More than half of all new jobs created have required a vocational education and training qualification, as the labour market relies on the practical and real-world teaching style that VET provides to skill staff. Jobs and Skills Australia reports that in the year to February, 2023, more than 60 per cent of total employment growth nationally was in VET-related occupations. Meanwhile, 36 per cent of all employment growth was in occupations in which a university qualification is the primary pathway. The remaining new jobs created did not require a qualification. The Australian Bureau of Statistics have released the Labour Force Data for April 2025:

- unemployment rate remained at 4.1%.
- participation rate remained at 67.0%.
- employment increased to 14,622,100.
- employment to population ratio remained at 64.3%.
- underemployment rate increased to 6.0%.
- monthly hours worked decreased to 1,967 million.

Age diversity will define the workforce of the future

In recent decades, the prevailing expectation has been that careers span between 30 and 40 years, with people retiring in their 60s. That no longer holds true. Work is changing. Not just when we work, how, where or the tools we use — but crucially, who is working. In the EU, the expected duration of working life <u>rose 4.1</u> <u>years between 2002 and 2022</u>, and this trend is likely to continue. This is because in most major economies, populations are aging and birth rates are falling. The World Health Organization projects that the proportion of the world's population that is over 60 will nearly double from <u>12% to 22% by 2050</u>. English and Maths eligibility for ATAR

QTAC, who calculate the individual ATARs, has outlined <u>eligibility requirements</u> (scroll down the page) students must meet to be awarded an ATAR. Student must have:

- Successful completion of an English subject is a mandatory requirement for the award of an ATAR.
 Students are required to successfully complete (i.e. be awarded a raw letter grade of "C" or better) in one of the following QCAA English subject offerings: English, English as an Additional Language, Literature, English & Literature Extension or Essential English
- While successful completion of an English subject is a mandatory requirement for ATAR eligibility, there are no other mandatory subject inclusions for the ATAR
- Not all English subjects will meet the English prerequisite requirements for universities and courses. You must check each university's prerequisites.
- While students must satisfactorily complete an English subject to be eligible for an ATAR, the result
 in English will only be included in the ATAR calculation if it is one of the student's best five subject
 results.
- Only General English subjects or Applied English subjects can be included in a student's ATAR, but not both (e.g. English and Essential English)

An added note regarding mathematics subjects:

 Only General Mathematics subjects or Applied Mathematics subjects can be included in a student's ATAR, but not both (e.g. Mathematical Methods and Essential Mathematics)

How IB Diploma students are considered for entry to tertiary courses in Australia

Results from the IB Diploma, which are reported on a whole number scale between 24 and 45, are converted into an ATAR-like value to allow IB students to be considered for tertiary places alongside their counterparts who have completed state curricula. This ATAR-like value is known as the Combined Rank because it is a national conversion that combines results from all states. This means that IB students can apply to any Australian state or territory with confidence about how their results compare to their peers who have

completed state curricula and received an ATAR. Click <u>here</u> to find out more however, note that the current information on the QTAC site is for 2025 admissions, so keep a watch out for the 2026 admissions updates.

Q&A's from QTAC

Q - What does early bird application mean?

A. - You must apply to QTAC before 30 September 2025 to only pay \$70 for the early bird application. After 30 September 2025 an application will cost \$150.

Q - How do I apply to university for next year?

A. - You apply through <u>QTAC</u> for most Queensland tertiary courses. Applications to tertiary institutions in other states are through tertiary admissions centres similar to QTAC. You apply directly to all other institutions.

Q. - What is QTAC?

A. - The <u>Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre</u> (QTAC) is a public, not-for-profit company that manages the application and offer processes for universities, TAFE Queensland and some private colleges in Queensland (three interstate institutions are also included). QTAC does not make the rules about entry to courses. The institutions make the rules and QTAC administers these rules.

Q. - How many courses can I apply for through QTAC?

A. - You can apply for up to 6 courses from any of the institutions that use QTAC. You receive only one offer (if you meet the prerequisites and have a competitive ATAR or rank) at any given offer round. Find out more on the <u>Preferences page</u> of the QTAC website.

Q. - How are applicants selected for courses through QTAC?

A. - There are usually more applicants than available places for many of the courses. Selection is based on meeting minimum entry requirements (prerequisite subjects, folio, audition, etc.) and on merit (ATAR or Selection Rank). Once minimum entry requirements are met, applicants compete on the basis of merit for competitive courses.

Q.-What is the difference between undergraduate and postgraduate courses?

A. - The term 'undergraduate' is normally applied to diploma, advanced diploma, associate degree and bachelor degree courses. 'Postgraduate' usually applies to courses you can study after completing a bachelor degree, e.g. graduate certificate, graduate diploma, masters and doctorate.

Q. - What does it mean if a degree indicates (Honours)

A. - The term Honours means that the degree will take 4 years to complete. The degree requires an additional year of full-time study attached to a bachelor degree to allow for greater understanding and specialisation.

Q. - What does core unit mean?

A. - A subject you must complete as part of your degree.

QTAC warning

DO NOT apply to QTAC for 2026 entry into tertiary courses yet. QTAC is currently taking Semester 2, 2025 applications **NOT** 2026. If you apply before the 2026 opening date in August, your application will not be considered!

What are minimum selection thresholds for competitive entry into courses?

The minimum selection threshold is the minimum adjusted score (ATAR/rank) that was considered for an offer of a place to all applicants in the January 2025 offer round. Minimum selection thresholds vary from year to year and from offer round to offer round, depending on the number and quality of applicants a course receives. For appropriate preferencing, it's important that you check the minimum selection threshold for Semester 1 2025 admissions.

Year 12 QTAC applications

Current Year 12 students can apply for 2026 Applications from Tuesday 5 August. Any QTAC application submitted before Tuesday 5 August **will not** be considered and no information inputted will carry into the new admissions year starting 5 August. Do not apply until or after, Opening of Admissions, Tuesday 5 August.

Ideas to assist you with managing panic and reducing anxiety

Idea 1: When you are starting to panic remember this is an exaggerated physical reaction to stress. The feelings are unpleasant, but you can cope with them ... breathe!

Idea 2: Concentrate on your breathing – Breathe three deep breaths in and out slowly closing your eyes (when possible) as you do it ... repeat until your heart rate is settled.

Idea 3: Watch your thinking. Say in your head statements like: "It's OK", "I can cope", "breathe", "I can manage this" ...

Idea 4: Use distracting techniques – count backwards from 100 or describe a painting to yourself or remember a happy time

Idea 5: Tell yourself that this is just one point in time and it will pass ...

It is important to think in positive words to yourself. Everyone gets stressed and can panic but learning how to manage it will make the panic become less frequent. Always remember to back yourself. If you are finding managing your stress and/or panic difficult, speak with your school guidance officer, school counsellor or make an appointment to see your family doctor. They will all have great ideas to assist you to move forward positively and confidently.

Important Responsibilities Every Student Needs to Own

<u>Tim Elmore from Growing Leaders</u> encourages young people to step up and take responsibility and ownership for their live and life decisions. He suggests the following strategies are worth considering:

1. Master your attitude

You have no control over many obstacles that come your way, but you can control the way you respond to them. Own your attitude. Bad attitudes do you no good. Good attitudes can make the difference in whether you maintain creativity and optimism on the journey.

2. Be your own advocate at school

Students have agency. You need to exercise it. Stake a claim in class and let the teacher know that you're interested in succeeding. Stand up for what you need, ask questions and own what you've agreed to do. This can be a game-changer.

3. Offer your best effort

Students can't get upset with their grades if they don't invest energy. You should pursue your courses, sports teams and other activities with an "all in" commitment. If you have to say "no" to some activities so you can focus, then so be it. Do less and achieve more.

4. Practice punctuality

When you're on time, your message to others is, "I respect your time." When you're late, you unwittingly say, "I don't care as much about your time as you do." Be on time. Better yet, come early and prepared.

5. Surround yourself with people who can help you and vice versa

Most students make friends accidentally - whomever they meet at a party, or a game, etc. Why not identify and pursue helpful mentors, school and friends who will nudge you toward where you want to go. You can always return that favour.

6. Navigate your screen time

Most smartphones can report how much time we spend on them daily. Research demonstrates that fewer than two hours a day on social media leaves us less vulnerable to anxiety and depression. More than two hours results in greater vulnerability to mental health issues. Take charge of your phone and your time. It's your life.

English Language requirements for Nursing at all universities

As a Year 12 student, before you can be considered for a place in a Nursing or Midwifery course, the <u>Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council (ANMAC)</u> requires that all applicants demonstrate their English language proficiency via one of the following options:

Option 1: English is your primary language AND you have attended and satisfactorily completed at least six years of primary and secondary education taught and assessed solely in English. At least two years of this education must have been between grades 7 and 12. This education must have been completed in one or more of the following countries: Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Republic of Ireland, South Africa, United Kingdom, United States of America. If this describes you, then you will need to complete a declaration confirming that you meet the requirements as described above.

Option 2: If you do not meet the above option you will need to sit an approved English language proficiency test. If this describes you, then you will need to sit one of the following approved English language proficiency tests and achieve the minimum scores: IELTS Academic, TOEFL CBT, TWE Academic, ISLPR, STAT, PTE, Cambridge Assessment English or OET. Before booking one of these tests, check to see which tests are accepted by the institution you are applying to.
