### REFLECTION BY JOHN THORNHILL SM

Jesus approaches the end of his journey. He has already entered Jerusalem when a 'scribe', who is evidently well disposed, asks which is the greatest of the commandments of the Law. As interpreters of the Law, the scribes had listed 613 ordinances calling for observance; it is not surprising that they often discussed their relative importance. This man seeks Jesus' view on the matter. This last exchange Jesus has with the leaders of Israel, in Mark's account, raises an issue important for his disciples. The incident illustrates how Jesus taught with an 'authority' that was different from the approach of the scribes (Mt 7:29). The scribes backed their interpretation by appealing to the authority of recognised interpreters; the response that Jesus gives is backed by his own authority. He underlines the commandment given in today's reading from Deuteronomy, familiar to all faithful Jews as part of their daily prayer: 'You must love the Lord with all your heart, soul, mind and strength' - in other words, with your whole being; to love anything in preference to the Lord is idolatry. Jesus is calling his hearers back to the radical faith and trust that so often finds expression in the Old Testament – especially in the prophets and the psalms – a faith and trust that was a true response to the God who had entered into covenant with the chosen people. Jesus goes on, however, to show great originality and wisdom, by linking the 'first' commandment with a 'second': 'You must love your neighbour as yourself' (Lev 19:18).

The Covenant was intended to make old Israel 'a light to the nations' – their life, shaped by the ways of God, learned through the covenant relationship, was to be an invitation to all peoples of the earth to find the one, true God – 'The Lord our God is the one Lord' – and the blessings life with God can bring. The Saviour links the two commandments under the rubric of 'love'. The love true believers have for fellow human beings is a love that has been learned from God.

The theme of 'love', so important to every human heart, was soon to emerge, we know, as the very heart of the Gospel, the good news that 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son'. (For Paul, 'Love is the fulfilment of the Law', Rom 13:10; as we live 'in Christ', God's own love 'has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit', Rom 5:5. Similarly, according to John, a 'new commandment' rules our Christian life, 'Love one another just as I have loved you', Jn 13:34; indeed, John declares, 'God is love', 1 Jn 4:8). The response of the scribe and the praise it won from Jesus, 'You are not far from the kingdom', point towards this fulfilment. Mark is reminding us that not all the leaders of the people were closed to the message of Jesus. Is it not likely that this scribe was soon to share in the faith inaugurated by the Lord's Paschal Mystery? This faith is interpreted in the reading from Hebrews, where Christ's saving work is compared with the role of priests of the Old Testament. But there is also a great contrast. The old role ended with death and was compromised by sinfulness. The Old Testament ideal of clinging to God with one's whole being must have seemed a daunting, almost impossible one; now however faith in the Paschal Mystery assures us that the risen Saviour - 'holy, innocent and uncontaminated', and 'made perfect for ever' - gives us a share in his life with the Father.

### First reading

### **Deuteronomy 6:2-6**

Moses said to the people: 'If you fear the Lord your God all the days of your life and if you keep all his laws and commandments which I lay on you, you will have a long life, you and your son and your grandson. Listen then, Israel, keep and observe what will make you prosper and give you great increase, as the Lord the God of your fathers has promised you, giving you a land where milk and honey flow.

'Listen, Israel: the Lord our God is the one Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength. Let these words I urge on you today be written on your heart.'

### 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading

Hebrews 7:23-28

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

### **Gospel Acclamation**

Alleluia, alleluia!

All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will Love them and we will come to them! Alleluia!

#### Gospel

Mark 12:28-34

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important

than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him anymore.

### SCRIPTURE REFLECTION BY SR MARY FERMIO

One sees many people these days with white ear plugs apparently listening to music or a podcast etc. But are they really listening or just having a noise to fill the silence. For I believe some people are afraid of silence and have never enjoyed listening to the silence, and it is amazing what sounds one can then hear.

The first word Jesus says to the Scribe is LISTEN! The commandment leads to loving God and loving others and if we love we LISTEN to that person. Not just a perfunctory love, but a total love of my heart, soul, mind

and ALL my strength. To Jesus, this is more important than a sacrifice or holocaust and will lead us to the Kingdom of God. If I LISTEN intently during the readings and the homily, Jesus just may have a message for ME.



Have I prayed in silence and LISTENED to what Jesus wants to say to me?

Think about it!

### SCRIPTURE REFLECTION: LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD, AND LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOUR AS YOURSELF

Almighty and merciful God, by whose gift your faithful offer you right and praiseworthy service, grant, we pray, that we may hasten without stumbling to receive the things you have promised.

I come to my place of prayer, aware of being in God's presence. I take the time to read the text slowly a couple of times, pausing where I am drawn . . . intrigued, or wanting to ponder for a few moments. Perhaps I reflect on the idea of 'fearing the Lord'. Is that how I relate to God? Maybe I remember that in the Old Testament, 'fearing' can have a slightly different meaning, where it is more akin to being 'in awe' of someone. Does that help me?



The Lord God promises the people of Israel – promises me – 'a land where milk and honey flow'. What does that mean for me today? What would I want this land to be like? Perhaps I can

give thanks for it, even if can only see it in the distance. I speak to the Lord about this, and I listen. I remain in the Lord's presence quietly, without words. Again, I listen. How far can I say that the words of the text are 'written on my heart'? Might it help if I made these words personal? 'The Lord my God is the one Lord,

I love the Lord my God with all my heart, with all my soul, with all my strength.'

I pause, then perhaps repeat this phrase several times. How do I feel? When the time comes to conclude my prayer, I reflect on these moments I have spent with the Lord, and I give thanks.

### ARCHBISHOP COMENSOLI: PRAYING FOR THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

As we enter into November, the month of remembrance, and continue journeying through this Year of Prayer, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli offers some thoughts on



the profound consolation and experience of communion to be found in the practice of praying for the faithful departed.

Reminding us that our ultimate destiny or goal in life is 'to live eternally with the Lord', Archbishop Comensoli describes the Church's practice of praying for the deceased as 'an act of hope'.

We pray for the deceased because of our love of them and our hope for them,' he says. 'We pray for the deceased because our pilgrimage to God has not ended, and they need strengthening for their journey ahead. We pray for the deceased because their communion with us brings hope and healing to us.'

Acknowledging that there is 'no right or wrong way of holding our deceased family, friends and the needy in prayer', Archbishop Comensoli suggests some ways for us to enter into this ancient practice, including offering a Mass, praying the Rosary with our loved one in mind, or praying a 'very simple prayer for the faithful departed' that has a long history in the Catholic tradition:

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them.

May they rest in peace.

May the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

'Remembering our sisters and brothers in faith', he concludes, 'is remembering in hope our destiny in God.'
