reduces course length from 3 years to 1 year.
- Advanced Diploma of Visual Arts to Bachelor of Creative Arts (Fine Art) Applied credit reduces course length from 3 years to 1 year.
- Diploma of Building and Construction (Building) to Bachelor of Applied Science (Construction Management)
   Applied credit reduces course length from 4 years to 3.5 years.
- Diploma of Screen and Media (Animation and Game Art or Animation and Visual Effects) to Bachelor of Design (Animation and Game Design) Applied credit reduces course length from 3 years to 2 years.

Plans are underway to assess expansion into other Curtin faculties.

You can start your business or finance journey at **South Metropolitan (SM) TAFE** and continue your education at Murdoch University.

## TAFEs and colleges outperform universities for quality higher education, student survey finds

(From TAFE Directors News)

The <u>2023 SES</u> shows that undergraduate students at non-university higher education institutions gave a 78.9% positive rating (up from 78.6% in 2022), compared with 76.5% for universities (up from 75.7%).

The student ratings varied across study areas, with undergraduates in agriculture, environmental studies and rehabilitation being most positive, with those in dentistry, computing and information systems rating least positive.

#### Harmonization of vocational and uni qualifications happening now

There is a government strategy called the <u>Universities Accord</u>. One of the goals of the Accord is to ensure that qualifications earned through VET are recognised by universities.

For example, a Diploma in Work Safety and Health may be recognised by universities that offer a degree in Occupational Health and Safety.

Identifying these opportunities under the Accord began in late 2024 and will gain momentum in 2025.



When thinking about your pathway to university, consider doing a VET qualification then seeking credit for your VET qualification at university.

#### Advantages of this pathway:

• Many VET qualifications that are in high demand are free or heavily subsidised.

- Vocational education classes are usually more like school classes rather than big lectures with hundreds of students.
- When you get your VET qualification, you can work in your field, getting paid for your qualifications, while you study for your degree.

#### Case Study

A vocational education and training Diploma of Nursing takes 18 months and is currently fee free in Western Australia. Graduates can work as Enrolled Nurses while they undertake their Bachelor of Nursing degrees. Notre Dame already offers one year of credit towards the <u>Bachelor of Nursing</u> at Notre Dame upon completion of the diploma

The Universities Accord strategy is just being rolled out. You will need to consult with a careers expert to make sure you choose your best pathway.

# **Recommendations of the Blueprint for Post School Success**

As could be anticipated from a Labor Government, many of the recommendations are designed to support equity for all students. There is a particular focus on students with a disability or additional learning needs.

Key recommendations of the <u>Post School Success</u> review include actions to:

- Enable as many VET qualifications as possible to contribute to ATAR, in line with other Australian jurisdictions.
- Explore expanding the information included in the Western Australian Statement of Student Achievement (WASSA) to reflect a holistic picture of achievement.
- To make WASSAs available to students who leave school prior to year 12.



### Recommendation 9.

Department of Education and DTWD to work with the school system and sectors to strengthen delivery of career education and pathway planning, consistent with the principles outlined in section 4.3.2 in conjunction with appropriate course selection processes, where applicable, particularly for students in regional, remote, and lower socio-economic areas.  Work with the school system and sectors to strengthen delivery of career education and pathway planning, particularly for students in regional, remote and lower socio-economic areas.

- School system and sectors to identify opportunities to strengthen inclusive practices.
- Explore new offerings for students with disability, like the Skills course implemented in New South Wales.

- To develop an additional level within the WACE to accommodate students with a recognised disability, following a period of consultation with students with disability; and
- Keep the literacy and numeracy standard as a requirement to achieve the WACE with an expansion of methods demonstrating the literacy and numeracy standard.



Their report on the Impact of generative AI on skills in the workplace found that:


- Higher level VET qualifications are **more likely** to be disrupted by AI.
- Cognitive and less physical skills are more likely to be impacted.
- Financial and Business services were exposed the most, followed by ICT

# The Future of the Early Childhood Education Profession



The Future of the Early Childhood Education Profession report identifies that current early childhood education workforce levels are not sustainable even to meet current levels of demand.

- The current workforce would likely need to grow by an extra 8% to satisfy current unmet demand.
- Shortages are apparent in most regions across major cities, regional and remote Australia and are forecast to persist over the next ten years.

• There are several recommendations about the need to improve wages and opportunities for advancement.


I am not sure why the end of 2024 was such a struggle for so many teachers.

Teachers need to build infrastructure to support the changed needs of students.




I put together <u>this mind map</u> of services that you can call on to build a support network that helps your students to cope and that frees you up to be an expert educator.
