Looking at the Readings

We hear a lot today about Treaties. A treaty is made between two nations or two parties that mutually design it and have respect and commitment to abide by its terms. A covenant is also a mutual agreement normally made by one and an individual or a group. The covenant expressed in the Sacred Scriptures is made by God to his people. The first readings on the Sundays of Lent continue with accounts of God's Covenant. This Sunday there is a significant shift. Jeremiah speaks of God establishing a *new covenant* with his people. This is the only time "new covenant" is mentioned in the Old Testament. And this covenant looks forward to the one established by Christ's death and resurrection. "New Covenant" is found in Luke's Gospel, St Paul's letters, and the letter to the Hebrews which quotes the entire first reading from Jeremiah (Hebr 8:8-12). New Covenant is expressed at every Mass in the Eucharistic Prayers.

The passage from the Letter to the Hebrews today, however, is not just about covenant but about suffering, death and salvation. Just in two sentences we have a great insight into the mind and heart of Jesus. He prayed, he cried, he was fearful but resolute, humble and obedient. Prayer leads to acceptance, acceptance gives him strength. May our prayers for healing, solutions to hardships, for peace bring us acceptance and salvation.

Palm Sunday

Next Sunday, 24 March is Passion Sunday, the day we read the Passion of the Lord. It is also known as Palm Sunday with the commemoration of The Lord's Entry into Jerusalem. Monday of Holy Week, 25 March, displaces the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord until the next liturgically free day, Monday 8 April.

Prayer over the People

Bless, O Lord, your people, who long for the gift of your mercy, and grant that what, at your prompting, they desire they may receive by your generous gift. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Liturgical Jottings Lent – 5 Lectionary

The Gospel of the first Sunday of Lent gives the account of Jesus in the wilderness from Matthew (in cycle A), Mark (B) and Luke (C). The Gospel for the second Sunday of Lent gives the account of the transfiguration, again from the three Gospels. For the other Sundays of Lent they differ. The Gospels in cycle A are baptismal in character. The Gospels in cycle C are penitential in character. Thereby relating to the double focus of Lent: preparing for Baptism for RCIA candidates and Penance for the initiated. Year B has two themes: the first reading recalls God's covenant established and re-established and the Gospel focuses on the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Thereby preparing all for the Paschal mystery.

On Passion (Palm) Sunday we read Jesus entry into Jerusalem with Matthew (in cycle A), Mark or John (B) and Luke (C) and proclaim the Passion Narrative, again from Matthew (A),

Weekly Reflection - The True Source of Salvation

We live in a world that is driven by technology. From smartphones to social media, from artificial intelligence to automation, technology has become an integral part of our lives. There is nothing inherently wrong with this, of course. Technology can be a powerful tool that can help us solve material difficulties and improve our lives. However, there is a danger that we can become so focused on what we can achieve through technology that we forget what truly matters in life.

As Christians, we believe that what matters most is not what we can do for God or for ourselves, but what God has done and wants to do for us. Jesus is our Savior, not our consultant. This truth is evident in the readings for today's Mass. In the first reading, we hear that God will make an everlasting covenant with us, plant the law of freedom and interior peace within our hearts, and forgive our evildoing and remember our sin no more. These promises are not dependent on what we can achieve through our own efforts. Rather, they are gifts that God freely gives us out of his infinite love and mercy. The Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that Jesus is the source of eternal salvation. We cannot reach everlasting happiness on our own, but through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, we are given the opportunity to be saved and to live in the light of God's love.

In the Gospel passage, Jesus himself explains that his total love and obedience, up to the point of his humiliating death on a cross, is the turning point of history. Through his self-sacrificial crucifixion, Christ's faithful love undoes Adam's original sin and conquers the devil's sinful rebellion, the source of evil in the world. Jesus willingly and freely fulfilled his Father's plan of salvation, showing us that what God has done for us matters more than anything we can possibly do for God. As we go about our daily lives in this technology-centered world, let us not forget the true source of salvation. Let us remember that what matters most is not what we can achieve through our own efforts, but what God has done and wants to do for us. Let us open our hearts to receive the gifts of God's love and mercy, and let us strive to live in the light of Christ's self-sacrificial love. Only then will we find true happiness and fulfillment in this life and in the life to come.
