How to Become a Doctor in Australia

Why become a Doctor in Australia?

Even before COVID-19 was a thing, we needed more doctors and medical specialists in Australia. Our population is growing, and a large proportion of people are approaching their senior years — requiring more care, more treatments, services, surgeries and support.

When you consider that doctors in Australia can expect to earn between \$200k and \$350k per annum and work at some of the best-resourced hospitals in the western world, the future is bright for this career.

Add in the health effects of a global pandemic, and demand is likely to stay very high for years to

It all starts with a medical school in Australia, all of which are universities.

No matter which course of study or entry method (undergraduate or postgraduate entry to medicine), if you graduate with a Doctor of Medicine or an MBBS (Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery), you will have the same recognised qualifications as any other doctor graduating in Australia.

Are you ready for the challenge ahead? Read on to find out more.

There are two ways to become a Doctor in Australia.

Study Undergraduate Medicine in Australia

This is the most common route for students going into medicine – studying the right subjects at school and achieving a sufficiently high ATAR to apply for entry.

Also called *Direct Entry* to medicine, it means starting your journey in an undergraduate medical program at an Australian university in the year after you've finished high school.

5 or 6 years after starting, you'll be an intern and on your way to practising as a doctor in Australia.

Thankfully, you don't have to aim for the best or most competitive medical schools in Australia (unless you want to), as they all offer equally appropriate programs to train you as a Doctor. Every capital city has a university offering medicine or pathway to medicine, as well as some regional universities. So there are plenty of options available.

To apply for Undergraduate Medicine/Direct Entry to Medicine, you need to:

• Study the appropriate prerequisite subjects like English, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics, Biology etc. Talk with a school Careers Advisor or your chosen university about which ones are right for you.

- **Prepare early** generally, you don't just apply for medicine after school finishes. Application processes often require you to sit the UCAT exam (if applicable) while you're still at school, usually held mid-year.
- Get ready to be interviewed many competitive university programs have an interview
 process to help them evaluate applicants to choose candidates to accept. Practice getting
 interviewed and be comfortable talking about your achievements, aims and goals for your
 medical career.
- Consider alternatives some university programs have hundreds of students with high ATARs applying for a handful of places, so ensure you've got a few different options available to fall back on, just in case.

There are 18 direct entry/undergraduate entry programs available. For a complete list of medical programs in Australia, check out the Entry to Medicine Guide from Study Work Grow (it'll show you all of the options and save you countless hours of searching).

Study Postgraduate Medicine in Australia

Don't want to go directly into medicine after school? Are you studying IT, accounting or physics?

Australia (and the world) needs doctors who have a wide range of knowledge and life experiences. As a postgraduate entry candidate for medical school, especially mature aged entry, you're likely to have both.

There are many postgraduate entry to medicine options in Australia (many of which don't require you to have studied a specific medicine/healthcare/science-related undergraduate degree).

Unlike the ATAR/UCAT-centred programs for undergraduate medicine, graduate entry to medicine is based on your current GPA (Grade Point Average), academic standing, and your results from sitting the GAMSAT test.

In most cases, you'll need to apply through GEMSAS (<u>www.gemsas.edu.au</u>), and you might also need to pass an interview by a university candidate selection panel. This, of course, depends on the individual university you're applying for.

Usually, after 4 years of postgraduate study, you'll be on your way to becoming a medical intern in an Australian hospital.

FAQs for Studying Medicine in Australia

How long does it take to become a Doctor in Australia?

Undergraduate medicine in Australia (an MD, MChD, or MBBS – all are equivalent) usually takes 5-6 years of study, 1 year of internship and then 1-2 years as a Resident Medical Officer.

Postgraduate medicine in Australia usually takes 4 years to complete, then 1 year of internship and 1 – 2 years as a Resident Medical Officer.

How long does it take to become a Surgeon in Australia?

It takes 5-6 years to complete the additional training required to become a Surgeon after completing your degree in medicine.

How much does it cost to become a Doctor in Australia?

In Australia, you can expect to pay between \$11,000 and \$60,000 per year for your studies, depending on whether you have a Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) or are paying full-fees in an accelerated program.

How good does my ATAR have to be to study medicine?

Most undergraduate medicine programs in Australia have a minimum ATAR of 95 or above (some are 99.95). However, there are universities with requirements of 80 as a minimum. So you don't have to be an exceptional achiever at school to become a doctor (you just have to be good academically and determined to succeed).

Best medical schools in Australia?

That depends on what you deem to be 'best'. There certainly are highly coveted places in medical schools in Australia, such as those offered by the University of Sydney – requiring a 99.95 ATAR with only 30 spots available. No matter how prestigious each university may be, every medical program in Australia that results in you becoming a doctor with the MD, MChD, or MBBS qualifications is recognised equally by the Australian Medical Association (AMA). So your choice of Australian medical school may come down to affordability, location, places available, or your results.

Do You Want to be a Firefighter?

Have you ever considered a career as a firefighter? It can be incredibly tough, being physically and emotionally demanding, but it can also be extremely rewarding knowing that you're helping to save people's lives.

One of the main duties of a firefighter is attending and containing fires. You could also find yourself doing rescue and recovery, fire prevention, attending road crashes, or cleaning large toxic chemical spills. The day of a firefighter is fast-paced and every day brings new challenges.

But if you'd like to become a firefighter, where do you start?

The first step is to see if you can volunteer or get work experience at your local fire station. These are great ways to experience a career first-hand, and ask people working in the job what it's like. One example is the NSW Community Fire Unit (CFU), where people in areas close to bushland volunteer to raise awareness of bushfires and learn strategies to prepare homes for fire. Certain places also have Cadet programs for young people, like South Australia's CFS Cadet Program.

The next step is to make sure you're physically capable. Many recruitment processes to become a firefighter involve a fitness test of some sort. For example, to become a firefighter in Queensland, you will need to pass an Operational Focused Abilities Test (OFAT), which tests things like your strength, reflexes and coordination. Most states also require you to do a Shuttle Run (the infamous Beep Test).

Another important consideration is ensuring you're mentally capable. Firefighters sometimes have to work in high-stress situations, and deal with people who may be seriously injured or dying. You need to be level-headed and perform well under pressure. In some states you may be tested on your mental and emotional capability, like in Victoria where you need to undertake a <u>psychological</u> <u>questionnaire</u>.

Here are some other attributes you'll need if you want to be a firefighter:

- Work well in teams
- Excellent initiative
- Commitment to ongoing training and education
- Strong communication skills
- Great at problem solving

Firefighting can be a tough job, but worth it knowing you're helping make your community safe and saving lives. If you're resilient, love helping others, and aren't afraid of a challenge, a career as a firefighter could be extremely rewarding.

What are VET Pathways?

Did you know that university isn't your only option after leaving school? Vocational and Educational Training is a great way to get you skilled and ready for work, and is often faster than traditional university pathways.

School to VET

Many VET courses have no prerequisites for enrolment, meaning you can start no matter what ATAR you get or which subjects you studied at high school. Some courses you can even study while you're still at school through a VET in school program. You could also get paid while you learn by starting an apprenticeship or traineeship.

VET to Uni

Getting a VET qualification can also be a great pathway to university if you don't meet your dream course's entry requirements straight out of school. Many universities will accept Certificate IV and higher qualifications for entry into most courses. Plus, doing a VET course first can be a great way to get a feel for what studying is like, and you might even want to go straight into work instead.

Career Changers

If you work in the same job for a while but just find it isn't for you anymore, VET is a great way to get re-skilled quickly and into a brand new career. Some courses can be completed in as little as six months, meaning you can jump into your new job sooner. And it doesn't matter how young or old you are — anyone can study a VET qualification.

How to become a Financial Manager

Responsible for guiding the financial health of organisations

What do Financial Managers do?

Financial Managers take care of the money side of businesses. They create budgets, do forward planning, report on how well (or how badly) businesses may be operating. They work out what investments or expenses can be approved or cut and then implement strategies to work helping organisations to keep running and ultimately boost profits.

If you're mathematically inclined, love figures and spreadsheets, but also enjoy working with people, then it could be worth exploring a career as a Financial Manager.

About you:

- Advanced mathematical knowledge, great at compiling and analysing data, able to make sense of large volumes of financial information
- A high level of organisation is essential as is logical thinking and decisiveness
- Advanced technological skills required to use a variety of different programs and access information in different formats
- Meticulous attention to detail regarding figures (to the cent), laws and regulations
- As a manager you'll also need to have strong leadership abilities, be able to work well as part
 of a team and also manage your workload independently

The job:

Financial Managers are needed in most industries supporting executive management teams by providing insights and financial advice that will allow organisations to make the best decisions.

- Collect, interpret, and review financial information
- Monitor, review and manage budgets
- Predict financial and market trends then create informed forecasts and projections
- Writing reports and delivering them to other executives and stakeholders
- Advise on organisations future business decisions
- Produce long-term plans and strategies based on your reports to help the organisation to run more efficiently and effectively
- Identify and work towards minimising financial risks
- Making sure your organisation is operating and complying within the strict financial laws and standards

- Working as a Financial Manager comes with a high level of responsibility, you'll have to work
 to deadlines and comply with lots of different laws, legislations and standards. You may have
 to work outside of normal office hours and learn how to deal with a variety of stressful
 situations managing finances, organisational expectations, and leading teams.

Financial Managers are most in demand in these locations:

53,900 people were employed in Financial Management in 2019 (Source: ABS) so it's a large occupation. There are work opportunities in most regions of Australia, but New South Wales employs around 40% of workers in this job. There is a possibility that in this role you could work remotely, but you may have to travel frequently to meet with teams and present findings.

How to become a Financial Manager in Australia

You'll usually be required to have a university degree in finance, accounting, business or economics to be employed as Financial Manager.

It doesn't mean you can't work as a Finance Manager without formal qualifications, but your path may take longer, and you'll need to get lots of work experience to illustrate that you're capable of doing the job.

Step 1 – Obtain your high school certificate, you'll need English (critical for good communication) and high-level maths. Consider IT, accounting, business and economics studies which could also be useful. Check for university course prerequisites.

Step 2 – Complete relevant tertiary qualification e.g.:

Bachelor of Finance at Adelaide University
Bachelor of Business (Honours) at UTS

Bachelor of Advanced Finance and Economics (Honours) at UQ

You could also consider a related undergraduate degree, then completing a postgraduate qualification:

Master of Financial Management at Bond

Master of Accounting and Financial Management at La Trobe

Many of the courses can also be completed online.

Step 3 – Ensure that your technology skills and knowledge of laws, legislations and standards are constantly refreshed and up to date.

Step 4 – Gain work experience and consider upskilling while you work, then applying for vacancies within the executive leadership and management teams.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What do Financial Managers do?

Financial Managers support higher level executives such as the Chief Financial Officer within an organisation. They help businesses to make informed financial decisions by providing guidance. They analyse strengths and weaknesses, identify and manage risks, make sure operations are legal and above board, create and monitor budgets, as well as exploring ways to increase revenue and reduce costs.

Which industries employ Financial Managers?

Most industries need Financial Managers however the largest number are employed in the financial and insurance services. Followed by professional, scientific and technical industries. Manufacturing, public administration and safety are also notable employers. (Source: ABS)

Do I need to go to university to become a Financial Manager?

It's best to assume that you'll need a university degree to competitively apply for most Financial Management positions.

If you're determined and prepared to wait longer to reach your goals though, there are other pathways you could explore.

Where do Financial Managers work?

Financial Managers work in financial districts, within offices, branches or departments of most organisations. For example, you could be working in a bank, risk and insurance services, loan and credit businesses. You could also work remotely and be based at home.
