Focus on the Gospel

As a young person, there is nothing better than being in love! Sure, loving your family and being loved by them is pretty important, but to 'fall in love' with someone and have that love returned is something quite extraordinary. Love sets us on fire! To be loved by someone else makes all the tough times endurable; it makes us believe in ourselves because someone else sees something worthwhile within us. It's exciting and it's incredibly life-giving!

This is the message that Jesus conveys to his disciples in this week's gospel. He shares with them some understanding of the incredible joy he experiences through his relationship with the Father. And just as he is loved by the Father, so Jesus loves his disciples and so are they invited to share in the love of the Father. Jesus' actions towards the 'lesser ones' of the world was to demonstrate to them that they are not only worthy of love but were already loved. Jesus tells his disciples that all they have to do to constantly remain in his love is to keep his commandments and then he clarifies for them that his only commandment to them is to love one another as Jesus loved. To live in the love of Jesus and know the love of the Father, all we have to do is love one another. The challenge is that we are to love all people – even those who make our lives difficult and unpleasant. As we are told in the Gospels of Luke and Matthew, 'If you love only those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them!' (Lk 6:32; Mt 5:46). © Greg Sunter

Weekly Reflection - The Essence of Love: A Reflection on Jesus' New Commandment

In today's world, we are bombarded with messages about what it means to love and be loved. From movies to social media, we are constantly exposed to different forms of love, some of which can be distorted or even harmful. In the midst of all this confusion, it's helpful to turn to Jesus and his New Commandment for guidance.

"Love one another as I have loved you." These words, spoken by Jesus to his disciples, summarize everything he taught about love. Love, according to Jesus, is not just a feeling or an emotion. It's an action, a self-giving that puts the needs of others before our own. And the ultimate expression of love, as Jesus showed us, is to lay down our lives for our friends.


This kind of love, self-sacrificing and generous, is not always easy to practice. It requires us to set aside our own desires and preferences and to focus on the good of others. It means being willing to suffer for the sake of someone else's happiness. It's a love that demands everything we have and asks for nothing in return.

But this is the kind of love that Jesus calls us to. And he didn't just talk about it - he lived it. He accepted rejection, persecution, and death on the cross, not because he was weak, but because he loved us so much that he was willing to pay the ultimate price for our salvation. As we reflect on Jesus' New Commandment, we are invited to examine our own lives and ask ourselves: am I living a life of self-giving love? Do I put the needs of others before my own? Am I willing to suffer for the sake of someone else's happiness?

These are challenging questions, but they are essential if we want to follow Christ and experience the joy and meaning that only God can give. When we love as Jesus loved, we become his disciples, and we embody the very essence of what it means to be a Christian. In a world that often reduces love to a fleeting feeling or a transactional exchange, Jesus' New Commandment is a powerful reminder that love is much more than that. It's a self-giving that transforms us and those around us, and it's the very heart of our faith.

Mass Attendance Counts - May 2024


