This mum finds extra joy celebrating her son's achievements.

Kooper stands justifiably tall as he surveys his team's handiwork enhancing the Hands on Learning precinct at McClelland College. A generation after his mum was part of Hands on Learning, Kooper proudly conducts a tour for his mother Jackiie and her former artisan-teacher, HoL Founder, Russell Kerr.

Reflecting on the impact of being part of the Hands on Learning crew at McClelland College, Kooper says while he loves sport, he used to find it harder to listen in class. "It makes a difference for me. My teachers say I'm improving, and I can focus now, no matter who I'm working with."

"It gives you space outside, and we got to do different things all the time. It felt so good. We were busy, we achieved so much, and we went back to the classroom refreshed, " is the way Jackiie sums up her own time in Hands on Learning in the early days at Frankston High School. Jackiie went on to a mechanical pre apprenticeship, and then moved into early childhood education, and is now a proud mum of four children working at a local childcare centre.

There's a vibrant positive buzz at Lowood State High School as the school community gathers to celebrate artisan-teacher Dennis Ward as the 2022 John Eldridge Medallist and the national recognition of his outstanding contribution to Hands on Learning. While Dennis's contribution and the practice excellence he and fellow artisan-teacher Kerry Hetherington foster is obvious, the universal excitement about the outcomes of Hands on Learning from students, their parents, and the school's leaders is omnipresent.

As always, students easily capture the mood. "It's fun. It is good to work all together. It's fun to have ideas coming from other people, everyone contributes their opinions in here and it turns out into something you all love." "I love it, being here all day, it's amazing. It's a great chance to get your creativity going." "You form really great friendships here. You work with people you wouldn't normally talk to, but you get to know them in HoL and they turn out to be really great people." Year Nine student, Jade, adds.

Now we have the recipe

'This program is made for our school," Joanne Stocks, Head of Curriculum, Cedar Creek State School, says after day one. "One of our mums came in to tell us her son just can't stop talking about what a great day he had." Principal, Mike Meier adds, "I've always been a 'hands on' person. I know the enjoyment of working with your hands, and the sense of achievement when you see the finished product. We had the right people to run this program, and organically we've put a lot in place with artisanteacher Shevaun Russell establishing such a fantastic environmental hub at the school. It was a no brainer to add the HoL framework, resources, data collection and materials to enhance the way we support our students to grow and develop at Cedar Creek State School." Shevaun sums it up best, "We had all the ingredients, but we didn't have the recipe."



Ingredients for success

Sharing fresh kingfish caught on your dad's boat with your fellow 'Holsters' from Years 6 to 10 is one of the secret ingredients of HoL at Tin Can Bay P-10 State School, on Queensland's Sunshine Coast.

"I can't speak highly enough about how much these students share and work together, and the way the older students step up and support the younger ones and work as a team," says artisan-teacher Jayne Schwajhardt.

What a tight crew they have become. Joel the resident fisherman, says he has picked up lots about how to work with others that will be handy back in the classroom. Tylah in Year 10 describes being part of HoL as motivating her to want to come to school more. Luxie. also Year 10, thinks HoL is a cool opportunity to do something different. "I'm more positive about working with other people too." "I like more hands on stuff, being outside, and living real," says Laney in Year

10. "We check in every morning on what's happened during the week, the good and the bad. Alex from Year 9 adds. "It makes the school week better because you get that excitement for Friday to happen. It means you can work on stuff you really enjoy and with this group of people." For Zane, "It's good because sometimes you get stuck on stuff, but the group gives you feedback to help you to solve what you are stuck on. They give me ideas on what I can do and how to do it."

The impact in a few short weeks is summed up by classroom teacher, Danny Wilson who stops in to visit. "They are all calmer up here, they are getting along, there's such positive atmosphere." Deputy Principal, Sandy Lewis, adds "The mentoring of the older kids is amazing. We have really enjoyed exploring what is possible. We have noticed improved relationships across the board. The barriers are broken down here, we too can converse with the students at a different level."

Rewarding peer mentoring

As the jets from nearby Amberly Airforce base fly overhead, Liam Year 9, at Ipswich State High School, mentors his younger peers as they relocate some paving. Liam reports he wants to be a pilot, so he needs to stay a school to make it into the air force. "I'm different now. I get to be up here once a week, away from classes and people, it's peaceful up here, no one really bothers us. I feel refreshed back in class. I'm more able to ask questions when I don't understand. It feels so good to have a day learning without the curriculum, you understand so much more when you actually do it."

Growing green for community: Benalla P-12 College

Rising costs of living and the spiralling price of fresh produce mean Benalla P-12 College's mega community project couldn't be timelier. With a grant from the Central Hume Primary Care Partnership to expand the 'Benalla Grow Your Own' project, Benalla Health teamed up with HoL who are providing the building nous to produce wicking beds, so families in the local community who are experiencing financial hardship or food insecurity can grow vegetables in their backyard. "It has been inspiring to witness the way the students have worked together, problem solving and producing a wooden elevated support structure design to make the wicking beds more accessible," Benalla Health Dietician, Ashleigh Knott said. And it is not only the community that feels better. According to Year 10 student Finn, being part of HoL is the highlight of his week. "It's such a good culture and good vibes in HoL. I learn better outside and working with other people." "It's so fun, it feels like the day goes so quickly", Ben, Year 8 reports. "Instead of having a pen and pencil you have a drill and hammer," Toby, Year 8 adds.





Connecting with primary: Padua College, Tyabb

Padua College's Hands on Learning crew from its Tyabb campus travelled to Somers Primary School to install seating to create an outdoor classroom and vertical garden beds adjacent to a multipurpose room deck. The seating and garden beds were built in their Tyabb workshop, and the plants were propagated in their hothouse from seeds that were gathered in their precinct's wetlands. Most inspiring of all was way students worked together as well-oiled parts of the HoL machine, demonstrating teamwork and leadership.
